SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 575

1 A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE LEGACY OF WILLORA 2 CRAFT EPHRAM, THE OWNER OF JACKSON LANDMARK "PEACHES RESTAURANT," 3 AND EXTENDING THE CONDOLENCES OF THE LEGISLATURE ON HER PASSING. 4 WHEREAS, it is with sadness that we note the passing of Willora Craft Ephram, the owner of Peaches Restaurant, a Jackson 5 landmark, who passed away on January 28, 2018; and 6 WHEREAS, Willora Craft Ephram was affectionately known as 7 "Peaches." Ms. Ephram saved her money until she was able to open 8 9 the Southern soul-food restaurant in 1961. Everyone from Muhammad 10 Ali to Medgar Evers to Barack Obama visited the eatery; and 11 WHEREAS, along with delicious food, a bit of history comes with the Peaches experience. During the Civil Rights Era, leaders 12 13 of the Movement dined in the restaurant, and President Barack 14 Obama made a stop at Peaches Restaurant during his trip to Jackson while on the campaign trail. Integration took away the core 15 16 African-American businesses from Farish Street during the 1970s, 17 causing many to close or relocate. But Peaches Restaurant

remained much as it was; and

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- 19 WHEREAS, Peaches Restaurant was a soul-food Mecca on Farish
- 20 Street since Willora "Peaches" Ephram first opened the doors in
- 21 1961. Her son, Roderick Ephram, continued to run Peaches
- 22 Restaurant until its closing in 2013. Roderick is proud of the
- 23 rich history and symbolism his mother's restaurant has in the City
- 24 of Jackson. While Peaches did not have a formal mission
- 25 statement, Ephram says, "Just know that it was Jackson's original
- 26 soul-food restaurant"; and
- 27 WHEREAS, Ephram says that Peaches had a positive influence,
- 28 mainly because the restaurant welcomed everyone with open arms.
- 29 His mother's goal, he says, was to feed the people, even the ones
- 30 who were homeless. This kind of warm welcome may be why Peaches
- 31 Restaurant was successful for so long. The city is making moves
- 32 to revitalize the historic Farish Street area, once a thriving
- 33 African-American community in the heart of Jackson before
- 34 desegregation and urban renewal; and
- 35 WHEREAS, in 2002, Ms. Ephram received a Hometown Hero in
- 36 Travel and Tourism Award from the Jackson Convention and Visitors
- 37 Bureau. She also received Keys to the City from two Jackson
- 38 mayors. In 2013, illness caused Ms. Ephram to step down from
- 39 running the business; and
- 40 WHEREAS, it is with great pride that we pay tribute to the
- 41 history of this iconic Jackson family business and cherish fondly
- 42 the memory of a most public-spirited citizen of Mississippi:

43	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF
44	MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That
45	we do hereby recognize the legacy of Willora Craft Ephram, the
46	owner of Jackson Landmark "Peaches Restaurant," and extend the
47	condolences of the Legislature on her passing.
48	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this resolution be presented to
49	the surviving family of "Peaches" Ephram and made available to the
50	Capitol Press Corps.
