SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 568

1 A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION DESIGNATING THE THIRD SATURDAY OF 2 JUNE, IN 2007 AND IN EACH SUCCEEDING YEAR, AS "JUNETEENTH" FREEDOM 3 DAY IN MISSISSIPPI.

WHEREAS, the date of June 19 is known as "Juneteenth," and it is the oldest nationally celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States; and

7 WHEREAS, the commemoration of June 19th as Juneteenth 8 specifically refers to the fact that, even though President 9 Lincoln announced the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863, the 10 joyous news of freedom from slavery did not reach certain 11 Americans in Galveston, Texas, until June 19, 1865; and

WHEREAS, Juneteenth commemorates freedom from slavery in America, emphasizes education and achievement, and is a time for reflection and rejoicing in the African-American experience; and

WHEREAS, the celebration of Juneteenth is inclusive of all 15 races, ethnicities, religions and nationalities, in that citizens 16 17 across our country join hands in acknowledging a period in our history that has influenced our society, a great society, that 18 advances the ideals of liberty and justice for all and 19 20 acknowledges the great advances in race relations which have occurred in the State of Mississippi over the past generation; and 21 WHEREAS, Mississippi will again be set apart as a national 2.2 leader in seeking to bridge a difficult past and complicated 23

24 present to attain a harmonious and prosperous future, and the 25 commemoration of "Juneteenth" offers an occasion to remember the 26 bonds of our unity and common destiny: 27 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF 28 MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That 29 the third Saturday of June in 2007, and in each succeeding year, 30 be designated as "Juneteenth" Freedom Day in Mississippi.

31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we do hereby call upon the 32 people of the State of Mississippi to reflect upon the significant 33 roles and many contributions of African-Americans to Mississippi 34 and the nation throughout history and today, and to celebrate this 35 day with appropriate activities and events that honor this rich 36 legacy.

37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State shall transmit a copy of this resolution to the State Superintendent of 38 Education, the Director of the State Board of Community and Junior 39 Colleges, the Commissioner of Higher Education and to members of 40 Mississippi's congressional delegation for dissemination to their 41 42 students and respective constituents, and the Secretary of the 43 Senate shall post the designation of this day on the Legislature's Web site, so that all citizens may be apprised of the sense of the 44 45 Legislature in this matter.
