1 2 3	A RESOLUTION COMMENDING AND CELEBRATING THE LIFE OF AUTHOR, PLAYWRIGHT AND TEACHER ENDESHA IDA MAE HOLLAND, PH.D., OF GREENWOOD, MISSISSIPPI, AND EXPRESSING THE SYMPATHY OF THE SENATE.
4	WHEREAS, author, playwright, educator, nominee for the
5	Pulitzer Prize and civil rights activist Endesha Ida Mae Holland,
6	Ph.D., of Greenwood, Mississippi, passed away on Wednesday,
7	January 25, 2006, at the age of 61; and
8	WHEREAS, since early childhood, Endesha Ida Mae Holland's
9	life was touched by poverty, racism and violence; but civil
10	rights, education and love of family changed the direction of this
11	extraordinary woman's life, and we are all the richer for it; and
12	WHEREAS, in the year 1983, Ida Mae Holland added Endesha to
13	her name after she met Dr. Maulana Karenga, a scholar of African
14	history and culture, who is also the creator of Kwanza. Holland
15	added this name not only to distinguish herself from her mother
16	(for they shared the name Ida Mae) but also to symbolize the way
17	she had motivated herself and others to reach beyond where they
18	came from. Endesha is a Swahili word that means "driver - she who
19	drives herself and others forward." This name embodies all that
20	Holland stands for and all that her memoir From the Mississippi
21	Delta describes. She is a woman who drove herself through
22	terrible odds to pursue and realize her dreams; and
23	WHEREAS, in her memoir, she tells of her trials and
24	tribulations that seemed inescapable. She was kicked out of
25	school in ninth grade, and was pregnant and in jail at age
26	sixteen. Her mother constantly reminded Holland that she could
27	shape her own future. Through her own determination and the drive

28 that she had to make something of her life, Holland eventually
```

- 29 turned things around, joined the Civil Rights Movement, moved to
- 30 the Twin Cities and began college at the University of Minnesota;
- 31 and
- 32 WHEREAS, Holland graduated with her BA in African-American
- 33 studies in 1979, thirteen years after she started. She received
- 34 her Masters Degree in American Studies five years later. Two
- 35 years later, Holland was awarded her Ph.D. on May 25, 1985, from
- 36 the University of Minnesota. This was the moment that she had
- 37 been waiting for her entire life. She invited everyone that she
- 38 knew to come see just how far she had traveled from the
- 39 Mississippi Delta; and
- 40 WHEREAS, aside from her highly esteemed memoir, Holland also
- 41 wrote seven plays. The three that have received the most
- 42 recognition are From the Mississippi Delta, Second Doctor Lady,
- 43 and The Reconstruction of Dossie Ree Hemphill. The latter two
- 44 were written about Holland's mother, Ida Mae. Second Doctor Lady
- 45 is the story of her mother's struggle to become a midwife. The
- 46 Reconstruction of Dossie Ree Hemphill also tells the story of her
- 47 mother but from the perspective of her peers. From the
- 48 Mississippi Delta was inspired by her memoir. This three-woman
- 49 play has been performed across the country and has received many
- 50 positive reviews; and
- 51 WHEREAS, these works have led Holland to receive many
- 52 prestigious awards, including the First Annual Playwriting Award,
- 53 the ACTF Student Playwriting Award of the University of Minnesota,
- 54 the Second Place Lorraine Hansberry Award, and she was nominated
- 55 for a Pulitzer Prize. Also, the Mayor of Greenwood, Mississippi,
- 56 dedicated a day to her, calling it "Endesha Ida Mae 'Cat' Holland
- 57 Day" on October 18, 1991; and
- WHEREAS, Holland is survived by her son, Cedric Holland; her
- 59 sister, Jean Beasley; granddaughter; all of Buffalo, New York; and
- 60 a brother, Charlie "Bud" Nellums, of Greenwood; and
