HOUSE BILL NO. 921

AN ACT TO BE KNOWN AS THE "MISSISSIPPI YOUTHBUILD ACT"; TO 1 REQUIRE THE DIVISION OF FAMILY AND CHILDREN'S SERVICES OF THE 2 3 DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES TO ADMINISTER THE ACT; TO PROVIDE 4 THAT CERTAIN DISADVANTAGED YOUTH WILL BE PROVIDED WITH OPPORTUNITIES THROUGH YOUTHBUILD PROGRAMS FOR EMPLOYMENT 5 б EDUCATION, LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT, ENTREPRENEURIAL SKILLS 7 DEVELOPMENT AND TRAINING IN THE CONSTRUCTION OR REHABILITATION OF 8 HOUSING FOR SPECIAL NEED POPULATIONS, VERY LOW-INCOME HOUSEHOLDS OR LOW-INCOME HOUSEHOLDS; TO PRESCRIBE REQUIREMENTS FOR YOUTHBUILD 9 10 PROGRAMS; TO DESCRIBE ACTIVITIES AND ENTITIES ELIGIBLE FOR A 11 YOUTHBUILD PROGRAM GRANT; AND TO SET FORTH REQUIREMENTS FOR YOUTHBUILD PROGRAM GRANT APPLICATIONS; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 12 13 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: SECTION 1. This act may be cited as the "Mississippi 14 Youthbuild Act." 15 16 SECTION 2. The purposes of this act are as follows: (a) To enable economically disadvantaged youth, 17 especially youth who have not finished high school, to obtain the 18 education, job skills training, personal counseling, leadership 19 development skills training, job placement assistance and 20 long-term follow-up services necessary for them to achieve 21 permanent economic self-sufficiency, while at the same time 22 providing valuable community service that addresses urgent 23 community needs, including the demand for affordable housing and 24 25 the need for young role models and mentors for younger teenagers and children; 26

(b) To provide communities the opportunity to establish or rebuild neighborhood stability in economically depressed and low-income areas, as well as historic areas requiring restoration or preservation, while providing economically disadvantaged youth and youth who have not finished high school an opportunity for meaningful participation in society;

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33 (c) To allow communities to expand the supply of 34 affordable housing for homeless and other low-income individuals 35 by utilizing the energies and talents of economically 36 disadvantaged youth and young people who have not finished high 37 school; and

38 (d) To foster the development of leadership skills and39 a commitment to community development among youth.

40 <u>SECTION 3.</u> As used in this act, the following words and 41 phrases have the meanings respectively ascribed in this section 42 unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

43 (a) "Applicant" means a public or private
44 not-for-profit agency eligible to provide education and employment
45 training under federal or state employment training programs.

46 (b) "Director" means the Director of the Division of
47 Family and Children's Services of the Department of Human
48 Services.

49 (c) "Very low-income" means a person or household whose 50 income is at or below fifty percent (50%) of the median family 51 income, adjusted for household size, for the county where the 52 household is located.

(d) "Youthbuild" means any program that provides disadvantaged youth with opportunities for employment, education, leadership development, entrepreneurial skills development and training in the construction or rehabilitation of housing for special-need populations, very low-income households or low-income households.

59 <u>SECTION 4.</u> (1) The director may make grants to applicants 60 for the purpose of carrying out Youthbuild programs. All programs 61 funded under this act must reflect strong youth and community 62 involvement. In addition, funding provided under this act must be 63 used by each Youthbuild program to provide, at a minimum, the 64 following services:

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65 Acquisition or rehabilitation, or both, or (a) 66 construction of housing and related facilities to be used for the 67 purpose of providing home ownership for disadvantaged persons, 68 residential housing for homeless individuals and low-income and 69 very low-income families or transitional housing for persons who 70 are homeless, with disabilities, are ill, are deinstitutionalized 71 or have special needs, and rehabilitation or construction of 72 community facilities by not-for-profit or public agencies.

Integrated education and job skills training 73 (b) services and activities, with fifty percent (50%) of students' 74 75 time in the program devoted to classroom-based instruction, counseling and leadership development instruction and the 76 77 remaining fifty percent (50%) of students' time spent in 78 experimental training on the construction site. The programs must 79 include, at a minimum, the following elements:

80 An education component that includes basic (i) skills instruction, secondary education services and other 81 activities designed to lead to the attainment of a high school 82 diploma or its equivalent. The curriculum for this component must 83 84 include math, language arts, vocational education, life skills training, social studies related to the cultural and community 85 86 history of the students, leadership skills and other topics at the discretion of the program. Bilingual services must be available 87 88 for individuals with limited English proficiency. The desired 89 minimum teacher to student ratio is one (1) teacher for every twelve (12) students. 90

91 (ii) A work experience and skills training 92 component apprenticeship program that includes the construction 93 and rehabilitation activities described in paragraph (a) of this 94 subsection. The process of construction must be coupled with 95 skills training and with close on-site supervision by experienced 96 trainers. The curriculum for this component must contain a set of 97 locally agreed upon skills and competencies that are

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98 systematically taught, with a student's mastery assessed 99 individually on a regular, ongoing basis. Safety skills must be 100 taught at the outset. The desired trainer to student ratio is one 101 (1) trainer for every seven (7) students. The work experience and 102 skills training component must be coordinated to the maximum 103 extent feasible with preapprenticeship and apprenticeship 104 programs.

(iii) Assistance in attaining post secondary education and required financial aid, which must be made available to participants before graduation.

108 (c) Counseling services designed to assist participants 109 to positively participate in society, which should include all of 110 the following, if necessary: outreach, assessment and orientation; individual and peer counseling; life skills training; 111 drug and alcohol abuse education and prevention; and referral to 112 appropriate drug rehabilitation, medical, mental health, legal, 113 114 housing and other services and resources in the community. The 115 desired counselor to participant ratio, one (1) counselor for every twenty-four (24) students. 116

117 (d) Leadership development training that provides 118 participants with meaningful opportunities to develop leadership 119 skills such as decision making, problem solving and negotiating. 120 The program also must encourage participants to develop strong 121 peer group ties that support their mutual pursuit of skills and 122 values. All programs must establish a youth council in which participants are afforded opportunities to develop public speaking 123 124 and negotiating skills and to participate in management and policy 125 making in specific aspects of the program.

(e) A training subsidy, living allowance or stipend
that is no less than the minimum wage, which must be provided to
program participants for the time spent at the work site in
construction training. For those participants who receive public
assistance, this training subsidy, living allowance or stipend
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06/HR07/R1015 PAGE 4 (RKM\HS) 131 will not affect their housing benefits, medical benefits, child 132 care benefits or food stamp benefits. Stipends and wages may be 133 distributed in a manner that offers incentives for good 134 performance.

(2) Full-time participation in a Youthbuild program shall be
offered for a period of not less than six (6) months and not more
than twenty-four (24) months.

(3) A concentrated effort must be made to find construction, construction-related and nonconstruction jobs for all graduates of the program who have performed well. The skills training curriculum must provide participants with basic preparation for seeking and maintaining a job. Follow-up counseling and assistance in job seeking must be provided to participants for twelve (12) months following graduation from the program.

145 (4) All programs serving twenty-four (24) trainees or more 146 must have a full-time director responsible for the coordination of 147 all aspects of the Youthbuild program.

148 <u>SECTION 5.</u> Implementation grants may be used to carry out 149 the activities listed in Section 4 of this act. Other eligible 150 activities include the following:

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(a) Legal fees for housing acquisition.

(b) Administrative costs of the applicant, which may not exceed fifteen percent (15%) of the amount of assistance provided or such higher percentage as the director determines is necessary to support capacity development of a private nonprofit community-based organization.

(c) Defraying costs of the ongoing training and technical assistance needs of the recipients which are related to developing and carrying out the Youthbuild program. The director may reserve up to five percent (5%) of the Mississippi Youthbuild program appropriations to enter into a contract with Youthbuild USA to provide assistance to the director in providing training

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163 and technical assistance to, or in the management, supervision and 164 coordination of, Youthbuild programs.

165 <u>SECTION 6.</u> To be eligible to participate, an individual must 166 be at least sixteen (16), but no more than twenty-four (24) years 167 of age and must be economically disadvantaged, as defined in 29 168 USCS Section 1508, and except as otherwise provided in this 169 section, must be a member of one (1) of the following groups:

170 (a) Persons who are not attending any school and have171 not received a high school diploma or its equivalent.

(b) Persons enrolled in a traditional or alternative school setting or a GED program and who are in danger of dropping out of school.

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(c) Very low-income persons.

Up to twenty-five percent (25%) of the participants in the program may be individuals who do not meet the requirements of paragraph (a), (b) or (c) of this section but who have educational needs despite the attainment of a high school diploma.

180 <u>SECTION 7.</u> (1) Not-for-profit private agencies or public 181 agencies with experience operating a Youthbuild program or with a 182 plan to incubate a Youthbuild program until it can be established 183 as a not-for-profit private agency are eligible for funding under 184 this act.

185 (2) Priority in the awarding of funds under this act must be 186 given to applicants with experience in operating Youthbuild 187 programs. Organizations claiming to have operated Youthbuild 188 programs must be licensed by Youthbuild USA or be organizations 189 that have received federal HUD Youthbuild funding.

190 <u>SECTION 8.</u> The director shall require that an application 191 for Youthbuild funds under this act contain the following, at a 192 minimum:

(a) A request for an implementation grant, specifyingthe amount of the grant requested and its proposed uses;

No. 921 *HR07/R1015* 06/HR07/R1015 PAGE 6 (RKM\HS) (b) A description of the applicant and a statement of its qualifications, including a description of the applicant's past experience operating a Youthbuild program and with housing rehabilitation or construction and youth and youth education, youth leadership development and employment training programs, and a description of its relationship with local unions and youth apprenticeship programs and other community groups;

202 (c) A description of the proposed construction site for203 the program and evidence of site control;

204 (d) A description of the educational and job training
205 activities, work opportunities and other services that will be
206 provided to participants;

207 (e) A description of the proposed construction or
208 rehabilitation activities to be undertaken and the anticipated
209 schedule for carrying out those activities;

210 A description of the manner in which eligible (f) youths will be recruited and selected, including a description of 211 212 the arrangements that will be made with community-based organizations, local education agencies, including agencies of 213 214 Native American nations, public assistance agencies, the courts of 215 jurisdiction for status and youth offenders, shelters for homeless 216 individuals and other agencies that serve homeless youth, foster 217 care agencies, and other appropriate public and private agencies;

(g) A description of the special efforts that will be undertaken to recruit eligible young women (including young women with dependent children) with appropriate supports, especially child care;

(h) A description of how the proposed program will be coordinated with other federal, state and local activities and activities conducted by Native American nations, including public schools, national service, crime prevention programs, vocational, adult and bilingual education programs and job training;

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of adequately trained supervisory personnel in the program who
have attained the level of journeyman or its equivalent;

(j) A description of the applicant's relationship with any local building trade unions that may exist, particularly regarding the trade unions' involvement in training, and the relationship of the Youthbuild program with established apprenticeship programs;

(k) A description of activities that will be undertaken to develop the leadership skills of participants, including their role in decision making;

(1) A detailed budget and a description of the systems of fiscal controls and auditing and accountability procedures that will be used to ensure fiscal soundness;

(m) A description of any contracts and arrangements entered into between the applicant and other agencies and entities, including all in-kind donations and grants from both public and private entities which will serve to augment funds appropriated for the Mississippi Youthbuild Act;

(n) Identification and description of the financing proposed for any acquisition of the property, rehabilitation or construction;

(o) Identification and description of the entity thatwill operate and manage the property;

(p) A certification that the applicant will comply with the requirements of the Fair Housing Act, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, and that the applicant will affirmatively further fair housing; and

(q) The qualifications and past experience of theperson who will fill the full-time director position.

258 **SECTION 9.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 259 and after July 1, 2006.

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
