5	WHEREAS, the Tri-County Workforce Alliance (TCWA), which
6	serves Bolivar, Coahoma and Quitman Counties and promotes
7	long-term economic and community development by building a
8	competitive healthy workforce through job training, will be
9	honored by the Community Foundation of Northwest Mississippi as
10	the 2017 Nonprofit of the Year Award recipient, during the
11	foundation's 18th Crystal Ball, held on Saturday, January 20,
12	2017; and
13	WHEREAS, a nonprofit community-based organization that seeks
14	to improve the economic livelihoods and well-being of families
15	living in rural and economically vulnerable communities, the
16	Tri-County Workforce Alliance has expanded its work footprint by
17	adding Sunflower and Tallahatchie Counties to the genesis of its
18	academic outreach of offering middle school, high school and young

- 19 adult health education and workforce development programs embedded
- 20 in larger networks to address socioeconomic challenges; and
- 21 WHEREAS, led by director, Josephine Rhymes, TCWA focuses on
- 22 human resource development in health-related fields, building
- 23 educational and career pathways, reducing the healthcare workforce
- 24 shortage and advancing local capacity to address health
- 25 disparities; and
- 26 WHEREAS, since its inception, TCWA has leveraged more than
- 27 \$1.5 million from foundations, local, state and federal government
- 28 and private sector funds to serve more than 5,000 individuals
- 29 classified as Future Workforce members through such programs as
- 30 the Middle School Academy for Science, Math and Reading for
- 31 Potential Health Care Professions, the High School Mentorship
- 32 Program in Health Care Profession, High School Health Councils,
- 33 Problem Solving for Better Health workshops and Ready, Set, Go
- 34 summer camps; and
- 35 WHEREAS, the Middle School Academy for Science, Math, and
- 36 Reading for Potential Health Care Professionals, first implemented
- 37 in 2011 to serve students in Grades 6 through 8, provides academic
- 38 enrichment and professional development programming, including
- 39 Saturday events during the academic year and a multi-week summer
- 40 institute which provides opportunities for students to learn about
- 41 the various fields of health and necessary skill sets for those
- 42 fields; and

43	WHEREAS, the High School Mentorship Program in Health Care
44	Professions, started in 2009, which now serves students in Grades
45	9 through 12 from all five of the service counties, provides
46	academic support, college visits, experiential learning
47	opportunities and positive social networks for youth who are
48	interested in attending college and pursuing employment in health
49	care professions by affording those students the opportunity to
50	engage in job shadowing with health care professionals; and
51	WHEREAS, through its collaboration with the New Pathway to
52	Health and Opportunity Initiative, which includes the Aaron E.
53	Henry Community Health Services Center, Inc., Mississippi Hospital
54	Association Foundation, Dreyfus Health Foundation of the Rogosin
55	Institute and its Center for Health Action and Policy, and the
56	University of Mississippi Center for Population Studies and its
57	academic minor in Society and Health, TCWA positions high school
58	seniors to be eligible to take classes to become certified nursing
59	assistants, phlebotomists or echocardiogram technicians through
60	community colleges with the help of the Mississippi Hospital
61	Association Foundation, and to expand academic course work through
62	dual enrollment classes; and
63	WHEREAS, it is the policy of the House of Representatives to
64	recognize and commend the outstanding efforts of such devoted
65	organizations as the Tri-County Workforce Alliance, which has
66	committed countless resources to the advancement of the well-being
67	of families through the promotion of education and job training:
