HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 69

1 2 3	A RESOLUTION URGING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO FULLY FUND THE SECURE RURAL SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITY SELF-DETERMINATION REAUTHORIZATION ACT.
4	WHEREAS, in 1908, in response to the mounting opposition to
5	the creation of the National Forest System in the West, Congress
6	passed a bill which created a revenue sharing mechanism to offset
7	the effects of removing these lands from economic development,
8	specifying that 25% of all revenues generated from the
9	multiple-use management of the National Forests would be shared
10	with the counties to support public roads and public schools; and
11	WHEREAS, from 1908 until 1986, the revenue sharing mechanism
12	worked extremely well, before a decline in multiple-use management
13	of National Forests occurred, constituting an 85% decrease among
14	counties in actual revenues generated; and
15	WHEREAS, this revenue crisis led county and school officials
16	to form the National Forest Counties and Schools Coalition in
17	1998, in partnership with the National Association of Counties and
18	other organizations, which in 2000 received congressional support
19	with the passage of the Secure Rural Schools and Community
20	Self-Determination Act (P.L. 106-393), addressing the needs of
21	forest counties and focusing on the creation of a new cooperative
22	partnership between citizens in forest counties and our federal
23	land management agencies; and
24	WHEREAS, counties in Mississippi received a total of
25	\$8,457,066.00 last year under the act, \$7,266,845.00 of which was

expended under Title I for roads and schools, while \$251,893.00

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27 was expended on Title II projects and $938,328.00 was used for
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- 28 Title III projects; and
- 29 WHEREAS, in 2007, actual U.S. Forest Service receipts for the
- 30 State of Mississippi are estimated to be only \$2,264,004.00, a
- 31 drastic reduction in funding for counties already reeling from the
- 32 effects of the 2005 hurricane season, promising a devastating
- 33 effect on the state's ability to provide road and bridge
- 34 maintenance and new road construction; and
- 35 WHEREAS, the Secure Rural Schools and Community
- 36 Self-Determination Act has:
- 37 Restored program finds for students in rural schools and
- 38 prevented the closure of numerous insolated rural schools.
- 39 Allowed rural county road districts and county road
- 40 departments to address the severe maintenance backlog resulting
- 41 from decimated road budgets from 1986 to 1999.
- 42 Over 70 Resources Advisory Committees (RACs) have been formed
- 43 under Title II, which have studied and approved over 2,500
- 44 projects on federal forestlands and adjacent public and private
- 45 lands using funds that are approved by Forest County Boards of
- 46 Commissioners, including projects related to: fuel reduction,
- 47 habitat improvement, watershed restoration, road maintenance and
- 48 rehabilitation, reforestation, campground and trail improvement
- 49 and noxious weed eradication.
- Title III projects on forest county lands are also authorized
- 51 by the act and many counties have effectively invested in projects
- 52 and programs such as: search and rescue, conservation easements,
- 53 community wildfire protection planning and forest-related
- 54 educational programs; and
- 55 WHEREAS, the loss of these critical funds could mean the end
- of meaningful and important subsidies and benefits that have
- 57 helped sustain rural community programs throughout Mississippi:
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF
- 59 REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, That we do hereby

60	urge the United States Congress to fund a one-year extension of
61	the Secure Rural Schools and Community Self-Determination Act as
62	an emergency appropriation, either finding appropriate offsets or
63	protecting it from a budget point of order, and to develop a
64	long-term solution before the end of fiscal year 2007.
65	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be
66	furnished to the President of the United States Senate, the
67	Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, the members
68	of the Mississippi congressional delegation and to the members of
69	the Capitol Press Corps.
