HOUSE BILL NO. 760 (As Passed the House)

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 43-1-55, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO REQUIRE THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES TO TRAIN ALL FAMILY PROTECTION SPECIALISTS AND FAMILY PROTECTION WORKERS IN THEIR LEGAL DUTIES TO PROTECT THE CONSTITUTIONAL AND STATUTORY RIGHTS OF CHILDREN AND FAMILIES FROM THE INITIAL TIME OF CONTACT, DURING INVESTIGATION AND THROUGH INTERVENTION; TO DELETE THE REPEALER ON THIS SECTION; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 9 SECTION 1. Section 43-1-55, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 10 amended as follows:

43-1-55. (1) The Office of Family and Children's Services 11 and the Division of Aging and Adult Services shall devise formal 12 standards for employment as a family protection worker and as a 13 14 family protection specialist within their respective offices and 15 for service delivery designed to measure the quality of services 16 delivered to clients, as well as the timeliness of services. Each 17 family protection worker and family protection specialist shall be 18 assessed annually by a supervisor who is a licensed social worker who is knowledgeable in the standards promulgated. The standards 19 devised by each office shall be applicable to all family 20 21 protection workers and family protection specialists working under 22 that office.

(2) The Office of Family and Children's Services shall
devise formal standards for family protection workers of the
Department of Human Services who are not licensed social workers.
Those standards shall require that:

(a) In order to be employed as a family protection
worker, a person must have a bachelor's degree in either
psychology, sociology, nursing, family studies, or a related

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field, or a graduate degree in either psychology, sociology, nursing, criminal justice, counseling, marriage and family therapy or a related field. The determination of what is a related field shall be made by certification of the State Personnel Board; and

34 (b) Before a person may provide services as a family 35 protection worker, the person shall complete four (4) weeks of intensive training provided by the training unit of the Office of 36 Family and Children's Services, and shall take and receive a 37 38 passing score on the certification test administered by the training unit upon completion of the four-week training. Upon 39 40 receiving a passing score on the certification test, the person shall be certified as a family protection worker by the Department 41 42 of Human Services. Any person who does not receive a passing score on the certification test shall not be employed or maintain 43 employment as a family protection worker for the department. 44 45 Further, a person, qualified as a family protection worker through the procedures set forth above, shall not conduct forensic 46 47 interviews of children until the worker receives additional specialized training in child forensic interview protocols and 48 49 techniques by a course or curriculum approved by the Department of 50 Human Services to be not less than forty (40) hours.

(3) For the purpose of providing services in child abuse or neglect cases, youth court proceedings, vulnerable adults cases, and such other cases as designated by the Executive Director of Human Services, the caseworker or service provider shall be a family protection specialist or a family protection worker whose work is overseen by a family protection specialist who is a licensed social worker.

(4) The Department of Human Services and the Office of Family and Children's Services shall seek to employ and use family protection specialists to provide the services of the office, and may employ and use family protection workers to provide those services only in counties in which there is not a sufficient

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(5) Family protection workers, family protection 65 66 specialists, and all other persons conducting investigations into 67 reports of abuse or neglect of a child on behalf of or under 68 contract with the department shall be trained in their legal 69 duties to protect the constitutional and statutory rights of 70 parents and families from the initial time of contact, throughout 71 the investigation, and during intervention. The training curriculum shall include oral and written instruction regarding 72 73 the limitations that the Fourth Amendment to the United States 74 Constitution places upon caseworkers and their investigations.

75 There is created a Training and Testing Advisory (6) (a) 76 Council to review the department's program of training and testing 77 of family protection workers and to make recommendations 78 pertaining to the program to the department. The advisory council 79 shall be composed of the following ten (10) members: two (2) 80 employees of the department appointed by the Executive Director of Human Services, including one (1) representative of the Office of 81 82 Family and Children's Services and one (1) representative of the Division of Aging and Adult Services; the Chairman of the 83 Consortium of Accredited Schools of Social Work in Mississippi; 84 85 and the executive director or a board member of a professional association or licensing board for each field of study named in 86 87 subsection (2) (a) of this section, as follows: the Mississippi Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers; a marriage 88 and family therapist who is a member of the Board of Examiners for 89 90 Social Workers and Marriage and Family Therapists, to be selected by the four (4) members of the board of examiners who are marriage 91 92 and family therapists; the Mississippi Nurses' Association; the 93 Mississippi Prosecutors Association; the Mississippi Counseling 94 Association; the Mississippi Psychological Association; and an 95 officer of the Alabama-Mississippi Sociological Association who is H. 12/HR07/R734PH PAGE 3 (RF\HS) 96 a Mississippi resident elected by the executive committee of the 97 association. The executive director of each association 98 (excluding the Alabama-Mississippi Sociological Association) and 99 chairman of the consortium may designate an alternate member to 100 serve in his stead on the advisory council. Members of the 101 advisory council shall serve without salary or per diem.

(b) A majority of the advisory council members shall
select from their membership a chairperson to preside over
meetings and a vice chairperson to preside in the absence of the
chairperson or when the chairperson is excused. The advisory
council shall adopt procedures governing the manner of conducting
its business. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum
to do business.

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SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after <u>its passage</u>.
