- WHEREAS, Stanley Dearman, 84, Editor and Publisher of a
- 5 weekly newspaper in Philadelphia, Mississippi, whose editorials
- 6 expressing outrage at the 1964 murders of three young Civil Rights
- 7 workers helped set the stage for the Mississippi Civil Rights
- 8 Movement, passed away on February 25, 2017, and returned to the
- 9 red clay soil of Neshoba County. He retired after 34 years of
- 10 publishing The Neshoba Democrat weekly newspaper in Philadelphia
- 11 from 1966 to 2000; and
- 12 WHEREAS, the retired Editor and Publisher of The Neshoba
- 13 Democrat received the University of Mississippi's highest
- 14 journalism award and was recognized in tributes as a legendary
- 15 newspaperman who displayed raw courage over a career that spanned
- 16 four decades. Dearman received the prestigious Silver Em Award,
- 17 joining a distinguished club of noted journalists. The accolade
- 18 was Dearman's second prestigious award since his retirement in

- 19 2000. In 2005, he was inducted into the Mississippi Press
- 20 Association Hall of Fame; and
- 21 WHEREAS, in a eulogy, James E. Prince III, the current Editor
- 22 and Publisher of The Neshoba Democrat, pointed out how Dearman
- 23 stood against one of the fiercest evils of our age, the murders of
- 24 three young men registering blacks to vote in 1964, comparing
- 25 Dearman to the Old Testament Prophet Habakkuk who was instructed
- 26 by the Lord to write plainly about the Lord's goodness in the face
- 27 of great evil. "His greatest gift was words," Prince said. "He
- 28 was stern and unbending, yet compassionate and kind"; and
- 29 WHEREAS, Arthur Stanley Dearman was born on July 24, 1932, in
- 30 Meridian, Mississippi. He graduated from the University of
- 31 Mississippi, where he was Editor of the Student Newspaper. He was
- 32 a Reporter and Editor at The Meridian Star before joining The
- 33 Neshoba Democrat as a Reporter in the early 1960s, then buying the
- 34 paper. In 2007, he received an award from his alma mater for
- 35 Journalistic Excellence; and
- 36 WHEREAS, Mr. Dearman, who was living in retirement in Gulf
- 37 Breeze, is survived by his wife, Carolyn; son, Leigh; daughter,
- 38 Lisa Daniels; sisters: Ruth Geiger, Sylvia Crowson, Nellah
- 39 Prezalor and Mary Ray; and five grandchildren; and
- 40 WHEREAS, fortunately he lived long enough to see the fruits
- 41 of his labor when his beloved hometown of Philadelphia united
- 42 across racial lines to bring a significant measure of justice for
- 43 the murders of those young men in 1964. This momentous step would

- 44 not have occurred without this remarkable man. For that,
- 45 Mississippi's history should note and recall his heroism in the
- 46 face of great danger:
- 47 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF
- 48 MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That
- 49 we do hereby mourn the loss of Mississippi Journalism Legend and
- 50 Publisher of The Neshoba Democrat Newspaper Stanley Dearman, and
- 51 pay tribute and cherish fondly the memory of this most
- 52 public-spirited citizen of Mississippi.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this resolution be presented to
- 54 the surviving family of Arthur Stanley Dearman and made available
- 55 to the Capitol Press Corps.
