## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 508

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REMEMBERING THE GALLANT SERVICE AND
COMMENDING THE LIFE OF SERGEANT LARRY RICHARD ARNOLD, SR., OF
CARRIERE, MISSISSIPPI, WHO WAS A COMBAT CASUALTY IN IRAQ ON
SATURDAY, JUNE 11, 2005, AND EXPRESSING THE SYMPATHY OF THE
LEGISLATURE.
WHEREAS, Sergeant Larry Richard Arnold, Sr., 46, of Carriere,
Mississippi, was one of two Mississippi soldiers killed on

8 Saturday, June 11, 2005, when a roadside bomb exploded near their 9 vehicle near Owesat Village outside of Amiriyah, 25 miles south of 10 Baghdad, Iraq; and

11 WHEREAS, carried by a military honor guard, he came home to 12 his community and family, and was buried Wednesday, June 22, 2005, 13 at Mill Creek Cemetery, Carriere, Mississippi, with full military 14 honors; and

WHEREAS, Sergeant Arnold served with the Mississippi National 15 16 Guard's 155 Brigade Combat Team, assigned to Company B, 150th Combat Engineer Battalion in Lucedale, Mississippi. His son, 17 Robert, 21, served alongside his father in the same company, and 18 19 was home on leave when the family received the news of his death. Sergeant Arnold had served 8-1/2 years in the United States Army 20 and joined the Mississippi National Guard in 1991 serving 14 21 years. He was born in St. Louis, Missouri, and resided in 22 Carriere with his wife of 28 years. An electrician by trade, 23 24 Larry Arnold made the National Guard his full-time job in 2002; and 25

26 WHEREAS, the 155th Infantry Brigade Combat Team, known as 27 "Dixie Thunder," includes 3,500 soldiers from Mississippi and 28 others from Vermont and Arkansas. The 155th, which is attached to 29 the II Marine Expeditionary Force, operates in the Karbala, Najaf 30 and Babil provinces of Iraq. The soldiers trained at Camp Shelby before being deployed to Iraq in January 2004. The deaths of 31 32 these two brave guardsman brings the total in the 155th Brigade to 33 at least 12 in 2005. Since military operations in Afghanistan and 34 Iraq began, 35 people with Mississippi ties have died. The Mississippi National Guard has sustained the fourth-highest number 35 of casualties of any state; and 36

37 WHEREAS, Melinda Arnold remembers her husband as "a caring 38 and dedicated soldier." The couple met on a blind date in March 39 1977, and were married in August of that year; and

40 WHEREAS, during his funeral, Sergeant Arnold was awarded the 41 Bronze Star, the Mississippi Medal of Valor and the Purple Heart 42 posthumously by Brigadier General Ben Gaston, Mississippi National 43 Guard; and

44 WHEREAS, his family received an outpouring of grief and 45 support from across the state, demonstrating the community's 46 acknowledgment of the sacrifice made by the Mississippi National 47 Guard; and

48 WHEREAS, Larry Arnold is survived by his wife of 28 years, 49 Melinda Arnold of Carriere; three sons, Larry Arnold, Jr., Robert 50 Arnold and Howard James Arnold, all of Carriere; his mother, Betty Mackey of Columbia, Missouri; one brother, Garry Arnold of 51 Columbia, Missouri; five sisters, Peggy Alford of Norwood, Ohio, 52 53 Beverly Hicks of Harrisonville, Missouri, Janet Brandes of Simi Valley, California, Joann Arnold of Manilla, Arkansas, and Debbie 54 55 Arnold of Bentonville, Arkansas; one grandson, Anthony Arnold of Carriere; one granddaughter, Heather Arnold of Carriere; 12 nieces 56 and 14 nephews; 10 great-nieces and 11 great-nephews; and 57 WHEREAS, to a country, a fallen soldier means a national 58 59 loss; to a community, a fallen soldier means a true hero; to a 60 parent, a fallen soldier means a son who won't be coming home. 62 paid them in the past, and it is with great pride and humility 63 that we recognize the heroic action of this great American and 64 Mississippian, who was the guardian of civilization as we know it 65 today:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That we do hereby remember the gallant service and commend the life of Sergeant Larry Richard Arnold, Sr., of Carriere, Mississippi, who was killed in action in Iraq on Saturday, June 11, 2005, and extend the thoughts and prayers of the Legislature to his family and our sorrow on his passing.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this resolution be presented to the surviving family of Sergeant Arnold and be made available to members of the Capitol Press Corps.
