SENATE BILL NO. 2353

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 63-7-67, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO
ALLOW EMERGENCY AND LAW ENFORCEMENT VEHICLES TO USE TIRES WITH
STUDS DURING SNOW OR ICY CONDITIONS; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
SECTION 1. Section 63-7-67, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
amended as follows:

63-7-67. Every solid rubber tire on a vehicle shall have
rubber on its entire traction surface at least one (1) inch thick
above the edge of the flange of the entire periphery.

10 No person shall operate or move on any highway any motor 11 vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer having any metal tire in contact 12 with the roadway.

13 No tire on a vehicle moved on a highway shall have on its periphery any block, stud, flange, cleat, or spike or any other 14 15 protuberances of any material other than rubber which projects beyond the tread of the traction surface of the tire. However, it 16 shall be permissible to use farm machinery with tires having 17 18 protuberances which will not injure the highway, and it shall be permissible to use tire chains of reasonable proportions upon any 19 20 vehicle when required for safety because of snow, ice, or other 21 conditions tending to cause a vehicle to skid.

It is permissible to use tires with stude on emergency and
law enforcement vehicles when required for public safety because

24 of snow, ice or other conditions causing a vehicle to skid.

The Mississippi Department of Transportation and local authorities in their respective jurisdictions may, in their discretion, issue special permits authorizing the operation upon a

highway of traction engines or tractors having movable tracks with transverse corrugations upon the periphery of such movable tracks or farm tractors or other farm machinery, the operation of which upon a highway would otherwise be prohibited under this title. **SECTION 2.** This act shall take effect and be in force from and after July 1, 2006.
