SENATE BILL NO. 2432 (As Sent to Governor)

1 AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 37-16-11, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, 2 TO PROVIDE THAT THE SPECIAL MISSISSIPPI OCCUPATIONAL DIPLOMA FOR 3 STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES SHALL NOT BE AVAILABLE TO ANY STUDENT ENTERING THE NINTH GRADE IN THE 2017-2018 SCHOOL YEAR OR 4 5 THEREAFTER; TO AMEND SECTION 37-16-17, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, 6 TO PROVIDE THAT THE CAREER TRACK PROGRAM FOR STUDENTS NOT PURSUING 7 A BACCALAUREATE DEGREE SHALL NOT BE AVAILABLE TO ANY STUDENT ENTERING THE NINTH GRADE IN THE 2017-2018 SCHOOL YEAR OR 8 9 THEREAFTER; TO AMEND SECTION 37-23-147, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO REVISE THE PROCESS BY WHICH SCHOOLS PROVIDING FULL INCLUSION OF 10 11 STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES IN ALL ACADEMIC AND EXTRACURRICULAR 12 ACTIVITIES ARE RECOGNIZED; TO RENAME THE OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE AS 13 THE MISSISSIPPI SPECIAL EDUCATION ADVISORY PANEL; AND FOR RELATED 14 PURPOSES.

15 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:

16 SECTION 1. Section 37-16-11, Mississippi Code of 1972, is

17 amended as follows:

18 37-16-11. (1) A student who has been properly classified,

19 in accordance with rules established by the State Board \* \* \* of

20 Education shall, upon meeting all applicable requirements

21 prescribed by the district school board, be awarded a special

22 diploma in a form prescribed by the state board; however, such

23 special graduation requirements prescribed by the district school

24 board shall include minimum graduation requirements as prescribed

Any such student who meets all special 26 requirements of the district school board for his exceptionality, 27 but is unable to meet the appropriate special state minimum requirements, shall be awarded a special certificate of completion 28 29 in a form prescribed by the state board. Nothing provided in this 30 section, however, shall be construed to limit or restrict the right of an exceptional student solely to a special diploma. Any 31 32 such student shall, upon proper request, be afforded the 33 opportunity to fully meet all requirements of Section 37-16-7 34 through the standard procedures established therein and thereby 35 qualify for a standard diploma upon graduation.

36 (2) The State Board of Education shall develop and issue
37 criteria for a Mississippi Occupational Diploma for students
38 having a disability as defined by the federal Individuals with
39 Disabilities Education Act. Beginning with the 2002-2003 school
40 year, any such student, upon proper request, shall be afforded the
41 opportunity to fully meet such requirements and qualify for an
42 occupational diploma upon graduation.

43 (3) The special Mississippi Occupational Diploma for
44 students with disabilities shall not be available to any student
45 entering the Ninth Grade in the 2017-2018 school year or
46 thereafter, pending State Board of Education approval of new
47 graduation options.

48 SECTION 2. Section 37-16-17, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 49 amended as follows:

50 37-16-17. (1) Purpose. (a) The purpose of this section is 51 to create a quality option in Mississippi's high schools for 52 students not wishing to pursue a baccalaureate degree, which shall 53 consist of challenging academic courses and modern 54 career-technical studies. The goal for students pursuing the 55 career track is to graduate from high school with a standard 56 diploma and credit toward a community college certification in a career-technical field. These students also shall be encouraged 57 58 to take the national assessment in the career-technical field in 59 which they become certified.

60 (b) The State Board of Education shall develop and 61 adopt course and curriculum requirements for career track programs 62 offered by local public school boards in accordance with this 63 section. The Mississippi Community College Board and the State 64 Board of Education jointly shall determine course and curriculum 65 requirements for the career track program.

66 Alternative career track; description; curriculum. (2)(a) A career track shall provide a student with greater technical 67 68 skill and a strong academic core and shall be offered to each high 69 school student enrolled in a public school district. The career 70 track program shall be linked to postsecondary options and shall 71 prepare students to pursue either a degree or certification from a 72 postsecondary institution, an industry-based training or 73 certification, an apprenticeship, the military, or immediate entrance into a career field. The career track shall be designed 74

75 primarily for those students who are not college bound and shall 76 provide them with alternatives to entrance into a four-year 77 university or college after high school graduation.

(b) Students pursuing a career track shall be afforded
the opportunity to dually enroll in a community or technical
college or to participate in a business internship or work-study
program, when such opportunities are available and appropriate.

82 (c) Each public school district shall offer a career83 track program approved by the State Board of Education.

84 (d) Students in a career track program shall complete
85 an academic core of courses and a career and technical sequence of
86 courses.

87 (e) The twenty-one (21) course unit requirements for 88 the career track shall consist of the following:

89 (i) At least four (4) English credits, including90 English I and English II.

91 (ii) At least three (3) mathematics credits,92 including Algebra I.

93 (iii) At least three (3) science credits,94 including one (1) unit of biology.

95 (iv) At least three (3) social studies credits, 96 including one (1) unit of U.S. History and one (1) unit of 97 Mississippi Studies/U.S. Government.

98 (v) At least one-half (1/2) credit in health or99 physical education.

(vi) At least four (4) credits in career and technical education courses in the dual enrollment-dual credit programs authorized under Section 37-15-38.

103 (vii) At least one (1) credit in integrated 104 technology with optional end of course testing.

(viii) At least two and one-half (2-1/2) credits in additional electives or career and technical education courses required by the local school board, as approved by the State Board of Education. Academic courses within the career track of the standard diploma shall provide the knowledge and skill necessary for proficiency on the state subject area tests.

(3) Nothing in this section shall disallow the development of a dual enrollment program with a technical college so long as an individual school district, with approval from the State Department of Education, agrees to implement such a program in connection with a technical college and the agreement is also approved by the proprietary school's commission.

117 <u>(4) The career track program for students not pursuing a</u> 118 <u>Baccalaureate Degree shall not be available to any student</u> 119 <u>entering the Ninth Grade in the 2017-2018 school year or</u> 120 thereafter.

SECTION 3. Section 37-23-147, Mississippi Code of 1972, is amended as follows:

123 37-23-147. (1) The State Department of Education shall 124 establish goals for the performance of \* \* \* students with

125 disabilities that will promote the purpose of IDEA and are 126 consistent, to the maximum extent appropriate, with other goals 127 and standards for \* \* \* students established by the State Department of Education. Performance indicators used to assess 128 129 progress toward achieving those goals that, at a minimum, address 130 the performance of **\* \* \*** students with disabilities on assessments, drop-out rates, and graduation rates shall be 131 132 developed. Every two (2) years, the progress toward meeting the 133 established performance goals shall be reported to the public.

To encourage the full inclusion of \* \* \* students with 134 (2)135 disabilities in all aspects of academic and extracurricular 136 activities, the State Department of Education \* \* \* may provide 137 special recognition to the schools receiving such designation and 138 their school districts. Examples of such recognition may include, 139 but not be limited to: public announcements and events, 140 certificates of recognition and plaques for teachers, principals, superintendents and parents, and media announcements utilizing the 141 services of Mississippi Educational Television. This special 142 143 recognition \* \* \* may be awarded to \* \* \* elementary, \* \* \* 144 middle \* \* \* or high schools, based on entries submitted to the 145 Mississippi Special Education Advisory \* \* \* Panel by the deadline **\* \* \*** to be determined annually by the panel. 146 These entries shall be in the form of a report, \* \* \* listing the name, 147 address and telephone number of the school district/school; 148 149 teacher or staff responsible for administering the program; type

No. 2432 17/SS02/R354SG PAGE 6 150 of position held by each of these employees including credentials; 151 description of the program; number of students with disabilities 152 included; type and level of severity of disabilities; number of 153 students without disabilities involved in the program; how long 154 the program has been in operation; benefit of program to all 155 students; and a description of how this program could be 156 replicated by other school districts. Winners of the Exemplary 157 Inclusion Program contest shall be chosen annually by the 158 Mississippi Special Education Advisory \* \* \* Panel at a date 159 determined by the panel.

Recognition **\* \* \*** <u>may</u> be given to these schools during **\* \* \*** <u>a meeting of the</u> Mississippi State Board of Education **\* \* \*** <u>at a</u> <u>date determined by the board</u>. Information on these exemplary programs shall be provided to other school districts and the general public through news releases, the state department website, and other similar avenues.
