## SENATE BILL NO. 2012

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 37-17-6, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO
 AUTHORIZE THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO EXEMPT ANY SCHOOL
 DISTRICT WITH AN EXTREME FINANCIAL SITUATION CAUSED BY THE
 HURRICANE KATRINA DISASTER OF 2005 FROM ANY ACCOUNTABILITY
 STANDARD FOR THE 2005-2006 SCHOOL YEAR; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
 SECTION 1. Section 37-17-6, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
 amended as follows:

9 37-17-6. (1) The State Board of Education, acting through 10 the Commission on School Accreditation, shall establish and 11 implement a permanent performance-based accreditation system, and 12 all public elementary and secondary schools shall be accredited 13 under this system.

14 (2) No later than June 30, 1995, the State Board of
15 Education, acting through the Commission on School Accreditation,
16 shall require school districts to provide school classroom space
17 that is air conditioned as a minimum requirement for
18 accreditation.

(3) (a) Beginning with the 1994-1995 school year, the State
Board of Education, acting through the Commission on School
Accreditation, shall require that school districts employ
certified school librarians according to the following formula:

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(b) The State Board of Education, however, may increasethe number of positions beyond the above requirements.

(c) The assignment of such school librarians to the particular schools shall be at the discretion of the local school district. No individual shall be employed as a certified school librarian without appropriate training and certification as a school librarian by the State Department of Education.

36 (d) School librarians in such district shall spend at
37 least fifty percent (50%) of direct work time in a school library
38 and shall devote no more than one-fourth (1/4) of the workday to
39 administrative activities which are library related.

40 (e) Nothing in this subsection shall prohibit any
41 school district from employing more certified school librarians
42 than are provided for in this section.

(f) Any additional millage levied to fund school
librarians required for accreditation under this subsection shall
be included in the tax increase limitation set forth in Sections
37-57-105 and 37-57-107 and shall not be deemed a new program for
purposes of the limitation.

48 (4) On or before December 31, 2002, the State Board of
49 Education shall implement the performance-based accreditation
50 system for school districts and for individual schools which shall
51 include the following:

52 (a) High expectations for students and high standards53 for all schools, with a focus on the basic curriculum;

54 (b) Strong accountability for results with appropriate55 local flexibility for local implementation;

56 (c) A process to implement accountability at both the57 school district level and the school level;

58 (d) Individual schools shall be held accountable for59 student growth and performance;

60 (e) Set annual performance standards for each of the
61 schools of the state and measure the performance of each school
62 against itself through the standard that has been set for it;

(f) A determination of which schools exceed their
standards and a plan for providing recognition and rewards to such
schools;

(g) A determination of which schools are failing to
meet their standards and a determination of the appropriate role
of the State Board of Education and the State Department of
Education in providing assistance and initiating possible
intervention; and

(h) Development of a comprehensive student assessmentsystem to implement these requirements.

The State Board of Education may continue to assign school district performance levels by using a number classification and may assign individual school performance levels by using a number classification to be consistent with school district performance levels.

(i) The State Board of Education shall have the
authority, with the concurrence of the Governor, based upon
justification therefor by a written request from the local school
board of any school district with an extreme financial situation
caused by the Hurricane Katrina Disaster of 2005, to hold harmless
and/or exempt such affected school district from any
accountability standards for the 2005-2006 school year.

(5) Nothing in this section shall be deemed to require a
nonpublic school which receives no local, state or federal funds
for support to become accredited by the State Board of Education.
(6) The State Board of Education shall create an
accreditation audit unit under the Commission on School
Accreditation to determine whether schools are complying with
accreditation standards.

92 (7) The State Board of Education shall be specifically 93 authorized and empowered to withhold adequate minimum education 94 program or adequate education program fund allocations, whichever 95 is applicable, to any public school district for failure to timely 96 report student, school personnel and fiscal data necessary to meet 97 state and/or federal requirements.

98 (8) Deleted.

The State Board of Education shall establish, for those 99 (9) 100 school districts failing to meet accreditation standards, a 101 program of development to be complied with in order to receive 102 state funds, except as otherwise provided in subsection (14) of this section when the Governor has declared a state of emergency 103 104 in a school district or as otherwise provided in Section 206, 105 Mississippi Constitution of 1890. The state board, in establishing these standards, shall provide for notice to schools 106 107 and sufficient time and aid to enable schools to attempt to meet 108 these standards, unless procedures under subsection (14) of this 109 section have been invoked.

(10) Beginning July 1, 1998, the State Board of Education shall be charged with the implementation of the program of development in each applicable school district as follows:

(a) Develop an impairment report for each district
failing to meet accreditation standards in conjunction with school
district officials;

116 Notify any applicable school district failing to (b) meet accreditation standards that it is on probation until 117 118 corrective actions are taken or until the deficiencies have been The local school district shall develop a corrective 119 removed. action plan to improve its deficiencies. For district academic 120 121 deficiencies, the corrective action plan for each such school 122 district shall be based upon a complete analysis of the following: 123 student test data, student grades, student attendance reports, 124 student drop-out data, existence and other relevant data. 125 corrective action plan shall describe the specific measures to be 126 taken by the particular school district and school to improve: 127 (a) instruction; (b) curriculum; (c) professional development; (d) 128 personnel and classroom organization; (e) student incentives for 129 performance; (f) process deficiencies; and (g) reporting to the 130 local school board, parents and the community. The corrective 131 action plan shall describe the specific individuals responsible for implementing each component of the recommendation and how each 132 will be evaluated. All corrective action plans shall be provided 133 to the State Board of Education as may be required. The decision 134 135 of the State Board of Education establishing the probationary period of time shall be final; 136

137 (c) Offer, during the probationary period, technical 138 assistance to the school district in making corrective actions. Beginning July 1, 1998, subject to the availability of funds, the 139 State Department of Education shall provide technical and/or 140 141 financial assistance to all such school districts in order to 142 implement each measure identified in that district's corrective 143 action plan through professional development and on-site 144 assistance. Each such school district shall apply for and utilize 145 all available federal funding in order to support its corrective 146 action plan in addition to state funds made available under this 147 paragraph;

(d) Contract, in its discretion, with the institutions of higher learning or other appropriate private entities to assist school districts;

151 (e) Provide for publication of public notice at least 152 one (1) time during the probationary period, in a newspaper published within the jurisdiction of the school district failing 153 154 to meet accreditation standards, or if no newspaper is published 155 therein, then in a newspaper having a general circulation therein. 156 The publication shall include the following: declaration of 157 school system's status as being on probation; all details relating S. to the impairment report, and other information as the State Board of Education deems appropriate. Public notices issued under this section shall be subject to Section 13-3-31 and not contrary to other laws regarding newspaper publication.

162 (11)(a) If the recommendations for corrective action are 163 not taken by the local school district or if the deficiencies are 164 not removed by the end of the probationary period, the Commission on School Accreditation shall conduct a hearing to allow such 165 166 affected school district to present evidence or other reasons why 167 its accreditation should not be withdrawn. Subsequent to its 168 consideration of the results of such hearing, the Commission on School Accreditation shall be authorized, with the approval of the 169 170 State Board of Education, to withdraw the accreditation of a 171 public school district, and issue a request to the Governor that a state of emergency be declared in that district. 172

If the State Board of Education and the Commission 173 (b) 174 on School Accreditation determine that an extreme emergency 175 situation exists in a school district which jeopardizes the safety, security or educational interests of the children enrolled 176 177 in the schools in that district and such emergency situation is believed to be related to a serious violation or violations of 178 179 accreditation standards or state or federal law, the State Board of Education may request the Governor to declare a state of 180 181 emergency in that school district. For purposes of this 182 paragraph, such declarations of a state of emergency shall not be limited to those instances when a school district's impairments 183 184 are related to a lack of financial resources, but also shall include serious failure to meet minimum academic standards, as 185 evidenced by a continued pattern of poor student performance. 186

(c) Whenever the Governor declares a state of emergency
in a school district in response to a request made under paragraph
(a) or (b) of this subsection, the State Board of Education may
take one or more of the following actions:

(i) Declare a state of emergency, under which some 191 192 or all of state funds can be escrowed except as otherwise provided in Section 206, Constitution of 1890, until the board determines 193 194 corrective actions are being taken or the deficiencies have been 195 removed, or that the needs of students warrant the release of 196 funds. Such funds may be released from escrow for any program 197 which the board determines to have been restored to standard even though the state of emergency may not as yet be terminated for the 198 199 district as a whole;

(ii) Override any decision of the local school board or superintendent of education, or both, concerning the management and operation of the school district, or initiate and make decisions concerning the management and operation of the school district;

(iii) Assign an interim conservator who will have those powers and duties prescribed in subsection (14) of this section;

(iv) Grant transfers to students who attend this school district so that they may attend other accredited schools or districts in a manner which is not in violation of state or federal law;

212 (v) For states of emergency declared under paragraph (a) only, if the accreditation deficiencies are related 213 214 to the fact that the school district is too small, with too few 215 resources, to meet the required standards and if another school district is willing to accept those students, abolish that 216 217 district and assign that territory to another school district or districts. If the school district has proposed a voluntary 218 consolidation with another school district or districts, then if 219 220 the State Board of Education finds that it is in the best interest of the pupils of the district for such consolidation to proceed, 221 222 the voluntary consolidation shall have priority over any such 223 assignment of territory by the State Board of Education; \*SS26/R33.2\* S. B. No. 2012 055E/SS26/R33.2

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(vi) For states of emergency declared under 224 225 paragraph (b) only, reduce local supplements paid to school district employees, including, but not limited to, instructional 226 227 personnel, assistant teachers and extracurricular activities 228 personnel, if the district's impairment is related to a lack of 229 financial resources, but only to an extent which will result in 230 the salaries being comparable to districts similarly situated, as determined by the State Board of Education; 231

(vii) For states of emergency declared under
paragraph (b) only, the State Board of Education must take such
action as prescribed in Section 37-17-13.

(d) At such time as satisfactory corrective action has been taken in a school district in which a state of emergency has been declared, the State Board of Education may request the Governor to declare that the state of emergency no longer exists in the district.

(e) Not later than July 1 of each year, the State 240 241 Department of Education shall develop an itemized accounting of the expenditures associated with the management of the conservator 242 243 process with regard to each school district in which a conservator 244 has been appointed, and an assessment as to the extent to which 245 the conservator has achieved, or failed to achieve, the goals for 246 which the conservator was appointed to guide the local school 247 district.

248 (12)Upon the declaration of a state of emergency in a school district under subsection (11) of this section, the 249 250 Commission on School Accreditation shall be responsible for public 251 notice at least once a week for at least three (3) consecutive 252 weeks in a newspaper published within the jurisdiction of the 253 school district failing to meet accreditation standards, or if no newspaper is published therein, then in a newspaper having a 254 255 general circulation therein. The size of such notice shall be no 256 smaller than one-fourth (1/4) of a standard newspaper page and \*SS26/R33.2\* S. B. No. 2012 055E/SS26/R33.2 PAGE 8

shall be printed in bold print. If a conservator has been 257 258 appointed for the school district, such notice shall begin as "By authority of Section 37-17-6, Mississippi Code of 259 follows: 260 1972, as amended, adopted by the Mississippi Legislature during 261 the 1991 Regular Session, this school district (name of school 262 district) is hereby placed under the jurisdiction of the State 263 Department of Education acting through its appointed conservator 264 (name of conservator)."

265 The notice also shall include, in the discretion of the State Board of Education, any or all details relating to the school 266 267 district's emergency status, including the declaration of a state of emergency in the school district and a description of the 268 269 district's impairment deficiencies, conditions of any 270 conservatorship and corrective actions recommended and being 271 taken. Public notices issued under this section shall be subject 272 to Section 13-3-31 and not contrary to other laws regarding 273 newspaper publication.

Upon termination of the state of emergency in a school district, the Commission on School Accreditation shall cause notice to be published in the school district in the same manner provided in this section, to include any or all details relating to the corrective action taken in the school district which resulted in the termination of the state of emergency.

(13) The State Board of Education or the Commission on School Accreditation shall have the authority to require school districts to produce the necessary reports, correspondence, financial statements, and any other documents and information necessary to fulfill the requirements of this section.

Nothing in this section shall be construed to grant any individual, corporation, board or conservator the authority to levy taxes except in accordance with presently existing statutory provisions.

(14) (a) Whenever the Governor declares a state of emergency in a school district in response to a request made under subsection (11) of this section, the State Board of Education, in its discretion, may assign an interim conservator to the school district who will be responsible for the administration, management and operation of the school district, including, but not limited to, the following activities:

296 Approving or disapproving all financial (i) 297 obligations of the district, including, but not limited to, the employment, termination, nonrenewal and reassignment of all 298 299 certified and noncertified personnel, contractual agreements and purchase orders, and approving or disapproving all claim dockets 300 301 and the issuance of checks; in approving or disapproving 302 employment contracts of superintendents, assistant superintendents 303 or principals, the interim conservator shall not be required to 304 comply with the time limitations prescribed in Sections 37-9-15 305 and 37-9-105;

(ii) Supervising the day-to-day activities of the district's staff, including reassigning the duties and responsibilities of personnel in a manner which, in the determination of the conservator, will best suit the needs of the district;

(iii) Reviewing the district's total financial obligations and operations and making recommendations to the district for cost savings, including, but not limited to, reassigning the duties and responsibilities of staff; (iv) Attending all meetings of the district's school board and administrative staff; (v) Approving or disapproving all athletic, band and administrative staff;

318 and other extracurricular activities and any matters related to 319 those activities;

320 (vi) Maintaining a detailed account of 321 recommendations made to the district and actions taken in response 322 to those recommendations;

323 (vii) Reporting periodically to the State Board of 324 Education on the progress or lack of progress being made in the 325 district to improve the district's impairments during the state of 326 emergency; and

327 (viii) Appointing a parent advisory committee,
328 comprised of parents of students in the school district, which may
329 make recommendations to the conservator concerning the
330 administration, management and operation of the school district.

Except when, in the determination of the State Board of 331 332 Education, the school district's impairment is related to a lack 333 of financial resources, the cost of the salary of the conservator and any other actual and necessary costs related to the 334 335 conservatorship paid by the State Department of Education shall be 336 reimbursed by the local school district from nonminimum program 337 The department shall submit an itemized statement to the funds. superintendent of the local school district for reimbursement 338 339 purposes, and any unpaid balance may be withheld from the 340 district's minimum or adequate education program funds.

At such time as the Governor, pursuant to the request of the State Board of Education, declares that the state of emergency no longer exists in a school district, the powers and responsibilities of the interim conservator assigned to such district shall cease.

346 (b) In order to provide loans to school districts under 347 a state of emergency which have impairments related to a lack of financial resources, the School District Emergency Assistance Fund 348 349 is created as a special fund in the State Treasury into which 350 monies may be transferred or appropriated by the Legislature from 351 any available public education funds. The maximum amount that may 352 be appropriated or transferred to the School District Emergency \*SS26/R33.2\* S. B. No. 2012 055E/SS26/R33.2 PAGE 11

Assistance Fund for any one (1) emergency shall be Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00), and the maximum amount that may be appropriated during any fiscal year shall be Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000.00).

357 The State Board of Education may loan monies from the School 358 District Emergency Assistance Fund to a school district that is 359 under a state of emergency in such amounts, as determined by the 360 board, which are necessary to correct the district's impairments 361 related to a lack of financial resources. The loans shall be 362 evidenced by an agreement between the school district and the 363 State Board of Education and shall be repayable in principal, 364 without necessity of interest, to the State General Fund or the 365 Education Enhancement Fund, depending on the source of funding for 366 such loan, by the school district from any allowable funds that 367 are available. The total amount loaned to the district shall be 368 due and payable within five (5) years after the impairments related to a lack of financial resources are corrected. 369 If a 370 school district fails to make payments on the loan in accordance with the terms of the agreement between the district and the State 371 372 Board of Education, the State Department of Education, in accordance with rules and regulations established by the State 373 374 Board of Education, may withhold that district's minimum program 375 funds in an amount and manner that will effectuate repayment consistent with the terms of the agreement; such funds withheld by 376 377 the department shall be deposited into the State General Fund or 378 the Education Enhancement Fund, as the case may be.

If the State Board of Education determines that an extreme 379 380 emergency exists, simultaneous with the powers exercised in this 381 subsection, it shall take immediate action against all parties 382 responsible for the affected school districts having been 383 determined to be in an extreme emergency. Such action shall 384 include, but not be limited to, initiating civil actions to 385 recover funds and criminal actions to account for criminal \*SS26/R33.2\* S. B. No. 2012 055E/SS26/R33.2

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386 activity. Any funds recovered by the State Auditor or the State 387 Board of Education from the surety bonds of school officials or 388 from any civil action brought under this subsection shall be 389 applied toward the repayment of any loan made to a school district 390 hereunder.

391 (15) In the event a majority of the membership of the school board of any school district resigns from office, the State Board 392 393 of Education shall be authorized to assign an interim conservator, 394 who shall be responsible for the administration, management and operation of the school district until such time as new board 395 396 members are selected or the Governor declares a state of emergency in that school district under subsection (11), whichever occurs 397 In such case, the State Board of Education, acting through 398 first. 399 the interim conservator, shall have all powers which were held by the previously existing school board, and may take such action as 400 401 prescribed in Section 37-17-13 and/or one or more of the actions 402 authorized in this section.

(16) Beginning with the school district audits conducted for the 1997-1998 fiscal year, the State Board of Education, acting through the Commission on School Accreditation, shall require each school district to comply with standards established by the State Department of Audit for the verification of fixed assets and the auditing of fixed assets records as a minimum requirement for accreditation.

(17) Before December 1, 1999, the State Board of Education shall recommend a program to the Education Committees of the House of Representatives and the Senate for identifying and rewarding public schools that improve or are high performing. The program shall be described by the board in a written report, which shall include criteria and a process through which improving schools and high-performing schools will be identified and rewarded.

417 The State Superintendent of Education and the State Board of 418 Education also shall develop a comprehensive accountability plan S. B. No. 2012 \*SS26/R33.2\* 055E/SS26/R33.2 PAGE 13 419 to ensure that local school boards, superintendents, principals 420 and teachers are held accountable for student achievement. A 421 written report on the accountability plan shall be submitted to 422 the Education Committees of both houses of the Legislature before 423 December 1, 1999, with any necessary legislative recommendations. 424 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from 425 and after its passage.
