SENATE BILL NO. 2752 (As Sent to Governor)

- AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 37-13-134, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO AUTHORIZE THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND THE STATE
- 3 DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO ESTABLISH A SCHOOL HEALTH PILOT PROGRAM
- 4 BASED UPON APPROPRIATE SCIENCE-BASED WELLNESS POLICIES; AND FOR
- 5 RELATED PURPOSES.
- BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- 7 **SECTION 1.** Section 37-13-134, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 8 amended as follows:
- 9 37-13-134. (1) The Legislature recognizes that there is a
- 10 problem with Mississippi student inactivity and obesity, and
- 11 therefore requires the following guidelines for school district
- 12 physical education, health education and physical activity and
- 13 fitness classes:
- 14 Kindergarten through Grade 8: One hundred fifty (150)
- 15 minutes per week of physical activity-based instruction and
- 16 forty-five (45) minutes per week of health education instruction,
- 17 as defined by the State Board of Education.
- 18 Grades 9 through 12: 1/2 Carnegie unit requirement in
- 19 physical education or physical activity for graduation.
- 20 All instruction in physical education, health education and
- 21 physical activity must be based on the most current state
- 22 standards provided by the State Department of Education.
- 23 (2) Beginning with the 2006-2007 school year, each local
- 24 school board shall, consistent with regulations adopted by the
- 25 State Board of Education, adopt a school wellness plan which shall
- 26 promote a healthy lifestyle for Mississippi's school children and
- 27 staff. Beginning with the 2008-2009 school year, the school
- 28 wellness plan shall also promote increased physical activity,

- 29 healthy eating habits and abstinence from the use of tobacco and
- 30 illegal drugs through programs that incorporate healthy lifestyle
- 31 choices into core subject areas which may be developed in
- 32 partnership with the Institute for America's Health.
- 33 (3) Beginning with the 2012-2013 school year, the State
- 34 Board of Education, in consultation with the State Department of
- 35 Health, shall have the authority to establish a school health
- 36 pilot program to improve student health so that all students can
- 37 <u>fully participate and be successful in school. The school health</u>
- 38 pilot program shall be implemented in local school districts, as
- 39 provided in Section 2 of this act.
- 40 (4) The Legislature shall appropriate sufficient
- 41 state-source funds for the State Department of Education to employ
- 42 a physical activity coordinator to assist districts on current and
- 43 effective practices and on implementation of physical education
- 44 and physical activity programs.
- 45 (5) The physical activity coordinator employed under Section
- 46 37-13-133 must have the qualifications prescribed in any of the
- 47 following paragraphs, which are listed in the order of preference:
- 48 (a) A doctorate in physical education, exercise science
- 49 or a highly related field, and at least three (3) years of
- 50 experience in teaching physical education in Grades K-12 or in
- 51 physical activity promotion/fitness leadership; or
- 52 (b) A master's degree in physical education, exercise
- 53 science or a highly related field, and at least five (5) years of
- 54 experience in teaching physical education in Grades K-12 or in
- 55 physical activity promotion/fitness leadership; or
- 56 (c) A bachelor's degree in physical education, a
- 57 teacher's license, and at least seven (7) years of experience in
- 58 teaching physical education in Grades K-12 or in physical activity
- 59 promotion/fitness leadership.
- 60 (6) The Governor's Commission on Physical Fitness and Sports
- 61 created under Section 7-1-551 et seq., the Mississippi Council on

- 62 Obesity Prevention and Management created under Section 41-101-1
- 63 et seq., the Task Force on Heart Disease and Stroke Prevention
- created under Section 41-103-1 et seq., the Mississippi Alliance 64
- 65 for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance, and the
- 66 Mississippi Alliance for School Health shall provide
- 67 recommendations to the State Department of Education regarding the
- employment of the physical activity coordinator. The department 68
- 69 shall consider the recommendations of those entities in employing
- 70 the physical activity coordinator.
- 71 The physical activity coordinator shall present a state
- 72 physical activity plan each year to the Governor's Commission on
- 73 Physical Fitness and Sports, the Mississippi Council on Obesity
- 74 Prevention and Management, the Task Force on Heart Disease and
- 75 Stroke Prevention, the Mississippi Alliance for Health, Physical
- Education, Recreation and Dance, and the Mississippi Alliance for 76
- School Health. 77
- 78 The physical activity coordinator shall monitor the
- 79 districts for adherence to current Mississippi school
- accountability standards and for implementation of the physical 80
- 81 education curriculum on file with the State Department of
- Education. The State Department of Education shall monitor and 82
- 83 act as a clearinghouse for the activities of the local school
- health councils established pursuant to subsection (8) of this 84
- 85 section.
- 86 (9) The local school board of each school district
- shall establish a local school health council for each school 87
- 88 which shall ensure that local community values are reflected in
- the local school's wellness plan to address school health. Such 89
- 90 councils shall be established no later than November 1, 2006.
- The local school health council's duties shall 91
- include, but not be limited to, the following: 92
- 93 (i) Recommend age appropriate curriculum and the
- 94 number of hours of instruction to be provided in health and

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96	hours shall not be less than that required by Section 37-13-134;
97	(ii) Recommend appropriate practices that include
98	a coordinated approach to school health designed to prevent
99	obesity, cardiovascular disease, Type II diabetes and other health
100	risks, through coordination of:
101	1. Health education;
102	2. Physical education;
103	3. Nutritional services;
104	4. Parental/Community involvement;
105	5. Instruction to prevent the use of tobacco,
106	drugs and alcohol;
107	6. Physical activity;
108	7. Health services;
109	8. Healthy environment;
110	9. Counseling and psychological services;
111	10. Healthy lifestyles; and
112	11. Staff wellness.
113	(iii) Provide guidance on the development and
114	implementation of the local school wellness plan.
115	(c) The local school board shall appoint members to the
116	local school health council. At a minimum, the school board shall
117	appoint one (1) person from each of the following groups:
118	(i) Parents who are not employed by the school
119	district;
120	(ii) The director of local school food services;
121	(iii) Public schoolteachers;
122	(iv) Public school administrators;
123	(v) District students;
124	(vi) Health care professionals;
125	(vii) The business community;
126	(viii) Law enforcement;
127	(ix) Senior citizens;

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128	(x) The clergy;
129	(xi) Nonprofit health organizations; and
130	(xii) Faith-based organizations.
131	(10) Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit
132	or limit the sale or distribution of any food or beverage item
133	through fund-raisers conducted by students, teachers, school
134	groups, or parent groups when the items are intended for sale off
135	the school campus.
136	SECTION 2. (1) Subject to available funding, the State
137	Department of Education, in consultation with the State Department
138	of Health, shall establish the school health grant pilot program
139	to improve student health by assisting local school districts in
140	implementing a school health program. In order to qualify for a
141	school health grant, a school district shall submit a detailed
142	implementation plan, developed in accordance with the guidelines
143	for a school health program developed by the State Department of
144	Education, and including the following components:
145	(a) A dedicated school health coordinator and technical
146	and administrative support for collection of data and program
147	evaluation.
148	(b) A description of how the school district currently
149	addresses physical activity, nutrition, and other obesity
150	prevention measures.
151	(c) A description of how the agency would use the state
152	grant to augment what it is currently doing, including defining
153	priorities based on the students' health need and meeting
154	education performance indicators, developing an action plan for
155	addressing those needs based on realistic goals and measurable
156	objectives, establishing a timeline for implementation, and
157	developing and maintaining a system to evaluate progress and
158	outcomes for the program.

(d) All school districts receiving grants will report

annually to the State Department of Education progress towards the

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- 161 achievement of state education performance indicators and
- 162 standards and requirements relating to physical activity and
- 163 nutrition.
- 164 (2) The amount in the coordinated school health grant pilot
- 165 program shall be limited to the amount appropriated and shall be
- 166 available to school districts based on the guidelines developed by
- 167 the State Department of Education.
- 168 (3) Any grants made to school district shall be expended to
- 169 supplement and not supplant any funds already expended as school
- 170 health programs. For this purpose, expenditures of components
- 171 enumerated in subsection (2) of this section for the current
- 172 fiscal year shall be considered the base expenditure on school
- 173 health and any school district receiving grant funds shall
- 174 maintain this base.
- 175 (4) There is created in the State Treasury a fund into which
- 176 any public or private funds from any source shall be deposited for
- 177 the support of the activities of coordinated school health grant
- 178 pilot program.
- 179 (5) State grants are only for coordination and improvement
- 180 of school health programs to improve student health in accordance
- 181 with the detailed plan submitted in accordance with subsection (2)
- 182 of this section.
- 183 (6) The State Department of Education and the State
- 184 Department of Health shall coordinate existing school health
- 185 programs, grants and initiatives. To the extent possible,
- 186 existing contracts and waiver requirements and funding, including
- 187 Medicaid funding, shall also be coordinated.
- 188 (7) The use of grant funds shall be subject to audit by the
- 189 Office of the State Auditor.
- 190 **SECTION 3.** This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 191 and after July 1, 2012.
