- 15 "Satellite Express" along with Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame
- 16 member Willie Totten, who was the Delta Devil Quarterback
- 17 nicknamed "Satellite"; and
- 18 WHEREAS, Jerry Rice performed in front of the largest crowd
- 19 in the history of Mississippi collegiate football as Mississippi
- 20 Valley State University took on Alcorn State University in
- 21 Jackson, Mississippi, on October 27, 1984. A jammed-pack Memorial
- 22 Stadium featured over 64,000 fans witnessed Alcorn Braves defeat
- 23 Jerry's Delta Devils 42-28, despite the game's availability on
- 24 free local television; and
