## HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 103

- A RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING AND HONORING THE MERITORIOUS AND DISTINGUISHED SERVICE OF SERGEANT TAYLOR HOWARD TO HIS COUNTRY DURING WORLD WAR II AND HIS CONTINUAL SELFLESS SERVICE TO HIS COMMUNITY AND HIS STATE.
- 5 WHEREAS, Mr. Taylor Howard, a World War II veteran, a
- 6 community/civic activist, entrepreneur, family man and servant of
- 7 God, never viewed life as a sea of closed doors, but rather as an
- 8 opportunity to never quit, to never give up, to never think lesser
- 9 of himself, to always have a dream, and to make those dreams come
- 10 true, and at the age of 98, he still seeks to unite and improve
- 11 his community; and
- 12 WHEREAS, born on October 13, 1918, Mr. Howard has resided in
- 13 Gulfport, Mississippi, since childhood, and after attending
- 14 Thirty-Third Avenue High School and wanting to better himself and
- 15 his family, he enrolled in the Civilian Conservation Corps in
- 16 1937, "CC Camp" as it was often referred; and
- 17 WHEREAS, while attending CC Camp, Mr. Howard was determined
- 18 to learn all he could to expand his knowledge that would prepare

- 19 him for his life ahead, so as a young man, he committed himself to
- 20 making life better not just for himself, but for others; and
- 21 WHEREAS, after returning from CC Camp, he was drafted into
- 22 the United States Army and served with the 92nd Infantry Division,
- 23 and he served in combat in the European Theater from 1942 until
- 24 World War II ended in 1945, training in Fort Breckenridge,
- 25 Kentucky, and Fort Huachuca, Arizona, before being deployed to
- 26 Northern Africa and Italy; and
- 27 WHEREAS, while in the service, Mr. Howard was promoted to the
- 28 rank of Sergeant, and while in the War Zone in the Mountains of
- 29 Italy, the barrage of hostile enemy fire they faced was extensive,
- 30 but the 92nd Infantry Division, along with a light tank company,
- 31 were able to silence the big guns of the Germans in that part of
- 32 Italy, and in November of 2013, he had the privilege of taking the
- 33 Honor Flight to Washington, D.C. with other World War II veterans,
- 34 as he continues to live his life as an active and proud World War
- 35 II veteran; and
- 36 WHEREAS, after serving in World War II, Sergeant Howard
- 37 returned to Gulfport, ever mindful of the things he had learned
- 38 along the way and continually holding on to his dream of freedom
- 39 and equality, but he knew that the only way to make a difference
- 40 was to become involved, so over the years, he served in numerous
- 41 civil rights and community roles, attending political rallies and
- 42 caucuses, always seeking to ensure that the voice of the community
- 43 was heard; and

45	Taxpayers Civic and Voters League, Mr. Howard was instrumental in
46	securing federal funding through the Office of Economic
47	Development (OEO) for the establishment of a Community Action
48	Program (CAP) for Harrison County, which still exists today as the
49	Harrison County Community Action Agency; and
50	WHEREAS, Mr. Howard was also very passionate about the right
51	for a child to receive a quality education at all levels, so while
52	serving as a board member of the Community Action Program (CAP
53	Board), he had the opportunity to meet with lawmakers in
54	Washington, D.C., and became one of the community leaders
55	responsible for bringing the Head Start Program to Gulfport and
56	the Mississippi Gulf Coast; and
57	WHEREAS, additionally, he met with many parents concerned
58	about the integration of schools and other educational matters,
59	and while his children were in school, he was active in PTA and
60	numerous advisory boards for Gulfport City Schools; and
61	WHEREAS, Mr. Howard joined the order of Masons in 1946, where
62	he has served in numerous positions including Worshipful Master
63	and as Potentate in the Shriners after being elevated to 33rd
64	degree in 1985; and

WHEREAS, as a community activist, Mr. Howard has also served

in various capacities on community advisory boards for the City of

Gulfport, including the board for development at Jones Park, he

was instrumental in working with the Gulfport Police Department

WHEREAS, in 1966, as president of the Harrison County

- 69 Community Relations Division to start the "Neighborhood Watch" for
- 70 the citizens of the Soria City community, and for many years, he
- 71 served on the Board of Directors for the Gulf Coast Chapter of the
- 72 American Red Cross; and
- 73 WHEREAS, in addition to his dreams as a community activist,
- 74 Mr. Howard always wanted to own his own construction business one
- 75 day, so he attended trade school to learn all he could about
- 76 building and construction, never underestimating the importance of
- 77 math and solving equations, which tremendously aided him as a
- 78 young apprentice in his brother's construction business; and
- 79 WHEREAS, with much hard work and effort, Mr. Howard
- 80 eventually formed his own building contracting business, Howard's
- 81 Building Services, Incorporated, and he and his brother built
- 82 churches and homes throughout the Gulf Coast and South
- 83 Mississippi; and
- WHEREAS, Mr. Howard opened two movie theaters, "picture
- 85 shows" as they were called then, one in the Soria City community
- 86 and one in the North Gulfport community, to give the community
- 87 children somewhere to hang with their friends and enjoy cinematic
- 88 masterpieces, and both movie theaters were named "Embassy Theater"
- 89 and operated until the late 1960s; and
- 90 WHEREAS, above all else, the role of a family man has always
- 91 held an important meaning for Mr. Howard -- provider, nurturer,
- 92 teacher, leader and protector -- a lesson he learned at an early
- 93 age, especially the importance of love and togetherness, and his

94	role as a lather has not only been displayed with his children but
95	also to his grandchildren, great-grandchildren, nieces, nephews,
96	other relatives and neighborhood children as he continually tells
97	his grandchildren to "keep on pushing and they'll make it to the
98	top"; and
99	WHEREAS, being raised in a spiritual family, choosing to
100	serve on God's program came natural for Mr. Howard, who has been
101	an active member of Morning Star Baptist Church for more than 85
102	years, and as a church advisor, he has worked on a number of
103	committees and auxiliaries including serving as a Trustee, and as
104	a Sunday School teacher, he touched the lives and mentored many
105	young men who are now leaders in the church and the community; and
106	WHEREAS, it is the policy of the House of Representatives to
107	recognize and honor the lives of fine Mississippians, especially
108	those such as Sergeant Taylor Howard, a gracious man who
109	heroically served his country during World War II and continues to
110	selflessly serve his community, his family and his church,
111	striving daily for the betterment of all those around him,
112	bringing glory and honor to the State of Mississippi:
113	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF
114	REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, That we do hereby
115	recognize and honor the meritorious and distinguished service of
116	Sergeant Taylor Howard to his country during World War II and his
