HOUSE BILL NO. 1465

AN ACT TO CREATE THE ABSTINENCE EDUCATION AND FETAL AWARENESS EDUCATION ACT; TO REQUIRE ABSTINENCE TO BE TAUGHT IN ALL PUBLIC ELEMENTARY, JUNIOR HIGH AND HIGH SCHOOLS; TO BRING FORWARD SECTION 41-79-5, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, WHICH PROVIDES FOR THE SCHOOL NURSE INTERVENTION PROGRAM FOR THE PURPOSES OF AMENDMENT; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

- 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- 8 **SECTION 1.** This act shall be known and may be cited as the
- 9 "Abstinence Education and Fetal Awareness Education Act."
- 10 **SECTION 2.** (1) The State of Mississippi finds that a need
- 11 exists to encourage young people to abstain from sexual
- 12 intercourse and provide education regarding the physical and
- 13 emotional health benefits of doing so within the context of the
- 14 family values that are prevalent in this state.
- 15 (2)Providing scientifically accurate pictorial information
- 16 regarding the development of the unborn child has been effective
- 17 in reducing the infant mortality rate and providing a better
- 18 understanding of the relationship between the mother and her
- 19 unborn fetus.
- 20 **SECTION 3.** (1) In addition to the curriculum otherwise
- 21 required by law or the State Board of Education, an introduction
- 22 to an abstinence class, which includes scientifically accurate
- 23 pictorial information regarding the development of the unborn
- 24 child, that must be taught as a one-semester course to all
- 25 students in the elementary and junior high schools of this state.
- 26 The course of study in abstinence must be developmentally age
- 27 appropriate and must be taught to students before graduation from
- 28 the fifth (5th) and eighth (8th) grades.

- 29 (2) The State Board of Education shall develop an
- 30 introductory course on abstinence, which includes scientifically
- 31 accurate pictorial information regarding the development of the
- 32 unborn child, that shall be required for graduation from high
- 33 school for all students beginning in the 2007-2008 school year.
- 34 The course shall equal one-half (1/2) unit of high school course
- 35 work and may incorporate any appropriate existing secondary level
- 36 courses.
- 37 **SECTION 4.** Section 41-79-5, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 38 brought forward as follows:
- 39 41-79-5. (1) There is hereby established within the State
- 40 Department of Health a school nurse intervention program,
- 41 available to all public school districts in the state.
- 42 (2) By the school year 1998-1999, each public school
- 43 district shall have employed a school nurse, to be known as a
- 44 Health Service Coordinator, pursuant to the school nurse
- 45 intervention program prescribed under this section. The school
- 46 nurse intervention program shall offer any of the following
- 47 specific preventive services, and other additional services
- 48 appropriate to each grade level and the age and maturity of the
- 49 pupils:
- 50 (a) Reproductive health education and referral to
- 51 prevent teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases, which
- 52 education shall include abstinence;
- 53 (b) Child abuse and neglect identification;
- 54 (c) Hearing and vision screening to detect problems
- 55 which can lead to serious sensory losses and behavioral and
- 56 academic problems;
- 57 (d) Alcohol, tobacco and drug abuse education to reduce
- 58 abuse of these substances;
- 59 (e) Scoliosis screening to detect this condition so
- 60 that costly and painful surgery and lifelong disability can be
- 61 prevented;

- 65 (g) Nutrition education and counseling to prevent
- obesity and/or other eating disorders which may lead to
- 67 life-threatening conditions, for example, hypertension;
- (h) Early detection and treatment of head lice to
- 69 prevent the spread of the parasite and to reduce absenteeism;
- 70 (i) Emergency treatment of injury and illness to
- 71 include controlling bleeding, managing fractures, bruises or
- 72 contusions and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR);
- 73 (j) Applying appropriate theory as the basis for
- 74 decision making in nursing practice;
- 75 (k) Establishing and maintaining a comprehensive school
- 76 health program;
- 77 (1) Developing individualized health plans;
- 78 (m) Assessing, planning, implementing and evaluating
- 79 programs and other school health activities, in collaboration with
- 80 other professionals;
- 81 (n) Providing health education to assist students,
- 82 families and groups to achieve optimal levels of wellness;
- 83 (o) Participating in peer review and other means of
- 84 evaluation to assure quality of nursing care provided for students
- 85 and assuming responsibility for continuing education and
- 86 professional development for self while contributing to the
- 87 professional growth of others;
- 88 (p) Participating with other key members of the
- 89 community responsible for assessing, planning, implementing and
- 90 evaluating school health services and community services that
- 91 include the broad continuum or promotion of primary, secondary and
- 92 tertiary prevention; and
- 93 (q) Contributing to nursing and school health through
- 94 innovations in theory and practice and participation in research.

- 95 (3) Public school nurses shall be specifically prohibited 96 from providing abortion counseling to any student or referring any 97 student to abortion counseling or abortion clinics. Any violation 98 of this subsection shall disqualify the school district employing 99 such public school nurse from receiving any state administered 100 funds under this section.
- 101 (4) Repealed.
- Beginning with the 1997-1998 school year, to the extent 102 103 that federal or state funds are available therefor and pursuant to appropriation therefor by the Legislature, in addition to the 104 105 school nurse intervention program funds administered under subsection (4), the State Department of Health shall establish and 106 107 implement a Prevention of Teen Pregnancy Pilot Program to be located in the public school districts with the highest numbers of 108 teen pregnancies. The Teen Pregnancy Pilot Program shall provide 109 the following education services directly through public school 110 nurses in the pilot school districts: health education sessions 111 112 in local schools, where contracted for or invited to provide, which target issues including reproductive health, teen pregnancy 113 114 prevention and sexually transmitted diseases, including syphilis, 115 HIV and AIDS. When these services are provided by a school nurse, 116 training and counseling on abstinence shall be included.
- In addition to the school nurse intervention program 117 funds administered under subsection (4) and the Teen Pregnancy 118 119 Pilot Program funds administered under subsection (5), to the extent that federal or state funds are available therefor and 120 121 pursuant to appropriation therefor by the Legislature, the State Department of Health shall establish and implement an Abstinence 122 Education Pilot Program to provide abstinence education, 123 124 mentoring, counseling and adult supervision to promote abstinence 125 from sexual activity, with a focus on those groups which are most 126 likely to bear children out of wedlock. Such abstinence education 127 services shall be provided by the State Department of Health

- 128 through its clinics, public health nurses, school nurses and
- 129 through contracts with rural and community health centers in order
- 130 to reach a larger number of targeted clients. For purposes of
- 131 this subsection, the term "abstinence education" means an
- 132 educational or motivational program which:
- 133 (a) Has as its exclusive purpose, teaching the social,
- 134 psychological and health gains to be realized by abstaining from
- 135 sexual activity;
- 136 (b) Teaches abstinence from sexual activity outside
- 137 marriage as the expected standard for all school-age children;
- 138 (c) Teaches that abstinence from sexual activity is the
- 139 only certain way to avoid out-of-wedlock pregnancy, sexually
- 140 transmitted diseases and other associated health problems;
- 141 (d) Teaches that a mutually faithful monogamous
- 142 relationship in context of marriage is the expected standard of
- 143 human sexual activity;
- 144 (e) Teaches that sexual activity outside of the context
- 145 of marriage is likely to have harmful psychological and physical
- 146 effects;
- 147 (f) Teaches that bearing children out of wedlock is
- 148 likely to have harmful consequences for the child, the child's
- 149 parents and society;
- 150 (g) Teaches young people how to reject sexual advances
- 151 and how alcohol and drug use increase vulnerability to sexual
- 152 advances; and
- 153 (h) Teaches the importance of attaining
- 154 self-sufficiency before engaging in sexual activity.
- 155 (7) Beginning with the 1998-1999 school year and pursuant to
- 156 appropriation therefor by the Legislature, in addition to other
- 157 funds allotted under the minimum education program, each school
- 158 district shall be allotted an additional teacher unit per every
- one hundred (100) teacher units, for the purpose of employing
- 160 qualified public school nurses in such school district, which in

- no event shall be less than one (1) teacher unit per school
 district, for such purpose. In the event the Legislature provides
 less funds than the total state funds needed for the public school
 nurse allotment, those school districts with fewer teacher units
 shall be the first funded for such purpose, to the extent of funds
 available.
- 167 (8) Prior to the 1998-1999 school year, nursing staff assigned to the program shall be employed through the local county 168 169 health department and shall be subject to the supervision of the 170 State Department of Health with input from local school officials. 171 Local county health departments may contract with any comprehensive private primary health care facilities within their 172 173 county to employ and utilize additional nursing staff. Beginning 174 with the 1998-1999 school year, nursing staff assigned to the program shall be employed by the local school district and shall 175 be designated as "health service coordinators," and shall be 176 177 required to possess a bachelor's degree in nursing as a minimum 178 qualification.
- (9) Upon each student's enrollment, the parent or guardian 179 180 shall be provided with information regarding the scope of the 181 school nurse intervention program. The parent or guardian may 182 provide the school administration with a written statement refusing all or any part of the nursing service. No child shall 183 184 be required to undergo hearing and vision or scoliosis screening 185 or any other physical examination or tests whose parent objects 186 thereto on the grounds such screening, physical examination or 187 tests are contrary to his sincerely held religious beliefs.
- 188 (10) A consent form for reproductive health education shall
 189 be sent to the parent or guardian of each student upon his
 190 enrollment. If a response from the parent or guardian is not
 191 received within seven (7) days after the consent form is sent, the
 192 school shall send a letter to the student's home notifying the
 193 parent or guardian of the consent form. If the parent or guardian

- fails to respond to the letter within ten (10) days after it is 194 195 sent, then the school principal shall be authorized to allow the 196 student to receive reproductive health education. Reproductive 197 health education shall include the teaching of total abstinence 198 from premarital sex and, wherever practicable, reproductive health 199 education should be taught in classes divided according to gender. 200 All materials used in the reproductive health education program 201 shall be placed in a convenient and easily accessible location for 202 parental inspection. School nurses shall not dispense birth 203 control pills or contraceptive devices in the school. Dispensing 204 of such shall be the responsibility of the State Department of
- 206 (11) No provision of this section shall be construed as
 207 prohibiting local school districts from accepting financial
 208 assistance of any type from the State of Mississippi or any other
 209 governmental entity, or any contribution, donation, gift, decree
 210 or bequest from any source which may be utilized for the
 211 maintenance or implementation of a school nurse intervention
 212 program in a public school system of this state.

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- 213 **SECTION 5.** Sections 1,2 and 3, of this act shall be codified 214 as a separate code section in Chapter 13, Title 37, Mississippi 215 Code of 1972.
- 216 **SECTION 6.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 217 and after July 1, 2006.
