## HOUSE BILL NO. 984

1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9	AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 37-11-18.1, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO INCREASE THE NUMBER OF OCCASIONS DURING A SCHOOL YEAR WHICH A STUDENT MUST PARTICIPATE IN DISRUPTIVE BEHAVIOR IN ORDER TO BE DEEMED "HABITUALLY DISRUPTIVE," TO ESTABLISH CERTAIN REQUIREMENTS FOR BEHAVIOR MODIFICATION PLANS DEVELOPED FOR DISRUPTIVE STUDENTS, TO REQUIRE THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO TRACK THE NUMBER OF STUDENTS WHO ARE EXPELLED FROM PUBLIC SCHOOLS AS HABITUALLY DISRUPTIVE, AND TO DELETE THE REPEALER ON THE PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE EXPULSION OF HABITUALLY DISRUPTIVE STUDENTS; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
11	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
12	SECTION 1. Section 37-11-18.1, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
13	amended as follows:
14	37-11-18.1. (1) For the purposes of this section:
15	(a) The term "disruptive behavior" means conduct of a
16	student that is so unruly, disruptive or abusive that it seriously
17	interferes with a school teacher's or school administrator's
18	ability to communicate with the students in a classroom, with a
19	student's ability to learn, or with the operation of a school or
20	school-related activity, and which is not covered by other laws
21	related to violence or possession of weapons or controlled
22	substances on school property, school vehicles or at
23	school-related activities. Such behaviors include, but are not
24	limited to: foul, profane, obscene, threatening, defiant or
25	abusive language or action toward teachers or other school
26	employees; defiance, ridicule or verbal attack of a teacher; and
27	willful, deliberate and overt acts of disobedience of the
28	directions of a teacher; and
29	(b) The term "habitually disruptive" refers to such
30	actions of a student which cause disruption in a classroom, on

school property or vehicles or at a school-related activity on

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- 32 more than three (3) occasions during a school year, and to
- 33 disruptive behavior that was initiated, willful and overt on the
- 34 part of the student and which required the attention of school
- 35 personnel to deal with the disruption. However, no student shall
- 36 be considered to be habitually disruptive before the development
- 37 of a behavior modification plan for the student in accordance with
- 38 the code of student conduct and discipline plans of the school
- 39 district.
- 40 (2) Every behavior modification plan written pursuant to
- 41 this section must be developed by a licensed behavior specialist
- 42 or psychologist and utilize evidence-based practices and positive
- 43 behavioral intervention supports. The plan must be implemented no
- 44 later than two (2) weeks after the occurrence of the disruptive
- 45 behavior.
- 46 (3) Any student who is thirteen (13) years of age or older
- 47 for whom a behavior modification plan is developed by the school
- 48 principal, reporting teacher and student's parent and which
- 49 student does not comply with the plan shall be deemed habitually
- 50 disruptive and subject to \* \* \* expulsion on the occurrence of the
- 51 <u>fourth</u> act of disruptive behavior during a school year. After the
- 52 second act of disruptive behavior during a school year by a
- 53 student \* \* \*, a psychological evaluation shall be performed upon
- 54 the child.
- 55 (4) The State Department of Education shall track the number
- of students who are expelled as habitually disruptive students
- 57 under this section. Each local school district must report all
- 58 expulsions, including the basis for each expulsion, to the State
- 59 <u>Department of Education.</u>

- 61 **SECTION 2.** This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 62 and after July 1, 2007.
