HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 80

1 A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION COMMENDING THE VALIANT SERVICE AND 2 MOURNING THE LOSS OF UNITED STATES NAVY COMMANDER JOSEPH ALLEN 3 LACOUR, JR., UPON HIS PASSING.

WHEREAS, it is written in Ecclesiastes 3:1 that "To everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under the Heaven," and as such, on February 23, 2018, the immaculate author and finisher of our soul's destiny summoned the mortal presence of dearly beloved, United States Navy Commander Joseph Allen LaCour, Jr., to eternal rest, rendering great sorrow and loss to his family and friends; and

11 WHEREAS, born on March 7, 1924, in Memphis, Tennessee, to 12 Joseph Allen LaCour, Sr., and Gladys Anderson LaCour, Commander 13 LaCour graduated from Canton High School in Canton, Mississippi, 14 on June 2, 1942, and he was sworn into the V5 Flight Training 15 Program the very next day; and

16 WHEREAS, after negotiating three basic flight training 17 schools, Commander LaCour was selected for advanced flight 18 training at Pensacola NAS and then he was selected for Squadron

No. 80 **~ OFFICIAL ~** N1/2 18/HR31/R2128 PAGE 1 (MCL\JAB) 4-Fighter flight training, and on September 10, 1943, he became Aviator #P-5998, and he served as an instructor pilot before serving in both the Atlantic and Pacific theaters, flying the F4F-5 Super Wildcat, F6F Hellcat, F8F Bearcat, F4U Corsair, as well as other various aircraft; and

24 WHEREAS, Commander LaCour served aboard the USS Corregidor, 25 CVE 58, an escort aircraft carrier in the Pacific, which was 26 primarily used to support the other larger Essex, Hornet and 27 Yorktown class carriers with replacement planes and pilots in the 28 Pacific; and

29 WHEREAS, after his service, Commander LaCour returned to 30 Canton, and he attended Millsaps College, playing on the football 31 team and earning his bachelor's degree in history, and he 32 furthered his education by attending the National Hardwood Lumber 33 Association's Inspection School in Memphis, Tennessee; and

34 WHEREAS, Commander LaCour returned to Canton again in 1949, 35 and he married Helen O'Bannon and joined his father in forming J.A. LaCour & Company, which engages in the international business 36 37 of importing and exporting hardwoods, and with this business, he 38 had the opportunity to travel the globe, visiting numerous 39 continents and regions, such as Europe, the Far East, Africa, the Near East, South America, Central America and North America, and 40 41 he continued to be actively involved in the company until his 42 passing; and

No. 80 **~ OFFICIAL ~** 18/HR31/R2128 PAGE 2 (MCL\JAB) 43 WHEREAS, being devoted to his country, Commander LaCour continued in the active naval reserves in a variety of surface and 44 air assignments, and he commanded the Air Wing 82 intelligence 45 group comprised of 35 intelligence officers from 1968 until 1971, 46 47 and in 1984 he retired from the United States Navy at the 48 mandatory age of 60 with the permanent rank of Commander, but he elected to remain on the officer recall list for life and has been 49 50 on that list for 76 years; and

51 WHEREAS, not only was Commander LaCour dedicated to serving 52 his country, he was also tremendously devoted to serving his 53 community and his church as former president of Canton Country 54 Club and as former president of the Canton Academy School Board, 55 and serving several terms on the Vestry of Grace Episcopal Church 56 and serving as Madison County Election Commissioner, and he was a member of numerous organizations, such as the National Hardwood 57 58 Lumber Association, the Southwestern Lumberman's Club, the Memphis 59 Lumberman's Club and the International Trade Club of Mississippi, and he was a passionate advocate for the Boy Scouts of America, 60 61 where he earned the rank of Eagle Scout, which is the highest rank 62 achievable in the Boy Scouts; and

63 WHEREAS, though he has traversed the river of life to now 64 stand upon the golden heavenly shores, the legacy of Commander 65 Joseph Allen LaCour, Jr.'s selfless service and commitment to his 66 family, his state and to the United States will forever be etched 67 in the hearts and memories of his loving survivors: his wife of
