## SENATE BILL NO. 2904

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 13-5-25, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO 1 REVISE THE PERSONAL EXEMPTION FROM JURY SERVICE DUE TO AGE; AND 2 3 FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: SECTION 1. Section 13-5-25, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 5 amended as follows: 6 [Until January 1, 2008, this section shall read as follows:] 7 13-5-25. Every citizen over seventy (70) years of age, and 8 9 everyone who has served on the regular panel as a juror in the actual trial of one or more litigated cases within two (2) years, 10 11 shall be exempt from service if he claims the privilege; but the latter class shall serve as talesmen, and on special venire, and 12 on the regular panel, if there be a deficiency of jurors. No 13 qualified juror shall be excluded because of any such reasons, but 14 15 the same shall be a personal privilege to be claimed by any person selected for jury duty. Any citizen over seventy (70) years of 16 age may claim this personal privilege outside of open court by 17 providing the clerk of court with information that allows the 18 clerk to determine the validity of the claim. Such citizens over 19 seventy (70) years of age may claim this privilege for life. If 20 the privilege is claimed for life, a jury summons for any future 21 trials shall not be issued to such person claiming the privilege. 22 Provided, however, that no person who has served on the 23 regular panel as a juror in the actual trial of one or more 24 25 litigated cases in one (1) court may claim the exemption in any other court where he may be called to serve. 26

37	providing the clerk of court with information that allows the
38	clerk to determine the validity of the claim. Such citizens over
39	seventy (70) years of age may claim this privilege for life. If
10	the privilege is claimed for life, a jury summons for any future
11	trials shall not be issued to such person claiming the privilege.
12	Provided, however, that no person who has served on the
13	regular panel as a juror in the actual trial of one or more
14	litigated cases in one (1) court may claim the exemption in any
15	other court where he may be called to serve.
16	SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from
17	and after July 1, 2007.
