SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 656

- A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION JOINING THE UNIVERSITY OF MISSISSIPPI IN COMMEMORATING THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE 1968 "MULE TRAIN-POOR PEOPLE'S CAMPAIGN MARCH" FROM MARKS, MISSISSIPPI, TO WASHINGTON, D.C.
- 5 WHEREAS, fifty years ago in April 1968, Martin Luther King,
- 6 Jr., was scheduled to lead 28 wagons pulled by mules in a caravan
- 7 from poverty-stricken Marks, Mississippi, to the nation's Capitol.
- 8 While the Civil Rights Icon's assassination delayed the Mule
- 9 Train, the Campaign for jobs and justice did eventually make its
- 10 1,000-mile, monthlong trek from Quitman County to Pennsylvania
- 11 Avenue; and
- 12 WHEREAS, as part of a yearlong monthly series of events
- 13 commemorating the anniversary of that historic event, The
- 14 University of Mississippi is hosting a National Conference for
- 15 academicians and other interested people. "Honoring the 50th
- 16 Anniversary of the 1968 Mule Train-Poor People's Campaign by
- 17 Implementing Classroom Theory in Marks, Mississippi," will be held
- 18 March 28-29, 2018, at various locations on campus and in Marks.

19 The university's McLean Institute for Public Service and Community

- 20 Engagement, Center for Population Studies and the Department of
- 21 Sociology and Anthropology are co-sponsors; and
- 22 WHEREAS, community engagement through community-based
- 23 participatory research is essential for more equitable approaches
- 24 to social and economic development. To advance the intent of the
- 25 Mule Train will improve well-being, connect the talents and
- 26 resources of community changemakers, and the faculty, staff and
- 27 students working through the university; and
- 28 WHEREAS, the 50th Anniversary observance began in Marks in
- 29 May 2017, and will conclude there in May 2018. Each month honors
- 30 different Mule Train participants and highlights their
- 31 contribution to the campaign. A week of special events is
- 32 scheduled for May 13-18 in Marks to end the observance. Former
- 33 U.S. Representative Andrew Young, Jr., is scheduled to speak at
- 34 the closing ceremony. An early leader in the Civil Rights
- 35 Movement, Young served as Executive Director of the Southern
- 36 Christian Leadership Conference and a close confidant of King. He
- 37 later became active in politics, serving first as a Congressman
- 38 from Georgia, then U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations and
- 39 finally Mayor of Atlanta. Other organizations behind the 50th
- 40 Anniversary observance are the Quitman County Development
- 41 Organization, Inc., Marks Project, Marks Historical Society, the
- 42 Mule and Blues Fest, the Mule Train Museum Project, SCLC, the
- 43 Reclaimed Project, Alcorn State University Agriculture Extension
- 44 Services, the Tougaloo College Farmers Project, the Mississippi

- 45 State University Downtown Project and the Mississippi Valley State
- 46 University Rural Farm Policy Program; and
- WHEREAS, each generation looks at history from a different
- 48 perspective. Human progress is neither automatic nor inevitable.
- 49 It is with great reverence that the State of Mississippi join the
- 50 commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of Dr. King's assassination
- 51 and the "Mule Train March":
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF
- 53 MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That
- 54 we do hereby join The University of Mississippi in commemorating
- 55 the 50th Anniversary of the 1968 "Mule Train-Poor People's
- 56 Campaign March" from Marks, Mississippi, to Washington, D.C.
- 57 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we encourage The University of
- 58 Mississippi and the Mississippi Civil Rights Museum to coordinate
- 59 appropriate events and educational programs to bring attention to
- 60 this important historic landmark.
- 61 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this resolution be transmitted
- 62 to The University of Mississippi and the Mississippi Civil Rights
- 63 Museum, and made available to the Capitol Press Corps.
