## SENATE BILL NO. 2154

1	AN ACT TO CREATE THE MISSISSIPPI CIVIC LITERACY ACT; TO
2	REQUIRE THE TEACHING OF THE NATION'S FOUNDING AND RELATED
3	DOCUMENTS DURING THE HIGH SCHOOL YEARS; TO PROVIDE THAT BEFORE
4	RECEIVING A CERTIFICATE OR DIPLOMA OF GRADUATION FROM HIGH SCHOOL
5	STUDENTS MUST HAVE BEEN TESTED ON THEIR KNOWLEDGE OF THE
6	DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE, THE UNITED STATES CONSTITUTION AND
7	THE FEDERALIST PAPERS; TO REQUIRE THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF
8	EDUCATION TO PROMULGATE RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE
9	ADMINISTRATION OF THIS ACT; TO REQUIRE THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF
10	EDUCATION TO SUBMIT AN ANNUAL REPORT TO THE GOVERNOR AND
11	LEGISLATURE ON THE EFFECTIVENESS OF SUCH RULES AND REGULATIONS;
12	AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
13	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI

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- 14 SECTION 1. Title. This act may be cited as the Mississippi
- Civic Literacy Act. 15
- 16 SECTION 2. Findings. The Legislature finds and declares
- that: 17
- The adoption of the Declaration of Independence in (a) 18
- 1776 and the signing of the United States Constitution were 19
- principal events in the history of the United States, the 20
- 21 Declaration of Independence providing the philosophical foundation
- on which this nation rests and the Constitution of the United 22
- 23 States providing its structure of government;
- (b) The Federalist Papers embody the most eloquent and 24
- 25 forceful argument made in support of the adoption of our
- republican form of government; 26
- (c) These documents stand as the foundation of our form 27
- 28 of democracy, providing at the same time the basis of our national
- identity and the vehicle for orderly growth and change; 29
- 30 (d) Many Americans lack even the most basic knowledge
- and understanding of the history of our nation and the principles 31

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- set forth in the Declaration of Independence, codified in the 32
- 33 Constitution and defended in the Federalist Papers; and
- (e) The survival of the Republic requires that our 34
- 35 nation's children, the future quardians of its heritage and
- 36 participants in its governance, have a firm knowledge and
- 37 understanding of its principles and history.
- **SECTION 3. Purpose.** The purpose and intent of this act are: 38
- (a) To require during the high school years the 39
- teaching of the nation's founding and related documents, which 40
- shall include the Declaration of Independence, the United States 41
- 42 Constitution and the Federalist Papers; and
- (b) To require that before receiving a certificate or 43
- 44 diploma of graduation from high school, students must have been
- tested on their knowledge of the Declaration of Independence, the 45
- United States Constitution and the Federalist Papers. 46
- SECTION 4. Administration. The State Department of 47
- 48 Education shall adopt and promulgate rules and regulations for the
- 49 administration of this act. Such rules and regulations shall:
- 50 Include among the requirements for secondary school
- 51 graduation a passing grade on a test of the Declaration of
- 52 Independence, the United States Constitution and the Federalist
- 53 Papers;
- (b) Include in any standard state testing of high 54
- 55 school students questions on the contents of the Declaration of
- 56 Independence, the United States Constitution and the Federalist
- Papers; and 57
- 58 Specifically provide for curriculum content and
- 59 teacher training to ensure that the intent of this legislation is
- 60 satisfied.
- <u>SECTION 5.</u> Reporting and accountability. 61 The State
- 62 Department of Education shall submit an annual report to the
- 63 Governor and the Legislature describing the specific rules and
- regulations issued pursuant to this act and reporting the 64

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- 65 effectiveness of these rules and regulations as measured by the
- 66 passage of these courses involved pursuant to Section 3 of this
- 67 act.
- 68 **SECTION 6.** This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 69 and after July 1, 2006.
