HOUSE BILL NO. 73

1 AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 63-11-30, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, 2 TO CLARIFY THAT SECOND OR SUBSEQUENT DUI SENTENCES SHALL NOT BE 3 REDUCED; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
SECTION 1. Section 63-11-30, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
amended as follows:

7 63-11-30. (1) It is unlawful for any person to drive or otherwise operate a vehicle within this state who (a) is under the 8 influence of intoxicating liquor; (b) is under the influence of 9 any other substance which has impaired such person's ability to 10 11 operate a motor vehicle; (c) has an alcohol concentration of eight one-hundredths percent (.08%) or more for persons who are above 12 13 the legal age to purchase alcoholic beverages under state law, or two one-hundredths percent (.02%) or more for persons who are 14 15 below the legal age to purchase alcoholic beverages under state law, in the person's blood based upon grams of alcohol per one 16 hundred (100) milliliters of blood or grams of alcohol per two 17 hundred ten (210) liters of breath as shown by a chemical analysis 18 of such person's breath, blood or urine administered as authorized 19 by this chapter; (d) is under the influence of any drug or 20 controlled substance, the possession of which is unlawful under 21 the Mississippi Controlled Substances Law; or (e) has an alcohol 2.2 concentration of four one-hundredths percent (.04%) or more in the 23 person's blood, based upon grams of alcohol per one hundred (100) 24 25 milliliters of blood or grams of alcohol per two hundred ten (210) liters of breath as shown by a chemical analysis of such person's 26

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27 blood, breath or urine, administered as authorized by this chapter 28 for persons operating a commercial motor vehicle.

29 (2) (a) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (3), 30 upon conviction of any person for the first offense of violating 31 subsection (1) of this section where chemical tests provided for 32 under Section 63-11-5 were given, or where chemical test results 33 are not available, such person shall be fined not less than Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) nor more than One Thousand Dollars 34 (\$1,000.00), or imprisoned for not more than forty-eight (48) 35 36 hours in jail or both; and the court shall order such person to attend and complete an alcohol safety education program as 37 38 provided in Section 63-11-32. The court may substitute attendance at a victim impact panel instead of forty-eight (48) hours in 39 40 iail. In addition, the Department of Public Safety, the Commissioner of Public Safety or his duly authorized agent shall, 41 42 after conviction and upon receipt of the court abstract, suspend 43 the driver's license and driving privileges of such person for a 44 period of not less than ninety (90) days and until such person 45 attends and successfully completes an alcohol safety education program as herein provided; provided, however, in no event shall 46 such period of suspension exceed one (1) year. Commercial driving 47 48 privileges shall be suspended as provided in Section 63-1-83.

49 The circuit court having jurisdiction in the county in which 50 the conviction was had or the circuit court of the person's county 51 of residence may reduce the suspension of driving privileges under Section 63-11-30(2)(a) if the denial of which would constitute a 52 53 hardship on the offender, except that no court may issue such an order reducing the suspension of driving privileges under this 54 subsection until thirty (30) days have elapsed from the effective 55 56 date of the suspension. Hardships shall only apply to first offenses under Section 63-11-30(1), and shall not apply to second, 57 58 third or subsequent convictions of any person violating subsection 59 (1) of this section. A reduction of suspension on the basis of

At any time following at least thirty (30) days of suspension for a first offense violation of this section, the court may grant the person hardship driving privileges upon written petition of

97 (iii) Obtain necessary medical care.
98 Proof of the hardship shall be established by clear and
99 convincing evidence which shall be supported by independent

101 (b) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (3), 102 upon any second conviction of any person violating subsection (1) 103 of this section, the offenses being committed within a period of 104 five (5) years, such person shall be fined not less than Six 105 Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) nor more than One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00), shall be imprisoned not less than five (5) 106 107 days nor more than one (1) year and sentenced to community service 108 work for not less than ten (10) days nor more than one (1) year. 109 The sentence and penalties for a second offense shall not be 110 suspended or reduced by the court and no prosecutor shall offer 111 any suspension or sentence reduction as part of a plea bargain. 112 Except as may otherwise be provided by paragraph (d) of this 113 subsection, the Commissioner of Public Safety shall suspend the 114 driver's license of such person for two (2) years. Suspension of 115 a commercial driver's license shall be governed by Section 116 63-1-83. Upon any second conviction as described in this paragraph, the court shall ascertain whether the defendant is 117 118 married, and if the defendant is married shall obtain the name and 119 address of the defendant's spouse; the clerk of the court shall submit this information to the Department of Public Safety. 120 121 Further, the commissioner shall notify in writing, by certified mail, return receipt requested, the owner of the vehicle and the 122 123 spouse, if any, of the person convicted of the second violation of 124 the possibility of forfeiture of the vehicle if such person is

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126 The owner of the vehicle and the spouse shall be considered
127 notified under this paragraph if the notice is deposited in the
128 United States mail and any claim that the notice was not in fact
129 received by the addressee shall not affect a subsequent forfeiture
130 proceeding.

For any second or subsequent conviction of any person under this section, the person shall also be subject to the penalties set forth in Section 63-11-31.

134 (c) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (3), for 135 any third or subsequent conviction of any person violating subsection (1) of this section, the offenses being committed 136 137 within a period of five (5) years, such person shall be guilty of 138 a felony and fined not less than Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) nor more than Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), shall serve not 139 140 less than one (1) year nor more than five (5) years in the custody 141 of the Department of Corrections; provided, however, that for any 142 such offense which does not result in serious injury or death to 143 any person, any sentence of incarceration may be served in the 144 county jail rather than in the State Penitentiary at the 145 discretion of the circuit court judge. The sentence and penalties 146 for a third or subsequent offense shall not be suspended or 147 reduced by the court and no prosecutor shall offer any suspension or sentence reduction as part of a plea bargain. 148 The law 149 enforcement agency shall seize the vehicle operated by any person 150 charged with a third or subsequent violation of subsection (1) of 151 this section, if such convicted person was driving the vehicle at 152 the time the offense was committed. Such vehicle may be forfeited 153 in the manner provided by Sections 63-11-49 through 63-11-53. 154 Except as may otherwise be provided by paragraph (e) of this subsection, the Commissioner of Public Safety shall suspend the 155 156 driver's license of such person for five (5) years. The

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157 suspension of a commercial driver's license shall be governed by 158 Section 63-1-83.

(d) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (3), any 159 160 person convicted of a second violation of subsection (1) of this 161 section shall receive an in-depth diagnostic assessment, and if as 162 a result of such assessment is determined to be in need of 163 treatment of his alcohol and/or drug abuse problem, such person shall successfully complete treatment of his alcohol and/or drug 164 abuse problem at a program site certified by the Department of 165 166 Mental Health. Such person shall be eligible for reinstatement of 167 his driving privileges upon the successful completion of such treatment after a period of one (1) year after such person's 168 169 driver's license is suspended. Each person who receives a 170 diagnostic assessment shall pay a fee representing the cost of such assessment. Each person who participates in a treatment 171 172 program shall pay a fee representing the cost of such treatment.

173 (e) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (3), any person convicted of a third or subsequent violation of subsection 174 175 (1) of this section shall receive an in-depth diagnostic assessment, and if as a result of such assessment is determined to 176 177 be in need of treatment of his alcohol and/or drug abuse problem, 178 such person shall enter an alcohol and/or drug abuse program 179 approved by the Department of Mental Health for treatment of such 180 person's alcohol and/or drug abuse problem. If such person 181 successfully completes such treatment, such person shall be 182 eligible for reinstatement of his driving privileges after a 183 period of three (3) years after such person's driver's license is 184 suspended.

(f) The Department of Public Safety shall promulgate rules and regulations for the use of interlock ignition devices as provided in Section 63-11-31 and consistent with the provisions therein. Such rules and regulations shall provide for the calibration of such devices and shall provide that the cost of the

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193 (3) (a) This subsection shall be known and may be cited as 194 Zero Tolerance for Minors. The provisions of this subsection 195 shall apply only when a person under the age of twenty-one (21) 196 years has a blood alcohol concentration of two one-hundredths 197 percent (.02%) or more, but lower than eight one-hundredths percent (.08%). If such person's blood alcohol concentration is 198 199 eight one-hundredths percent (.08%) or more, the provisions of 200 subsection (2) shall apply.

(b) Upon conviction of any person under the age of 201 202 twenty-one (21) years for the first offense of violating 203 subsection (1) of this section where chemical tests provided for 204 under Section 63-11-5 were given, or where chemical test results 205 are not available, such person shall have his driver's license 206 suspended for ninety (90) days and shall be fined Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00); and the court shall order such person to 207 208 attend and complete an alcohol safety education program as provided in Section 63-11-32. The court may also require 209 210 attendance at a victim impact panel.

211 The court in the county in which the conviction was had or 212 the circuit court of the person's county of residence may reduce 213 the suspension of driving privileges under Section 63-11-30(2)(a) 214 if the denial of which would constitute a hardship on the offender, except that no court may issue such an order reducing 215 216 the suspension of driving privileges under this subsection until 217 thirty (30) days have elapsed from the effective date of the suspension. Hardships shall only apply to first offenses under 218 219 Section 63-11-30(1), and shall not apply to second, third or subsequent convictions of any person violating subsection (1) of 220 221 this section. A reduction of suspension on the basis of hardship 222 shall not be available to any person who refused to submit to a

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chemical test upon the request of a law enforcement officer as 223 224 provided in Section 63-11-5. When the petition is filed, such 225 person shall pay to the circuit clerk of the court where the 226 petition is filed a fee of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00), which shall be 227 deposited into the State General Fund to the credit of a special 228 fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be used for alcohol 229 or drug abuse treatment and education, upon appropriation by the Legislature. This fee shall be in addition to any other court 230 costs or fees required for the filing of petitions. 231

232 The petition filed under the provisions of this subsection 233 shall contain the specific facts which the petitioner alleges to constitute a hardship and the driver's license number of the 234 petitioner. (c) Upon any second conviction of any person under the age of twenty-one (21) years violating subsection (1) of this section, the offenses being committed within a period of five (5) years, such person shall be fined not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) and shall have his driver's license suspended for one (1) year.

(d) For any third or subsequent conviction of any person under the age of twenty-one (21) years violating subsection (1) of this section, the offenses being committed within a period of five (5) years, such person shall be fined not more than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) and shall have his driver's license suspended until he reaches the age of twenty-one (21) or for two (2) years, whichever is longer.

276 Any person under the age of twenty-one (21) years (e) 277 convicted of a second violation of subsection (1) of this section, 278 may have the period that his driver's license is suspended reduced 279 if such person receives an in-depth diagnostic assessment, and as 280 a result of such assessment is determined to be in need of 281 treatment of his alcohol and/or drug abuse problem and successfully completes treatment of his alcohol and/or drug abuse 282 283 problem at a program site certified by the Department of Mental Such person shall be eligible for reinstatement of his 284 Health. 285 driving privileges upon the successful completion of such 286 treatment after a period of six (6) months after such person's 287 driver's license is suspended. Each person who receives a 288 diagnostic assessment shall pay a fee representing the cost of

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(f) Any person under the age of twenty-one (21) years convicted of a third or subsequent violation of subsection (1) of this section shall complete treatment of an alcohol and/or drug abuse program at a site certified by the Department of Mental Health.

The court shall have the discretion to rule that a 296 (g) 297 first offense of this subsection by a person under the age of 298 twenty-one (21) years shall be nonadjudicated. Such person shall 299 be eligible for nonadjudication only once. The Department of 300 Public Safety shall maintain a confidential registry of all cases 301 which are nonadjudicated as provided in this paragraph. A judge 302 who rules that a case is nonadjudicated shall forward such ruling to the Department of Public Safety. Judges and prosecutors 303 304 involved in implied consent violations shall have access to the 305 confidential registry for the purpose of determining 306 nonadjudication eligibility. A record of a person who has been 307 nonadjudicated shall be maintained for five (5) years or until 308 such person reaches the age of twenty-one (21) years. Any person 309 whose confidential record has been disclosed in violation of this 310 paragraph shall have a civil cause of action against the person 311 and/or agency responsible for such disclosure.

(4) In addition to the other penalties provided in this section, every person refusing a law enforcement officer's request to submit to a chemical test of his breath as provided in this chapter, or who was unconscious at the time of a chemical test and refused to consent to the introduction of the results of such test in any prosecution, shall suffer an additional suspension of driving privileges as follows:

The Commissioner of Public Safety or his authorized agent shall suspend the driver's license or permit to drive or deny the issuance of a license or permit to such person as provided for

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first, second and third or subsequent offenders in subsection (2) of this section. Such suspension shall be in addition to any suspension imposed pursuant to subsection (1) of Section 63-11-23. The minimum suspension imposed under this subsection shall not be reduced and no prosecutor is authorized to offer a reduction of such suspension as part of a plea bargain.

(5) Every person who operates any motor vehicle in violation 328 of the provisions of subsection (1) of this section and who in a 329 negligent manner causes the death of another or mutilates, 330 331 disfigures, permanently disables or destroys the tongue, eye, lip, 332 nose or any other limb, organ or member of another shall, upon 333 conviction, be guilty of a separate felony for each such death, mutilation, disfigurement or other injury and shall be committed 334 335 to the custody of the State Department of Corrections for a period of time of not less than five (5) years and not to exceed 336 337 twenty-five (25) years for each such death, mutilation, 338 disfigurement or other injury, and the imprisonment for the second 339 or each subsequent conviction, in the discretion of the court, 340 shall commence either at the termination of the imprisonment for 341 the preceding conviction or run concurrently with the preceding 342 conviction. Any person charged with causing the death of another 343 as described in this subsection shall be required to post bail 344 before being released after arrest.

345 (6) Upon conviction of any violation of subsection (1) of 346 this section, the trial judge shall sign in the place provided on 347 the traffic ticket, citation or affidavit stating that the person 348 arrested either employed an attorney or waived his right to an attorney after having been properly advised. If the person 349 arrested employed an attorney, the name, address and telephone 350 351 number of the attorney shall be written on the ticket, citation or affidavit. The judge shall cause a copy of the traffic ticket, 352 353 citation or affidavit, and any other pertinent documents 354 concerning the conviction, to be sent to the Commissioner of

A copy of the traffic ticket, citation or affidavit and any other pertinent documents, having been attested as true and correct by the Commissioner of Public Safety, or his designee, shall be sufficient proof of the conviction for purposes of determining the enhanced penalty for any subsequent convictions of violations of subsection (1) of this section.

361 (7) Convictions in other states of violations for driving or operating a vehicle while under the influence of an intoxicating 362 liquor or while under the influence of any other substance that 363 364 has impaired the person's ability to operate a motor vehicle 365 occurring after July 1, 1992, shall be counted for the purposes of determining if a violation of subsection (1) of this section is a 366 367 first, second, third or subsequent offense and the penalty that 368 shall be imposed upon conviction for a violation of subsection (1) 369 of this section.

370 For the purposes of determining how to impose the (8) 371 sentence for a second, third or subsequent conviction under this section, the indictment shall not be required to enumerate 372 373 previous convictions. It shall only be necessary that the 374 indictment state the number of times that the defendant has been 375 convicted and sentenced within the past five (5) years under this 376 section to determine if an enhanced penalty shall be imposed. The 377 amount of fine and imprisonment imposed in previous convictions 378 shall not be considered in calculating offenses to determine a 379 second, third or subsequent offense of this section.

380 (9) Any person under the legal age to obtain a license to 381 operate a motor vehicle convicted under this section shall not be 382 eligible to receive such license until the person reaches the age 383 of eighteen (18) years.

384 (10) Suspension of driving privileges for any person 385 convicted of violations of Section 63-11-30(1) shall run 386 consecutively.

389 **SECTION 2.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 390 and after July 1, 2007.
