HOUSE BILL NO. 37

- AN ACT TO REENACT SECTIONS 37-173-1, 37-173-3, 37-173-5, 37-173-7, 37-173-9, 37-173-11, 37-173-13, 37-173-15, 37-173-17, 37-173-19, 37-173-21, 37-173-23, 37-173-25, 37-173-27 AND 37-173-29, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, WHICH CREATE THE DYSLEXIA THERAPY SCHOLARSHIP FOR STUDENTS WITH DYSLEXIA PROGRAM; TO REPEAL SECTION 37-173-31, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, WHICH PROVIDES FOR THE REPEAL OF THE DYSLEXIA THERAPY SCHOLARSHIP FOR STUDENTS WITH DYSLEXIA PROGRAM; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
- 9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- 10 **SECTION 1.** Section 37-173-1, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 11 reenacted as follows:
- 12 37-173-1. As used in this chapter, the following words and
- 13 phrases shall have the meanings ascribed in this section unless
- 14 the context clearly indicates otherwise:
- 15 (a) "Board" means the State Board of Education.
- 16 (b) "Department" means the State Department of
- 17 Education.
- 18 (c) "Dyslexia" means a specific learning disability
- 19 that is neurological in origin, characterized by difficulties with
- 20 accurate and fluent word recognition and poor spelling and

21 decoding abilities, which typically result from a deficit in the

22	phonologi	cal c	omponent	\circ f	language	that	is	often	unexpected	in
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- 23 relation to other cognitive abilities and the provision of
- 24 effective classroom instruction, and secondary consequences which
- 25 may include problems in reading comprehension and reduced reading
- 26 experience that can impede growth of vocabulary and background
- 27 knowledge.
- 28 (d) "Dyslexia therapy" means an appropriate specialized
- 29 dyslexia instructional program that is delivered by a Mississippi
- 30 Department of Education licensed dyslexia therapist which is
- 31 scientific, research-based, Orton-Gillingham based, and is offered
- 32 in a small group setting to teach students the components of
- 33 reading instruction which include:
- 34 (i) Phonemic awareness to enable students to
- 35 detect, segment, blend and manipulate sounds in spoken language;
- 36 (ii) Graphophonemic knowledge (phonics) for
- 37 teaching the letter-sound plan of English;
- 38 (iii) The entire structure of the English language
- 39 that encompasses morphology, semantics, syntax and pragmatics;
- 40 (iv) Linguistic instruction directed toward
- 41 proficiency and fluency with the patterns of language so that
- 42 words and sentences are carriers of meaning; and
- 43 (v) Strategies that students use for decoding,
- 44 encoding, word recognition, fluency and comprehension.
- These components shall be taught using instructional
- 46 approaches that include explicit, direct instruction which is

- 47 systematic, sequential and cumulative, following a logical plan of
- 48 presenting the alphabetic principle commensurate with the
- 49 students' needs, with no assumption of prior skills or language
- 50 knowledge; individualized to meet the specific learning needs of
- 51 each individual student in a small group setting; intensive,
- 52 highly concentrated instruction that maximizes student engagement
- 53 and uses specialized methods and materials; meaning-based
- 54 instruction directed toward purposeful reading and writing, with
- 55 an emphasis on comprehension and composition; and multisensory
- 56 instruction that incorporates the simultaneous use of two (2) or
- 57 more sensory pathways during teacher presentations and student
- 58 practice.
- 59 (e) "Dyslexia therapist" means a professional who has
- 60 completed training in a department approved Orton-Gillingham based
- 61 dyslexia therapy training program attaining a AA license in
- 62 dyslexia therapy or a professional participating in a state
- 63 approved dyslexia therapy training program to attain a AA license
- 64 in dyslexia therapy.
- (f) "Mississippi Dyslexia Therapy Scholarship for
- 66 Students with Dyslexia Program" means a scholarship to provide the
- 67 option to attend a public school other than the one to which
- 68 assigned, or to provide a scholarship to a nonpublic school of
- 69 choice, for students in Grade 1 through Grade 6 diagnosed with
- 70 dyslexia in order to receive comprehensive multisensory dyslexia

- 71 therapy delivered by holders of an appropriate license in dyslexia
- 72 therapy issued by the department.
- 73 (g) "School" means any public or state accredited
- 74 nonpublic special purpose school that provides a specific learning
- 75 environment that provides comprehensive dyslexia therapy
- 76 instruction delivered by dyslexia therapists licensed by the
- 77 department providing highly qualified education and intervention
- 78 services to children diagnosed with the primary learning
- 79 disability of dyslexia.
- SECTION 2. Section 37-173-3, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 81 reenacted as follows:
- 37-173-3. The Mississippi Dyslexia Therapy Scholarship for
- 83 Students with Dyslexia Program is established to provide the
- 84 option to attend a public school other than the one to which
- 85 assigned, or to provide a scholarship to a nonpublic school of
- 86 choice, for students with a diagnosis of dyslexia. Students in
- 87 Grades 1-6 who have been properly screened and diagnosed with
- 88 dyslexia shall be eligible to receive scholarship assistance under
- 89 this program.
- 90 **SECTION 3.** Section 37-173-5, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 91 reenacted as follows:
- 92 37-173-5. (1) Parents or legal quardians may exercise the
- 93 option to remove their child from a traditional public school
- 94 setting to be enrolled in a public or nonpublic school which meets
- 95 the standards for appropriate specific instruction designed to

96	meet	the	unique	learning	needs	of	young	dyslexic	students.	The

- 97 objectives of such school shall be:
- 98 (a) To emphasize the importance of early intervention;
- 99 and
- 100 (b) To provide intensive high-quality instruction of
- 101 students in reading, spelling, writing, language arts,
- 102 phonological awareness and fluency training, but shall not
- 103 preclude instruction in mathematics, social studies, science, art,
- 104 music and physical education based on the curriculum requirements
- 105 of the State Department of Education.
- 106 (2) The parent or legal guardian of a public school student
- 107 with dyslexia may request and receive from the state a Mississippi
- 108 Dyslexia Therapy Scholarship for the child to enroll in and attend
- 109 a nonpublic school in accordance with this section if:
- 110 (a) The student has spent the previous school year in
- 111 attendance at a Mississippi public school or any other state
- 112 approved nonpublic school in the state that emphasizes instruction
- 113 in dyslexia intervention; or
- 114 (b) The parent or legal guardian has obtained
- 115 acceptance for admission of the student to a nonpublic school that
- 116 is eligible for the program under Section 37-173-19 and has
- 117 requested from the department a scholarship within thirty (30)
- 118 days before the date of the first scholarship payment. The
- 119 request must be through a communication directly to the department
- 120 in a manner that creates a written or electronic record of the

- 121 request and the date of receipt of the request. The Department of
- 122 Education must notify the district of the parent's or legal
- 123 guardian's intent upon receipt of the parent's or legal guardian's
- 124 request.
- SECTION 4. Section 37-173-7, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 126 reenacted as follows:
- 127 37-173-7. (1) A student is not eligible for a Mississippi
- 128 Dyslexia Therapy Scholarship while he or she is:
- 129 (a) Enrolled in a school operating for the purpose of
- 130 providing educational services to youth in Department of Juvenile
- 131 Justice commitment programs;
- 132 (b) Participating in a home-school education program;
- 133 (c) Participating in a virtual school, correspondence
- 134 school, or distance learning program that receives state funding
- 135 under the student's participation unless the participation is
- 136 limited to no more than two (2) courses per school year;
- 137 (d) Not having regular and direct contact with his or
- 138 her private school teachers at the school's physical location.
- 139 (2) (a) For purposes of continuity of educational choice,
- 140 a Mississippi Dyslexia Therapy Scholarship shall remain in force
- 141 until the student returns to a public school or completes Grade 6,
- 142 whichever occurs first.
- 143 (b) Upon reasonable notice to the department and the
- 144 school district, the student's parent or legal guardian may remove

the student from the nonpublic school and place the student in a public school in accordance with this section.

147 **SECTION 5.** Section 37-173-9, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 148 reenacted as follows:

149 37-173-9. (1) (a) The parent or legal guardian is not 150 required to accept the offer of enrolling in another public school in lieu of requesting a Mississippi Dyslexia Therapy Scholarship 151 to a nonpublic school. However, if the parent or legal guardian 152 153 chooses the public school option, the student may continue attending a public school chosen by the parent or legal guardian 154 155 until the student completes Grade 6.

- (b) If the parent or legal guardian chooses a public school within the district, the school district shall provide transportation to the public school selected by the parent or legal guardian. However, if the parent or legal guardian chooses a public school in another district, the parent or legal guardian is responsible to provide transportation to the school of choice.
- 162 Each local school district shall make an initial (2)163 determination of whether a student diagnosed with dyslexia qualifies under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act 164 165 (IDEA) to receive services and funding under the provisions of the 166 IDEA before proceeding to the development of a 504 Plan for each dyslexic student eligible for educational services or equipment, 167 168 or both, under Sections 37-23-1 through 37-23-157. If a student's diagnosis of dyslexia results in a determination that the 169

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170 disability is not a disability which would qualify the student as 171 eligible under the IDEA, then in developing the written 504 Plan 172 for each dyslexia student, there shall be a presumption that proficiency in spelling, reading and writing are essential for the 173 174 student to achieve appropriate educational progress. Each local 175 school district shall develop interventions and strategies to address the needs of those students diagnosed with dyslexia which 176 177 provide the necessary accommodations to enable the student to 178 achieve appropriate educational progress. The interventions and strategies developed shall include, but not be limited to, the use 179 of the 3-Tier Instructional Model and the utilization of 180 181 provisions of the IDEA and Section 504 to address those needs. 182 Furthermore, these provisions do not prohibit a parent or 183 legal quardian of a student diagnosed with dyslexia, at any time, from choosing the option of a Mississippi Dyslexia Therapy 184

If the parent or legal guardian chooses the nonpublic (3) school option and the student is accepted by the nonpublic school pending the availability of a space for the student, the parent or legal quardian of the student must notify the department thirty (30) days before the first scholarship payment and before entering the nonpublic school in order to be eligible for the scholarship when a space becomes available for the student in the nonpublic school.

Scholarship which would allow the student to attend another public

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195	(4) The parent or legal guardian of a student may choose, as
196	an alternative, to enroll the student in and transport the student
197	to a public school in an adjacent school district which has
198	available space and has a program with dyslexia services that
199	provide daily dyslexia therapy sessions delivered by a department
200	licensed dyslexia therapist, and that school district shall accept
201	the student and report the student for purposes of the district's
202	funding under the Mississippi Adequate Education Program.

- 203 **SECTION 6.** Section 37-173-11, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 204 reenacted as follows:
- 37-173-11. A parent or legal guardian who applies for a
 Mississippi Dyslexia Therapy Scholarship is exercising his or her
 parental option to place his or her child in a nonpublic school.
 Each participating parent or legal guardian and student shall
 adhere to the following:
- 210 (a) The parent or legal guardian must select the 211 nonpublic school and apply for the admission of his or her child;
- 212 (b) The parent or legal guardian must have requested 213 the scholarship at least thirty (30) days before the date of the 214 first scholarship payment;
- 215 (c) Any student participating in the Mississippi
 216 Dyslexia Therapy Scholarship for Students with Dyslexia Program
 217 must remain in attendance throughout the school year unless
 218 excused by the school for illness or other good cause; and

221 with the nonpublic special purpose school's published policies.

SECTION 7. Section 37-173-13, Mississippi Code of 1972, is reenacted as follows:

37-173-13. (1) The maximum scholarship granted per eligible student with dyslexia shall be an amount equivalent to the Mississippi Adequate Education Program base student cost.

(2) (a) The nonpublic school under this program shall report to the Mississippi Department of Education the number of students with dyslexia who are enrolled in nonpublic schools on the Mississippi Dyslexia Therapy Scholarships as of September 30 of each year in order to determine funding for the subsequent year. Funds may not be transferred from any funding provided to the Mississippi School for the Deaf and the Blind for program participants who are eligible under Section 37-173-5.

disburse payments to nonpublic schools under this program in
twelve (12) substantially equal installments. The initial payment
shall be made after department verification of admission
acceptance, and subsequent payments shall be made upon
verification of continued enrollment and attendance at the
nonpublic school.

SECTION 8. Section 37-173-15, Mississippi Code of 1972, is reenacted as follows:

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245 a policy to ensure that students will be screened in the spring of 246 kindergarten and the fall of Grade 1. The component of the screening must include: 247 248 (i) Phonological awareness and phonemic awareness; 249 (ii) Sound symbol recognition; 250 (iii) Alphabet knowledge; 251 (iv) Decoding skills; 252 (v) Encoding skills; and 253 (vi) Rapid naming. 254 (b) If a student fails the screener, the parent or 255 legal quardian will be notified of the results of the screener. 256 Subsequent dyslexia evaluations may be administered by licensed 257 professionals, including: 258 Psychologists, licensed under Chapter 31, (i) Title 73, Mississippi Code of 1972; 259 260 (ii) Psychometrists, licensed by the Mississippi Department of Education; or 261 262 (iii) Speech Language Pathologists, licensed under 263 Chapter 38, Title 73, Mississippi Code of 1972. 264 If a student fails the screener, the school 265 district, in its discretion, may perform a comprehensive dyslexia 266 evaluation, such evaluation must be administered by any of the 267 licensed professionals identified under paragraph (b) of this

269	(d) If a parent or legal guardian of a student who

- 280 (2) The screening of all compulsory-school-age children
 281 enrolled in each local public school district for dyslexia
 282 required by subsection (1)(a) of this section shall in no manner
 283 nullify or defeat the requirements of the pilot programs adopted
 284 by the State Department of Education to test certain students
 285 enrolled or enrolling in public schools for dyslexia under Section
 286 37-23-15.
- SECTION 9. Section 37-173-17, Mississippi Code of 1972, is reenacted as follows:
- 289 37-173-17. (1) To be eligible to participate in the 290 Mississippi Dyslexia Therapy Scholarship for Students with 291 Dyslexia Program, a nonpublic school must:
- 292 (a) Be a state accredited special purpose school;

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purpose school.

293	(b) Provide to the department all documentation
294	required for a student's participation, including the nonpublic
295	school's and student's fee schedules, at least thirty (30) days
296	before the first quarterly scholarship payment is made for the
297	student.

- 298 (c) Be academically accountable to the parent or legal
 299 guardian for meeting the educational needs of the student by, at a
 300 minimum, annually providing to the parent or legal guardian a
 301 written explanation of the student's progress.
- 302 (d) Maintain in this state a physical location where a 303 scholarship student regularly attends classes.
- 304 (2) The inability of a nonpublic school to meet the 305 requirements of this subsection shall constitute a basis for the 306 ineligibility of the nonpublic school to participate in the 307 scholarship program as determined by the department.
- 308 **SECTION 10.** Section 37-173-19, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 309 reenacted as follows:
- 37-173-19. (1) The department shall publicize information 311 regarding the Mississippi Dyslexia Therapy Scholarship on the 312 department's official website.
- 313 (2) Annually, by December 15, report to the Governor, the
 314 Lieutenant Governor, and the Speaker of the House of
 315 Representatives the Department of Education's actions with respect
 316 to implementing accountability in the scholarship program under
 317 this section, any substantiated allegations or violations of law

318	or	rule	by	an	eligible	nonpublic	school	under	this	program

- 319 concerning the enrollment and attendance of students, the
- 320 credentials of teachers, background screening of teachers, and
- 321 teachers' fingerprinting results and the corrective action taken
- 322 by the Department of Education.
- 323 **SECTION 11.** Section 37-173-21, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 324 reenacted as follows:
- 325 37-173-21. (1) The State Board of Education in conjunction
- 326 with each nonpublic school and local school board operating under
- 327 the provisions of this chapter, may:
- 328 (a) Extend the school day or length of the scholastic
- 329 year;
- 330 (b) Develop and establish a curriculum that is
- 331 consistent with the Mississippi Curriculum Framework in the
- 332 subject areas of mathematics, social studies, science, music, art
- 333 and physical education; and
- 334 (c) Select, purchase and use textbooks, literature and
- 335 other instructional materials that would improve educational
- 336 attainment by students in the school, subject to the approval of
- 337 the board.
- 338 (2) The qualified personnel to facilitate the educational
- 339 process of learning and instruction for children with dyslexia who
- 340 attend the schools shall consist of the following:
- 341 (a) An administrator or director with additional
- 342 training in the characteristics of dyslexia;

- 345 (c) Dyslexia therapists in training participating in a 346 department approved dyslexia therapy graduate internship program; 347 and
- 348 (d) Licensed elementary teachers under the supervision 349 of a state department licensed dyslexia therapist.
- 350 **SECTION 12.** Section 37-173-23, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 351 reenacted as follows:
- 352 37-173-23. Teachers and other school personnel shall be 353 subject to criminal history record checks and fingerprinting 354 requirements applicable to other public schools under Section 355 37-9-17(2) and (3).
- 356 **SECTION 13.** Section 37-173-25, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 357 reenacted as follows:
- 358 37-173-25. (1) Each school providing instruction to
 359 children with dyslexia shall certify to the State Department of
 360 Education its student enrollment in the same manner as local
 361 school districts.
- 362 (2) The department shall direct the proportionate share of
 363 monies generated under federal and state categorical aid programs
 364 to the participating school for serving students eligible for the
 365 aid. The state shall ensure that each school is treated equitably
 366 in the calculation and disbursement of all federal and state
 367 categorical aid program dollars. Each school participating in the

368 scholarship program shall comply with all reporting requirements 369 to receive the aid.

- 370 (3) (a) Each school shall adhere to generally accepted 371 accounting principles as promulgated by nationally recognized 372 professional organizations.
- 373 (b) Each school shall have its financial records
 374 audited annually, at the end of each fiscal year, by the State
 375 Auditor and shall file a copy of each audit report and
 376 accompanying management letter with the board by July 30.
- 377 Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to prohibit 378 any person or organization from providing funding or other 379 assistance to the establishment or operation of any school 380 authorized under this chapter, except religious or sectarian 381 organizations. The State Board of Education, acting on behalf of 382 the participating schools, is authorized to accept gifts, 383 donations, and grants of any kind made to a participating school 384 and to expend or use such gifts, donations, and grants in 385 accordance with the conditions prescribed by the donor; however, 386 no gift, donation, or grant may be accepted if subject to a 387 condition that is contrary to any provision of state law or board 388 rule.
- 389 **SECTION 14.** Section 37-173-27, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 390 reenacted as follows:

391	37-173-27. No liability shall arise on the part of the state
392	based on the award or use of a Mississippi Dyslexia Therapy
393	Scholarship.
394	SECTION 15. Section 37-173-29, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
395	reenacted as follows:
396	37-173-29. The inclusion of eligible nonpublic schools
397	within options available to Mississippi public school students
398	does not expand the regulatory authority of the state, its
399	officers, or any school district to impose any additional
400	regulation of nonpublic schools beyond those reasonably necessary
401	to enforce requirements expressly set forth in this chapter.
402	SECTION 16. Section 37-173-31, which repeals Sections
403	37-173-1 through 37-7-31, creating the Dyslexia Therapy
404	Scholarship for Students with Dyslexia Program, is repealed.
405	SECTION 17. This act shall take effect and be in force from

406 and after July 1, 2016.
