HOUSE BILL NO. 1202

AN ACT TO CREATE THE "KAELIN KERSH ACT"; TO AMEND SECTION 63-7-19, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO REQUIRE THAT ANY OPERATOR OF AN EMERGENCY VEHICLE AUTHORIZED TO BE MARKED WITH BLINKING, ROTATING OR OSCILLATING LIGHTS SHALL USE BLINKING, ROTATING OR OSCILLATING LIGHTS WHEN OPERATING THE EMERGENCY VEHICLE AT A SPEED IN EXCESS OF THIRTY MILES PER HOUR OVER THE POSTED SPEED LIMIT; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 9 <u>SECTION 1.</u> This act shall be known and may be cited as the

10 "Kaelin Kersh Act."

SECTION 2. Section 63-7-19, Mississippi Code of 1972, is amended as follows:

13 63-7-19. (1) (a) Except as otherwise provided for unmarked vehicles under Section 19-25-15 and Section 25-1-87, every police 14 vehicle shall be marked with blue lights. Every ambulance and 15 16 special use EMS vehicle as defined in Section 41-59-3 shall be 17 marked with red lights front and back and also may be marked with 18 white and amber lights in addition to red lights. Every emergency management/civil defense vehicle, including emergency response 19 20 vehicles of the Department of Environmental Quality, shall be

No. 1202 G1/2 18/HR26/R440.1 PAGE 1 (CAA\KW) 21 marked with blinking, rotating or oscillating red lights. 22 Official vehicles of a 911 Emergency Communications District may 23 be marked with red and white lights. Every wrecker or other vehicle used for emergency work, except vehicles authorized to use 24 25 blue or red lights, shall be marked with blinking, oscillating or 26 rotating amber-colored lights to warn other vehicles to yield the 27 right-of-way, as provided in Section 63-3-809. Only police 28 vehicles used for emergency work may be marked with blinking, 29 oscillating or rotating blue lights to warn other vehicles to yield the right-of-way. Only law enforcement vehicles, fire 30 31 vehicles, private or department-owned vehicles used by firemen of 32 volunteer fire departments which receive funds pursuant to Section 83-1-39 when responding to calls, emergency management/civil 33 defense vehicles, emergency response vehicles of the Department of 34 Environmental Quality, ambulances used for emergency work, and 911 35 36 Emergency Communications District vehicles may be marked with 37 blinking, oscillating or rotating red lights to warn other vehicles to yield the right-of-way. This section shall not apply 38 39 to school buses carrying lighting devices in accordance with Section 63-7-23. 40

41 (b) Emergency response vehicles listed in this
42 subsection (1) are also authorized to use alternating flashing
43 headlights when responding to any emergency.

44 (2) Any vehicle operated by a United States rural mail45 carrier for the purpose of delivering United States mail may be

46 marked with two (2) amber-colored lights on front top of the 47 vehicle and two (2) red-colored lights on rear top of the vehicle 48 and alternatively or additionally may be marked with a white, 49 flashing strobe light on the roof of the vehicle so as to warn 50 approaching travelers to decrease their speed because of danger of 51 colliding with the mail carrier as he stops and starts along the 52 edge of the road, street or highway.

53 Any sanitation vehicle operated by a county, (3) 54 municipality or other political subdivision of this state or by a 55 contractor under contract with a county, municipality or other 56 political subdivision of this state to collect solid waste, refuse 57 or recyclable material may be marked with flashing or oscillating 58 white- or amber-colored lights so as to warn approaching travelers 59 to decrease speed because of the danger of colliding with the sanitation collection vehicle as it stops and starts along the 60 61 road, street or highway.

(4) Any nonlaw enforcement vehicle being used to lead and
facilitate the movement of a military funeral procession may be
marked with blinking, rotating or oscillating purple lights.
"Military funeral procession" means two (2) or more vehicles
accompanying the body of a deceased member of the United States
Armed Forces, or traveling to the church, chapel or other location
at which the funeral service or entombment is to be held.

69 (5) Any operator of an emergency vehicle authorized to be
70 marked with blinking, rotating or oscillating lights in accordance

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71 with this section, shall use blinking, rotating or oscillating 72 lights when operating the emergency vehicle at a speed in excess 73 of thirty (30) miles per hour over the posted speed limit. 74 SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from 75 and after July 1, 2018.

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
