HOUSE BILL NO. 77

AN ACT TO PROVIDE THAT ANY PERSON WHO IS REQUIRED TO REPORT CASES OF SUSPECTED ABUSE UNDER THE MISSISSIPPI VULNERABLE ADULTS ACT AND HAS REASONABLE CAUSE TO SUSPECT THAT AN ADULT HAS DIED AS 3 A RESULT OF THE ABUSE, MUST REPORT THAT FACT TO THE APPROPRIATE MEDICAL EXAMINER OR CORONER; TO REQUIRE LONG-TERM CARE FACILITIES TO REPORT TO THE APPROPRIATE MEDICAL EXAMINER OR CORONER ALL 6 7 DEATHS OF RESIDENTS OF THE FACILITY; TO REQUIRE HOSPITALS TO 8 REPORT TO THE APPROPRIATE MEDICAL EXAMINER OR CORONER ALL DEATHS 9 OF INDIVIDUALS IN THE HOSPITAL WHO WERE RESIDENTS OF A LONG-TERM FACILITY WITHIN FIVE DAYS OF ENTERING THE HOSPITAL; TO AMEND 10 SECTION 43-47-7, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, IN CONFORMITY WITH THE 11 PROVISIONS OF THIS ACT; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 12

- 13 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- **SECTION 1.** (1) Any person or official who is required to 14 15 report cases of suspected abuse of adults under the provisions of the Mississippi Vulnerable Adults Act and who has reasonable cause 16 17 to suspect that an adult has died as a result of abuse, sexual 18 abuse or negligence, shall report that fact to the appropriate
- 20 (2) In all cases of the death of a long-term care facility 21 resident or a hospice facility resident, the long-term care facility or the hospice facility shall immediately report the 22 death to the appropriate medical examiner or coroner. The report 2.3 is required regardless of whether the facility believes the death 24 25 to be from natural causes or the result of abuse, sexual abuse,
- (3) In all cases of the death of an individual in a hospital 27 who was a resident of a long-term care facility within five (5) 28 days of entering the hospital, the hospital shall immediately 29 30 report the death to the appropriate medical examiner or coroner. The report is required regardless of whether the facility believes 31

- 34 (4) (a) The medical examiner or coroner shall accept the
- 35 report for investigation and, upon finding reasonable cause to
- 36 suspect that an adult has died as a result of abuse, sexual abuse
- 37 or negligence, shall report his findings to the police and the
- 38 appropriate prosecuting attorney. If the institution making the
- 39 report is a hospital or nursing home, the medical examiner or
- 40 coroner shall report his findings to the hospital or nursing home
- 41 unless the findings are part of a pending or ongoing law
- 42 enforcement investigation.
- 43 (b) The medical examiner, coroner or hospital shall
- 44 also report the findings to the Department of Human Services when:
- 45 (i) Reasonable cause exists to believe the death
- 46 resulted from abuse, neglect or exploitation of an adult; or
- 47 (ii) There is a pending investigation concerning
- 48 allegations of abuse or neglect occurring before death, upon
- 49 request of the department.
- 50 **SECTION 2.** Section 43-47-7, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 51 amended as follows:
- 52 43-47-7. (1) (a) Except as otherwise provided by Section
- 53 43-47-37 for vulnerable adults in care facilities, any person
- 54 including, but not limited to, the following, who knows or
- 55 suspects that a vulnerable adult has been or is being abused,
- 56 neglected or exploited shall immediately report such knowledge or
- 57 suspicion to the Department of Human Services or to the county
- 58 department of human services where the vulnerable adult is
- 59 located:
- 60 (i) Attorney, physician, osteopathic physician,
- 61 medical examiner, chiropractor or nurse engaged in the admission,
- 62 examination, care or treatment of vulnerable adults;
- (ii) Health professional or mental health
- 64 professional other than one listed in subparagraph (i);

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- (iii) Practitioner who relies solely on spiritual
- 66 means for healing;
- 67 (iv) Social worker, family protection worker,
- 68 family protection specialist or other professional adult care,
- 69 residential or institutional staff;
- 70 (v) State, county or municipal criminal justice
- 71 employee or law enforcement officer;
- 72 (vi) Human rights advocacy committee or long-term
- 73 care ombudsman council member; or
- 74 (vii) Accountant, stockbroker, financial advisor
- 75 or consultant, insurance agent or consultant, investment advisor
- 76 or consultant, financial planner, or any officer or employee of a
- 77 bank, savings and loan, credit union or any other financial
- 78 service provider.
- 79 (b) To the extent possible, a report made pursuant to
- 80 paragraph (a) must contain, but need not be limited to, the
- 81 following information:
- 82 (i) Name, age, race, sex, physical description and
- 83 location of each vulnerable adult alleged to have been abused,
- 84 neglected or exploited.
- 85 (ii) Names, addresses and telephone numbers of the
- 86 vulnerable adult's family members.
- 87 (iii) Name, address and telephone number of each
- 88 alleged perpetrator.
- 89 (iv) Name, address and telephone number of the
- 90 caregiver of the vulnerable adult, if different from the alleged
- 91 perpetrator.
- 92 (v) Description of the neglect, exploitation,
- 93 physical or psychological injuries sustained.
- 94 (vi) Actions taken by the reporter, if any, such
- 95 as notification of the criminal justice agency.

96 (vii) Any other information available to the 97 reporting person which may establish the cause of abuse, neglect 98 or exploitation that occurred or is occurring. 99 In addition to the above, any person or entity holding or 100 required to hold a license as specified in Title 73, Professions 101 and Vocations, Mississippi Code of 1972, shall be required to give 102 his, her or its name, address and telephone number in the report of the alleged abuse, neglect or exploitation. 103 The department, or its designees, shall report to 104 105 an appropriate criminal investigative or prosecutive authority any 106 person required by this section to report or who fails to comply 107 with this section. A person who fails to make a report as 108 required under this subsection or who, because of the 109 circumstances, should have known or suspected beyond a reasonable doubt that a vulnerable adult suffers from exploitation, abuse, 110 111 neglect or self-neglect but who knowingly fails to comply with 112 this section shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine not exceeding Five Thousand 113 114 Dollars (\$5,000.00), or by imprisonment in the county jail for not 115 more than six (6) months, or both such fine and imprisonment. 116 However, for purposes of this subsection (1), any recognized legal financial transaction shall not be considered cause to report the 117 118 knowledge or suspicion of the financial exploitation of a 119 vulnerable adult. If a person convicted under this section is a 120 member of a profession or occupation that is licensed, certified or regulated by the state, the court shall notify the appropriate 121 122 licensing, certifying or regulating entity of the conviction. 123 (2) Reports received by law enforcement authorities or other agencies shall be forwarded immediately to the Department of Human 124 125 Services or the county department of human services. Department of Human Services shall investigate the reported abuse, 126 127 neglect or exploitation immediately and shall file a preliminary report of its findings with the Office of the Attorney General 128

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- within forty-eight (48) hours, and shall make additional reports
 as new information or evidence becomes available. The Department
 of Human Services, upon request, shall forward a statement to the
- 132 person making the initial report required by this section as to
- 133 what action is being taken, if any.
- 134 (3) The report may be made orally or in writing, but where
- 135 made orally, it shall be followed up by a written report. A
- 136 person who fails to report or to otherwise comply with this
- 137 section, as provided herein, shall have no civil or criminal
- 138 liability, other than that expressly provided for in this section,
- 139 to any person or entity in connection with any failure to report
- 140 or to otherwise comply with the requirements of this section.
- 141 (4) Anyone who makes a report required by this section or
- 142 who testifies or participates in any judicial proceedings arising
- 143 from the report or who participates in a required investigation or
- 144 evaluation shall be presumed to be acting in good faith and in so
- 145 doing shall be immune from liability, civil or criminal, that
- 146 might otherwise be incurred or imposed. However, the immunity
- 147 provided under this subsection shall not apply to any suspect or
- 148 perpetrator of any abuse, neglect or exploitation.
- 149 (5) A person who intentionally makes a false report under
- 150 the provisions of this section may be found liable in a civil suit
- 151 for any actual damages suffered by the person or persons so
- 152 reported and for any punitive damages set by the court or jury.
- 153 (6) The Executive Director of Human Services shall establish
- 154 a statewide central register of reports made pursuant to this
- 155 section. The central register shall be capable of receiving
- 156 reports of vulnerable adults in need of protective services seven
- 157 (7) days a week, twenty-four (24) hours a day. To effectuate this
- 158 purpose, the executive director shall establish a single toll-free
- 159 statewide phone number that all persons may use to report
- 160 vulnerable adults in need of protective services, and that all
- 161 persons authorized by subsection (7) of this section may use for

determining the existence of prior reports in order to evaluate 162 163 the condition or circumstances of the vulnerable adult before 164 Such oral reports and evidence of previous reports shall be 165 transmitted to the appropriate county department of human 166 services. The central register shall include, but not be limited 167 to, the following information: the name and identifying 168 information of the individual reported, the county department of 169 human services responsible for the investigation of each such report, the names, affiliations and purposes of any person 170 171 requesting or receiving information which the executive director believes might be helpful in the furtherance of the purposes of 172 173 this chapter, the name, address, birth date, social security 174 number of the perpetrator of abuse, neglect and/or exploitation, 175 and the type of abuse, neglect and/or exploitation of which there was substantial evidence upon investigation of the report. 176 177 central register shall inform the person making reports required 178 under this section of his or her right to request statements from 179 the department as to what action is being taken, if any. 180 Each person, business, organization or other entity, whether public or private, operated for profit, operated for nonprofit or 181 182 a voluntary unit of government not responsible for law enforcement 183 providing care, supervision or treatment of vulnerable adults 184 shall conduct criminal history records checks on each new employee of the entity who provides, and/or would provide direct patient 185 186 care or services to adults or vulnerable persons, as provided in 187 Section 43-11-13. 188 The department shall not release data that would be harmful or detrimental to the vulnerable adult or that would identify or 189 locate a person who, in good faith, made a report or cooperated in 190 191 a subsequent investigation unless ordered to do so by a court of 192 competent jurisdiction.

(7) Reports made pursuant to this section, reports written

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- 195 the Department of Human Services or the county department of human
- 196 services shall be confidential and shall only be made available
- 197 to:
- 198 (a) A physician who has before him a vulnerable adult
- 199 whom he reasonably suspects may be abused, neglected or exploited,
- 200 as defined in Section 43-47-5;
- 201 (b) A duly authorized agency having the responsibility
- 202 for the care or supervision of a subject of the report;
- 203 (c) A grand jury or a court of competent jurisdiction,
- 204 upon finding that the information in the record is necessary for
- 205 the determination of charges before the grand jury;
- 206 (d) A district attorney or other law enforcement
- 207 official.
- Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph (b) of this
- 209 subsection, the department may not disclose a report of the
- 210 abandonment, exploitation, abuse, neglect or self-neglect of a
- 211 vulnerable adult to the vulnerable adult's quardian,
- 212 attorney-in-fact, surrogate decision maker, or caregiver who is a
- 213 perpetrator or alleged perpetrator of the abandonment,
- 214 exploitation, abuse or neglect of the vulnerable adult.
- 215 Any person given access to the names or other information
- 216 identifying the subject of the report, except the subject of the
- 217 report, shall not divulge or make public such identifying
- 218 information unless he is a district attorney or other law
- 219 enforcement official and the purpose is to initiate court action.
- 220 Any person who willfully permits the release of any data or
- 221 information obtained pursuant to this section to persons or
- 222 agencies not permitted to such access by this section shall be
- 223 guilty of a misdemeanor.
- 224 (8) Upon reasonable cause to believe that a caretaker or
- 225 other person has abused, neglected or exploited a vulnerable
- 226 adult, the department shall promptly notify the district attorney
- 227 of the county in which the vulnerable adult is located and the

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- 229 43-47-37(2).
- 230 (9) Any person who makes a report under this section shall
- 231 comply with the provisions of Section 1 of this act.
- 232 **SECTION 3.** This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 233 and after July 1, 2007.
