1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8	AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 37-3-87, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO RECOMMEND A COMPREHENSIVE EYE EXAMINATION FOR ALL STUDENTS PRIOR TO ENTERING OR ENROLLING FOR THE FIRST TIME IN A PUBLIC, PRIVATE OR PAROCHIAL SCHOOL; TO PROVIDE STANDARDS FOR REQUIRED EYE EXAMINATIONS FOR THIS ACT; TO DIRECT THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION WITH INPUT FROM THE MISSISSIPPI VISION FOUNDATION TO DEVELOP AND ISSUE REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING THE PROCESS OF PROGRAM; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.
9	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
10	SECTION 1. Section 37-3-87, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
11	amended as follows:
12	37-3-87. (1) This section shall be known and may be cited
13	as the "Mississippi Vision for Better Learning Program."
14	(2) Beginning July 1, 2018, prior to a student entering or
15	enrolling for the first time in a Mississippi public, private or
16	parochial school approved and accredited by the State Board of
17	Education, should have a comprehensive eye examination performed
18	by an optometrist or ophthalmologist. Before the end of the first
19	semester of the start of the school year, the parent or guardian
20	of each student shall present to the appropriate school personnel
21	evidence that the student passed an eye examination within the

22	previous six (6) months or a waiver by the parent or guardian of
23	each student opting out of the eye examination. The State
24	Department of Education, with the advice of the Mississippi Vision
25	Foundation, on or before July 1, 2018, shall promulgate rules
26	establishing the criteria for meeting the requirements of this
27	comprehensive eye examination program which shall include, but not
28	be limited to, the following:
29	(a) A comprehensive eye examination shall include
30	measurement of visual acuity; ocular alignment and motility; depth
31	perception-stereopsis; fusion; slit lamp; examination of the
32	anterior and posteriorsegment and pupils; and cycloplegic
33	refraction and dilated fundus examination when deemed appropriate
34	by the examiner.
35	(b) Any eye doctor who conducts a comprehensive eye
36	examination of a student given in accordance with the provisions
37	of this section shall forward a written report of the results of
38	the examination to the parent or guardian of such student and the
39	student's primary health care provider. It shall be the
40	responsibility of the parent or guardian to forward a copy of the
41	report to school health personnel. The report shall include, but
42	<pre>not be limited to, the following:</pre>
43	(i) Date of report;
44	(ii) Name, address and date of birth of the
45	<pre>student;</pre>
46	(iii) Name of the student's school;

(iv) Type of examination;
(v) A summary of significant findings, including
diagnoses, medication used, duration of action of medication,
treatment, prognosis, whether or not a return visit is recommended
and if so, when;
(vi) Recommended educational adjustments for the
child, if any, which may include: preferential seating in the
classroom, eyeglasses for full-time use in school, eyeglasses for
part-time use in school, sight-saving eyeglasses or any other
recommendations;
(vii) Name, address and signature of the examiner.
(c) Enforcement of the provisions of this subsection
(2) shall be performed by the local school superintendent or his
designee, the headmaster of the private or parochial school, or
his designee, or the director of the kindergarten program, as
appropriate.
(***3) In addition to the comprehensive eye examination
required under subsection (2), the State Department of Education
is hereby authorized and empowered to establish a student
vision_screening program to make eye_screening services available
to students in Grades K-12 in the public schools in order to
detect vision problems which can lead to academic problems. Such
eye-screening service shall be based on a process that is
screening in nature, and not diagnostic, which is intended to
identify with a reasonably high probability, students with a wide

- 73 professional for examination, diagnosis and corrective
- 74 recommendation. Each school shall be provided with a list of the
- 75 students screened, and their results. Statistical summaries of
- 76 the screening results shall be provided to each school, and
- 77 composite statistics by school system, county or district shall be
- 78 provided to the State Department of Education. The State
- 79 Department of Education may contract with any legal entity to
- 80 administer the student vision-screening program on the school
- 81 district level, and such contract shall be let on a competitive
- 82 basis. State funding for said program shall only be available
- 83 subject to appropriation by the Legislature.
- 84 (* * *4) The school board of any local school district
- 85 shall cooperate with the State Department of Education and any
- 86 entity under contract with the departments to implement the
- 87 student eye examination or vision-screening programs established
- 88 under this section.

- 90 (5) Any additional costs for student eye examinations that
- 91 <u>are not covered by existing insurance or public assistance</u>
- 92 programs shall be managed by the Mississippi Vision Foundation.
- 93 **SECTION 2.** This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 94 and after its passage.
