## SENATE BILL NO. 2581

1 AN ACT TO CREATE THE "MISSISSIPPI WORKS CAREER-TECH SCHOLARS 2 PROGRAM" TO PROVIDE FUNDS TO HELP ELIGIBLE STUDENTS OF PUBLIC 3 COMMUNITY AND JUNIOR COLLEGES WHO ARE ENROLLED IN IDENTIFIED CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION PROGRAMS PAY THE COST OF TUITION 5 NOT COVERED BY FEDERAL, STATE AND INSTITUTIONAL AID; TO PROVIDE STUDENT QUALIFICATIONS FOR THE PROGRAM; TO PRESCRIBE THE 7 RESPONSIBILITIES OF STATE AGENCIES AND THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE 8 SYSTEM IN THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE PROGRAM; AND FOR RELATED 9 PURPOSES. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:

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- 11 SECTION 1. (1) This section shall be known as the
- 12 Mississippi Works Career-Tech Scholars Program. The Mississippi
- 13 Works Career-Tech Scholars Program (the program) shall serve as a
- 14 Last-Dollar Scholarship Program for eligible students by providing
- 15 financial assistance to students who enroll in career and
- 16 technical education certificate and associate of applied science
- 17 programs identified through sector analysis to meet Mississippi's
- 18 workforce demands.
- 19 In order to participate in the program, a student must:
- 20 (a) Be a legal resident of the State of Mississippi as
- 21 provided under Section 37-103-15, if legally married;

22 (b) Be admitted to a public community or junior co	colleae
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- 23 and apply for and accept all offers for all available federal,
- 24 state and institutional aid;
- 25 (c) Enroll in a minimum of fifteen (15) credit hours in
- 26 an approved/identified career-tech program offered at a public
- 27 community or junior college. For programs with less than fifteen
- 28 (15) credit hours per semester, work-based learning (WBL) credits
- 29 may be included to meet the minimum of fifteen (15) credit hour
- 30 enrollment.
- 31 (d) For participants employed full time, the student
- 32 must provide a letter from the employer to certify employment and
- 33 must maintain a minimum of nine (9) credit hours each semester
- 34 (may include WBL credits) in a credit-bearing approved/identified
- 35 career-tech program offered at one (1) of the public community or
- 36 junior colleges.
- 37 (3) Once admitted into the program, participating students:
- 38 (a) Must maintain a 2.0 grade point average each
- 39 semester; and
- 40 (b) Participate in available work-based learning
- 41 opportunities in field of study, if the business or industry
- 42 provides this option.
- 43 (4) The program is nontransferable; thus, a student who
- 44 transfers to another public community or junior college shall not
- 45 be eligible for the program at the transfer institution.

46	(5) For programs eligible for the Mississippi Works
47	Career-Tech Scholars Program, participant eligibility will end
48	once the participant's total attempted credit hours equals the
49	program's established and approved total credit hours.

- 50 By September 1 of each program year, the Mississippi 51 Community College Board, with assistance from the Postsecondary 52 Financial Assistance Board, shall provide to the Legislature an 53 evaluation of the program from the previous fiscal year. 54 report shall include the number of participants of the program, 55 the cost associated with the program, approved career-tech 56 programs in which participants enrolled and progress made by 57 participants toward a degree or certificate.
- It shall be the responsibility of each of a committee of 58 59 Financial Aid Directors appointed by the Postsecondary Financial Aid Board to establish a statewide application, including specific 60 61 submission timeframes, for the program. Applications for the 62 program shall include information about how students can apply for and receive federal, state and institutional aid. Additionally, 63 64 program participants shall work with the community colleges' 65 financial aid office to determine what scholarships and grants are 66 available.
- 67 Sector strategies and eligible career-tech programs (8) 68 shall be selected by:
- 69 The Mississippi Development Authority (MDA), in collaboration with the Mississippi Community College Board and the 70

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- 71 Mississippi Association of Community and Junior Colleges, will
- 72 identify eligible occupations within sectors of interest to the
- 73 state and will work with local economic developers to identify
- 74 eligible occupations in sectors of importance at the local level.
- 75 (b) The State Longitudinal Data System (SLDS) will
- 76 provide the information to identify the opportunity occupations.
- 77 (c) The Mississippi Development Authority will be
- 78 responsible for promoting economic opportunities in eligible
- 79 occupations for individuals who will engage in programs designed
- 80 to help them gain the necessary academic and industry credentials
- 81 along with life and practical skills to include apprenticeship
- 82 programs or the Mississippi Integrated Basic Education and Skills
- 83 Training (MIBEST) program offered at the community and junior
- 84 colleges.
- 85 (d) The State Workforce Investment Board (SWIB) will be
- 86 responsible for coordinating workforce activities that will
- 87 provide the necessary additional supporting services to succeed in
- 88 the community college program and in the labor market.
- (e) Each public community and junior college shall have
- 90 a minimum of one (1) career-tech program approved to participate
- 91 in the scholarship program.
- 92 (f) Approved programs shall be consistent with those
- 93 sectors identified by the four (4) workforce development districts
- 94 across the state, and the career-tech programs shall lead to
- 95 high-skill, high-wage jobs.

96	(g) Sectors and eligible career-tech programs will be
97	reviewed every two (2) years through a collaborative process
98	between collaboration with the Mississippi Community College Board
99	and the Mississippi Association of Community and Junior Colleges
100	to ensure job availability remains current. Student participants
101	already enrolled in an eligible program prior to the review
102	process aforementioned will remain eligible until completion of a
103	certificate or associate of applied science in the program
104	provided all other eligibility requirements are met.

- 105 (9) The Mississippi Works Career-Tech Scholars Program shall
  106 be administered by the State Financial Aid Office of the
  107 Postsecondary Education Financial Assistance Board with the
  108 Mississippi Development Authority, the Mississippi Community
  109 College Board, and the Mississippi Association of Community and
  110 Junior Colleges establishing eligible career-tech programs at the
  111 community and junior colleges.
  - (10) It is the intention of the Legislature that no General Funds authorized to be expended for this purpose shall be used to replace federal funds, other state funds, local government funds, and/or institutional funds, which are being used to assist students with the cost of tuition authorized under the provisions of this act and which are withdrawn and no longer available.
- 118 (11) The program shall be contingent upon the availability
  119 of funds appropriated by the Legislature. Funds appropriated for
  120 the program shall be in addition to the appropriations received

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121	each year to operate each community and junior college. The
122	Mississippi Community College Board shall determine for each fall
123	and spring semester the state's actual share of the cost of the
124	program for each college. If legislative funding is not
125	sufficient to meet the needs of all eligible students, the State
126	Financial Aid Office shall reduce the allocation of funds to each
127	college in proportion to the state's actual share of the cost of
128	the program for each college, in order to determine the unfunded
129	tuition cost at each college and to calculate the reduced amount
130	to allocate and distribute to each college.

- 131 (12) Funding for the Mississippi Works Career-Tech Scholars
  132 program shall be appropriated to the State Financial Aid Office of
  133 the Postsecondary Education Financial Assistance Board.
- 134 (13) Any unfunded tuition shall be the responsibility of the 135 student.
  - (14) Any funds appropriated for this act which are not expended during the fiscal year for which they were appropriated shall not lapse into the State General Fund and shall be carried forward for the same purposes during the succeeding fiscal year.
- 140 (15) Public and private entities that provide financial 141 contributions to existing community or junior college tuition 142 guarantee programs may and are encouraged to continue to do so.
- 143 (16) In accordance with Section 37-103-25, each community
  144 and junior college shall solely be responsible for setting tuition
  145 and fees to be paid by students.

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146	(17) Students who participate in the program shall be
147	eligible for community and junior college reimbursement purposes
148	of state appropriations, provided they meet established admission
149	and attendance requirements.

- 150 (18) Should approved career-tech programs reach enrollment 151 capacity, priority shall be given to military personnel when 152 possible.
- 153 **SECTION 2.** This act shall take effect and be in force from 154 and after July 1, 2018.
