HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 14

1 A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND THE MISSISSIPPI 2 CONSTITUTION OF 1890 BY CREATING A NEW SECTION ESTABLISHING A 3 COMPREHENSIVE STATEWIDE TOBACCO EDUCATION AND PREVENTION PROGRAM; 4 AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

5 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF 6 MISSISSIPPI, That the following amendment to the Mississippi 7 Constitution of 1890 is proposed to the qualified electors of the 8 state:

9 Amend the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 to create a new 10 Section to read as follows:

"Section \_\_\_. Comprehensive Statewide Tobacco Education and 11 Prevention Program. In order to protect people, especially youth, 12 from health hazards of using tobacco, including addictive 13 disorders, cancer, cardiovascular diseases and lung diseases; and 14 15 to discourage use of tobacco, particularly among youth, a portion 16 of the money that tobacco companies pay to the State of 17 Mississippi under the Tobacco Settlement each year shall be used to fund a comprehensive statewide tobacco education and prevention 18 program consistent with recommendations of the U.S. Centers for 19 Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) as follows: 20 21 (a) **Program.** The money appropriated pursuant to this

22 section shall be used to fund a comprehensive statewide tobacco 23 education and prevention program consistent with the 24 recommendations for effective program components in the 1999 Best Practices for Comprehensive Tobacco Control Programs of the CDC, 25 26 as such Best Practices may be amended by the CDC. This program shall include, at a minimum, the following components, and may 27 28 include additional components that are also contained within the H. C. R. No. 14 G2/3 07/HR03/R776

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29 CDC Best Practices, as periodically amended, and that are 30 effective at accomplishing the purpose of this section, and that 31 do not undermine the effectiveness of these required minimum 32 components:

33 (i) An advertising campaign to discourage the use
34 of tobacco and to educate people, especially youth, about the
35 health hazards of tobacco, which shall be designed to be effective
36 at achieving these goals and shall include, but need not be
37 limited to, television, radio and print advertising, with no
38 limitation on any individual advertising medium utilized;

39 (ii) Evidence-based curricula and programs to 40 educate youth about tobacco and to discourage their use of it, 41 including, but not limited to, programs that involve youth, 42 educate youth about the health hazards of tobacco, help youth 43 develop skills to refuse tobacco, and demonstrate to youth how to 44 stop using tobacco;

(iii) Programs of local community-based
partnerships that discourage the use of tobacco and work to
educate people, especially youth, about the health hazards of
tobacco, with an emphasis on programs that involve youth and
emphasize the prevention and cessation of tobacco use;

50 (iv) Enforcement of laws, regulations and policies 51 against the sale or other provision of tobacco to minors, and the 52 possession of tobacco by minors;

53 (v) Programs assisting and encouraging participation in tobacco cessation throughout Mississippi; and 54 55 (vi) Publicly-reported annual evaluations to ensure that monies appropriated pursuant to this section are spent 56 properly, which shall include evaluation of the program's 57 58 effectiveness in reducing and preventing tobacco use and annual recommendations for improvements to enhance the program's 59 60 effectiveness, which are to include comparisons to similar

comparisons to CDC *Best Practices*, including amendments thereto.

63 (b) Funding. In every year beginning with the calendar 64 year after voters approve this amendment, the Mississippi 65 Legislature shall appropriate to a nonprofit entity designated by the Legislature or the Partnership for a Healthy Mississippi, for 66 67 the purpose expressed in this section, from the total gross funds that tobacco companies pay to the State of Mississippi under the 68 69 Tobacco Settlement, an amount equal to twenty percent (20%) of 70 such funds paid to the state in 2006; and the appropriation required by this section shall be adjusted annually for inflation, 71 72 using the Consumer Price Index as published by the United States 73 Department of Labor.

74 Definitions. "Tobacco" includes, without (C) 75 limitation, tobacco itself and tobacco products that include 76 tobacco and are intended or expected for human use or consumption, 77 including, but not limited to, cigarettes, cigars, pipe tobacco and smokeless tobacco. The "Tobacco Settlement" means that 78 79 certain settlement agreement of the case of Mike Moore, Attorney 80 General ex. rel. State of Mississippi v. The American Tobacco 81 Company et al. (Chancery Court of Jackson County, Mississippi, 82 Cause No. 94-1429) and the settlement of any case brought against 83 tobacco companies by another state, and includes any subsequent amendments and successor agreements. "Youth" includes minors and 84 85 young adults. "Health Care Trust Fund" means the trust fund 86 established by the Legislature for the deposit of the funds 87 received by the State of Mississippi as a result of the tobacco settlement, including income from the investment of those funds. 88 89 "Health Care Expendable Fund" means the fund established for the 90 annual transfer of certain funds from the Health Care Trust Fund that are available for appropriation by the Legislature. 91 "Income" 92 means all interest and dividends derived from the investment of

95 (e) This amendment shall be known as the "Youth Tobacco96 Addiction and Prevention Amendment.""

97 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this amendment shall be 98 submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held on 99 the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November 2007, as 100 provided by Section 273 of the Constitution and by law.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the explanation of this proposed amendment for the ballot shall read as follows: "This proposed constitutional amendment establishes a Statewide Tobacco Education and Prevention Program, describes its components and requires the Legislature to annually appropriate money to a nonprofit entity for the purposes of implementing the program."
