HOUSE BILL NO. 1465

AN ACT TO ESTABLISH THE MISSISSIPPI RURAL PHYSICIANS SCHOLARS PROGRAM FOR THE PURPOSE OF RECRUITING AND TRAINING QUALIFIED 3 PERSONS TO PRACTICE MEDICINE IN RURAL AREAS OF THE STATE; TO CREATE THE MISSISSIPPI ACCESS TO RURAL PHYSICIANS SCHOLARS COMMISSION TO ADMINISTER THE PROGRAM; TO ESTABLISH A BOARD FOR THE 6 MISSISSIPPI ACCESS TO RURAL PHYSICIANS SCHOLARS COMMISSION AND TO 7 PRESCRIBE ITS POWERS AND DUTIES; TO PROVIDE THAT THE COMMISSION SHALL BE HOUSED IN THE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE AT THE UNIVERSITY OF MISSISSIPPI MEDICAL CENTER; TO PRESCRIBE THE ELIGIBILITY 8 9 REQUIREMENTS FOR UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS SEEKING ENTRY INTO THE 10 11 PROGRAM; TO PROVIDE FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF A PROCESS IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF MISSISSIPPI SCHOOL OF MEDICINE 12 WHICH WOULD FACILITATE EARLY ADMISSION OF QUALIFIED PROGRAM 13 PARTICIPANTS TO THE UNIVERSITY OF MISSISSIPPI SCHOOL OF MEDICINE; 14 TO AUTHORIZE THE COMMISSION TO PROVIDE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO 15 16 PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS IN UNDERGRADUATE AND MEDICAL SCHOOL AND RESIDENCY; TO REQUIRE MEDICAL SCHOOL PARTICIPANTS TO ENTER AND 17 COMPLETE FAMILY MEDICINE OR OTHER GENERALIST RESIDENCY PROGRAMS; TO REQUIRE PARTICIPANTS TO PRACTICE MEDICINE AS FAMILY PHYSICIANS 18 19 OR OTHER GENERALIST PHYSICIANS IN A RURAL OR HEALTH PROFESSIONAL 20 21 SHORTAGE AREA OR MEDICALLY UNDERSERVED AREA OF THE STATE FOR THE NUMBER OF YEARS, NOT TO EXCEED FIVE, WHICH CORRESPONDS TO THE NUMBER OF YEARS THAT THE PARTICIPANT RECEIVED FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE THROUGH THE PROGRAM; TO REQUIRE PARTICIPANTS WHO FAIL TO COMPLETE 22 23 24 25 THEIR FAMILY MEDICINE OR GENERALIST RESIDENCY AND PRACTICE OBLIGATIONS TO REPAY, ON A PRO RATA BASIS, ANY FINANCIAL 26 ASSISTANCE RECEIVED THROUGH THE PROGRAM PLUS PENALTIES; TO REQUIRE 27 THE COMMISSION TO ENDEAVOR TO ESTABLISH AN INITIAL PRACTICE ENTRY 28 SUPPORT SYSTEM; TO PROVIDE THAT THE COMMISSION AND ITS BOARD HAVE 29 30 NO AUTHORITY OVER ANY PROGRAMS OTHER THAN THE MISSISSIPPI RURAL 31 PHYSICIANS SCHOLARS PROGRAM; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 32 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: SECTION 1. There is established the Mississippi Rural Health 33 34 Scholars Program for the purpose of identifying and recruiting qualified university and college students from rural areas of the 35 state for medical or osteopathic school matriculation. The 36 program shall consist of three (3) distinct phases through which 37 participants will progress, including: 38 39 (a) Undergraduate premedical education;

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(b) Medical or osteopathic school and residency; and

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(c) Post residency entry into medical practice in a
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    rural or underserved area of the State of Mississippi.
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         SECTION 2. (1) The Rural Physicians Scholars Program shall
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    be administered by a commission to be known as the "Mississippi
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    Access to Rural Physicians Scholars Commission."

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    shall be directed by a board composed of the following members:

                   Two (2) generalist physicians appointed by and from
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    the membership of the Mississippi State Medical Association, the
    term of which shall be three (3) years and may be reappointed for
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    one (1) additional term;
               (b) One (1) generalist physician appointed by and from
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    the membership of each of the following organizations, the term of
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    which shall be three (3) years and may be reappointed for one (1)
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    additional term:

                   Two (2) designees of the Dean of the University of
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    Mississippi School of Medicine whose terms are at the discretion
    of the dean, at least one (1) of whom is a member of the
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    University of Mississippi School of Medicine Admissions Committee;
                  Two (2) medical students, one (1) of whom shall be
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    selected yearly through a process developed by the dean of the
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    School of Medicine in consultation with the chairs of the
    departments of family medicine, internal medicine, OB-GYN, and
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    pediatrics, and one (1) of whom shall be nominated for a one (1)
    year term by the Mississippi Chapter of the Student National
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- 74 Medical Association and approved by the dean of the University of
- 75 Mississippi School of Medicine.
- 76 (e) A member of the Board of Trustees of State
- 77 Institutions of Higher Learning; and
- 78 (f) The Chair of the Department of Family Medicine at
- 79 the University of Mississippi School of Medicine.
- 80 (2) The premedical advisors from the accredited four-year
- 81 colleges and universities in the state and the directors or
- 82 designees of the primary care generalist training programs in the
- 83 State of Mississippi shall comprise an advisory committee to the
- 84 board to assist the board in its administration of the Rural
- 85 Physicians Scholars Program.
- 86 (3) Vacancies on the board must be filled in a manner
- 87 consistent with the original appointments.
- 88 (4) All appointments to the board must be made no later than
- 89 September 1, 2007. After the members are appointed, the board
- 90 shall meet on a date mutually agreed upon by a majority of the
- 91 members for the purposes of organizing the board and establishing
- 92 rules for transacting its business. A majority of the members of
- 93 the board shall constitute a quorum at all board meetings. An
- 94 affirmative vote of a majority of the members present and voting
- 95 shall be required in the adoption of rules, reports and in any
- 96 other actions taken by the board. At the organizational meeting,
- 97 the board shall elect a chair and vice chair from the members
- 98 appointed according to paragraphs (a) through (d) of subsection
- 99 (1). The chair shall serve for a term of two (2) years, upon the
- 100 expiration of which the vice chair shall assume the office of
- 101 chair.
- 102 (5) After the organizational meeting, the board shall hold
- 103 no less than two (2) meetings annually.
- 104 (6) The committee may form an executive committee for the
- 105 purpose of transacting business that must be conducted before the
- 106 next regularly scheduled meeting of the board. All actions taken

- 107 by the executive committee must be ratified by the board at its
 108 next regularly scheduled meeting.
- (7) Members of the board shall serve without compensation but may be reimbursed, subject to the availability of funding, for mileage and actual and necessary expenses incurred in attending
- 112 meetings of the board.
- 113 (8) The commission shall be at the University of Mississippi
- 114 Medical Center. Funding any required staff support and operation
- 115 must be from monies appropriated for the Rural Physicians Scholars
- 116 Program and not for the University of Mississippi Medical Center.
- 117 **SECTION 3.** The board of the Mississippi Access to Rural
- 118 Physicians Scholars Commission shall have the following powers and
- 119 duties:
- 120 (a) Developing the administrative policy for the
- 121 commission and the Rural Physicians Scholars Program;
- 122 (b) Developing and implementing strategies and
- 123 activities for the identification and recruitment of students and
- 124 for marketing the program and for the implementation of the
- 125 program. In developing these strategies, the board shall seek the
- 126 input of various organizations and entities, including the
- 127 Mississippi State Medical Association, the Mississippi Academy of
- 128 Family Physicians, the Mississippi Chapters of the American
- 129 College of Physicians, American Academy of Pediatrics, and
- 130 American College of OB-GYN, the Mississippi Medical and Surgical
- 131 Association and the Mississippi Osteopathic Medicine Association;
- 132 (c) Establishing a budget to support the activities of
- 133 the program and periodically reviewing and if appropriate,
- 134 revising, the scholarship and other stipends offered through the
- 135 program;
- 136 (d) Reviewing participants' progress in the program and
- 137 mentoring students and physicians participating in the program;
- 138 (e) Developing and participating in programs that
- 139 provide initial practice support in collaboration with other

- 140 interested professional organizations. All funding for practice
- 141 support must be separate from UMMC funding and not under UMMC
- 142 control.
- 143 **SECTION 4.** (1) The board shall develop and implement
- 144 policies and procedures designed to recruit, identify and enroll
- 145 undergraduate students who demonstrate necessary interest,
- 146 commitment, aptitude and academic achievement to pursue careers as
- 147 family physicians or other generalist physicians in rural or
- 148 medically underserved areas of Mississippi, and to develop and
- 149 implement the programs designed to foster successful entry of
- 150 participants into medical school, completion of medical school,
- 151 enrollment into and completion of family medicine or other
- 152 generalist residency, and establishment and maintenance of a
- 153 career in family medicine or other generalist specialty in a rural
- 154 or underserved area of Mississippi.
- 155 (2) The Board shall have the authority through use of
- 156 generally applicable definitions, to designate an area of the
- 157 state as underserved or rural.
- 158 (3) Each applicant for admission to the program must submit
- 159 an application to the commission that conforms to requirements
- 160 established by the board.
- 161 (4) In selecting participants for the program, the board may
- 162 only accept an applicant if his or her academic record and other
- 163 characteristics, if given consideration by the University of
- 164 Mississippi School of Medicine Admissions Committee, would be
- 165 considered credible and competitive.
- 166 (5) An applicant for the program may be admitted only upon a
- 167 majority vote of the members of the board.
- 168 (6) Up to fifteen (15) students will be admitted to the
- 169 Rural Physicians Scholars Program each year, beginning with the
- 170 2008-2009 academic year.
- 171 SECTION 5. (1) Participants must adhere to the policies and
- 172 practices as stipulated by the board to continue in the program.

- 173 Students in the program may receive tuition or other 174 financial support that may be provided by the commission. 175 student in the program is admitted to and completes medical or 176 osteopathic school, any tuition or other educational and living 177 support provided to the student by the commission will be forgiven. However, if the student is not successful in being 178 179 accepted into medical or osteopathic school within three (3) years of entry into the Rural Physicians Scholars Program, or if the 180 student otherwise breaches his or her agreement with the 181 182 commission, all financial assistance provided to the student must 183 be repaid according to policies adopted by the board.
- 184 <u>SECTION 6.</u> (1) Students in the program may apply to any
 185 medical or osteopathic school that is accredited by the Liaison
 186 Committee on Medical Education (LCME) or the American Osteopathic
 187 Association (AOA).
- 188 (2) Students in the program seeking admission to the
 189 University of Mississippi School of Medicine shall be eligible for
 190 a special admissions process pursuant to criteria established by
 191 the School of Medicine Admissions Committee which will include
 192 special consideration of the attributes of participation in the
 193 program.
- 194 (3) In carrying out the admissions process developed for the 195 Rural Physicians Scholars Program participants under this section, 196 the goal is for the program to work with the School of Medicine to enhance the capability of participants to successfully enter and 197 198 complete medical school, train in family medicine or other 199 generalist primary care specialty and enter practice in rural or 200 underserved areas in Mississippi. To the extent feasible, the early admissions process should be completed before November 1 of 201 202 the year preceding a student's admission to medical school.
- 203 <u>SECTION 7.</u> (1) Subject to the availability of funding,
 204 students in the program who successfully matriculate to medical or
 205 osteopathic school are eligible for ongoing financial support in
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accordance with policies and requirements of the commission and in accordance with the applicable laws and regulations. The number of students to be supported at the University of Mississippi School of Medicine and at other schools will be established by policy prescribed by the board.

(2) Subject to the availability of funding, students enrolled at the University of Mississippi School of Medicine may receive tuition support, funding to assist with the cost of books and a living stipend, as prescribed by policy of the board and in accordance with applicable regulations. Preferences for ongoing funding must be given to those students admitted to the University of Mississippi School of Medicine.

(3) For each year that a student in medical or osteopathic school receives financial assistance, the student is obligated for one (1) year of practice as a primary care physician in a rural or underserved area in Mississippi. Breach of the agreement at any stage of training shall invoke the repayment of all financial assistance provided to the student through the Rural Physicians Scholars Program, including assistance provided during undergraduate school, as well as in medical or osteopathic school, along with other penalties that may be prescribed in policy by the board.

SECTION 8. Medical and osteopathic students in the program must enter family medicine or other generalist residency programs according to their choice of specialty. Depending upon the availability of funds, students who successfully enter residency programs which have been approved by the board may receive further financial support from the Rural Physicians Scholars Program subject to applicable rules and policies of the commission. funding for financial support from the commission to participants during their residency must be separate from UMMC funding and not under UMMC control and be disbursed in accordance with applicable regulations.

239 SECTION 9. (1) Upon completion of residency, a participant 240 in the Rural Physicians Scholars Program must proceed to enter the 241 practice of medicine in a rural or underserved area in 242 Mississippi, as defined by the board and consistent with generally 243 acceptable designations. If an area experiences significant 244 changes in its medical or general community which are not 245 reflected by HPSA or MUA rural designation, the board may receive testimony and, in its discretion, may qualify the area as an 246 underserved or rural area to allow the program participant to 247 248 fulfill his or her practice obligation. 249 (2) Upon entering the practice of medicine, a participant in 250 the program must serve in HPSA, MUA, or rural area otherwise 251 approved for practice under subsection (1) of this section for a 252 number of years which corresponds to the number of years, not to exceed five (5), for which the participant received funding 253 254 through the program. A participant who completes residency 255 outside the State of Mississippi who fails to enter the practice 256 of medicine as required under this section shall be deemed in 257 breach of contract and shall be liable for the immediate repayment 258 of all financial assistance provided to the participant through 259 the Rural Physicians Scholars Program, including assistance 260 provided during undergraduate school, as well as in medical or 261 osteopathic school, along with other penalties that may be 262 prescribed in policy by the board. Any participant who fails to 263 complete the period of practice for which he or she is obligated 264 to provide services in an HPSA or MUA in exchange for financial 265 assistance received through the Rural Physicians Scholars Program 266 shall be liable for the repayment of all financial assistance 267 provided to the participant through the program, along with other 268 penalties that may be prescribed by the board, an amount which 269 shall be reduced on a pro rata basis for actual years of practice

by the physician in the area designated by the board.

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271	SECTION 10. The Mississippi Access to Rural Physicians
272	Scholars Commission, acting through the board, shall make every
273	effort to establish an initial practice entry support system for
274	participants in the program.
275	SECTION 11. This act may not be construed as granting the
276	Mississippi Access to Rural Physicians Scholars Commission or its
277	governing board any governing or administrative authority over any
278	program administered by any college, university, medical school or
279	residency program in this state or any other program established
280	by state law, including the Medical Education Scholarship and Loar
281	Repayment Program established under Section 37-143-6.
282	SECTION 12. This act shall take effect and be in force from
283	and after July 1, 2007.
