HOUSE BILL NO. 332

1 AN ACT TO REQUIRE LOCAL SCHOOL BOARDS TO PREPARE A SCHOOL 2 SAFETY PLAN TO HELP CURB THE GROWING INCIDENCE OF VIOLENCE IN 3 SCHOOLS; TO REQUIRE THE PLANS TO ADDRESS PREPAREDNESS FOR NATURAL 4 DISASTERS, HAZARDOUS MATERIALS OR RADIOLOGICAL ACCIDENTS, ACTS OF VIOLENCE, INCLUDING ACTIVE SHOOTER INCIDENTS, FORCEFUL INTRUSIONS, 5 6 HOSTAGE SITUATIONS AND ACTS OF TERRORISM; TO AUTHORIZE SCHOOL 7 BOARDS TO COORDINATE WITH LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES IN THE 8 DEVELOP OF ITS SCHOOL SAFETY PLAN; TO REQUIRE THE MISSISSIPPI 9 EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AND HOMELAND SECURITY AGENCY SHALL PROVIDE 10 TRAINING AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE TO PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICTS; TO 11 REQUIRE SCHOOLS TO CONDUCT A MINIMUM OF ONE EMERGENCY LAW 12 ENFORCEMENT DRILL PER SEMESTER TO ADDRESS AN ACTIVE SHOOTER 13 INCIDENT, FORCEFUL INTRUSION, HOSTAGE SITUATION OR TERRORISTIC THREAT, INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO AN INCIDENT INVOLVING AN 14 15 ACTIVE SHOOTER OR TERRORIST WITHIN A SCHOOL BUILDING; TO REQUIRE 16 SCHOOLS TO UTILIZE EVERY EFFORT TO CONDUCT AN EMERGENCY LAW 17 ENFORCEMENT DRILL UNDER THIS SUBSECTION NO LATER THAN 30 DAYS AFTER THE FIRST DAY OF THE SCHOOL YEAR; TO AMEND SECTIONS 37-3-83 18 AND 37-11-5, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, IN CONFORMITY THERETO; AND 19 20 FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 21 22 **SECTION 1.** (1) In compliance with requirements for school safety plans under Section 37-3-83, every public school board 23 24 shall prepare a school safety plan to help curb the growing 25 incidence of violence in schools, to respond effectively to such incidents, and to provide a safe learning environment for 26 27 Mississippi's children, teachers, and other school personnel. 28 plan shall also address preparedness for natural disasters, 29 hazardous materials or radiological accidents, acts of violence, including active shooter incidents, forceful intrusions, hostage 30 situations and acts of terrorism. School safety plans of public 31 32 schools shall be prepared with input from students enrolled in 33 that school, parents or legal guardians of such students, teachers in that school, community leaders, other school employees and 34 35 school district employees, and local law enforcement, fire 36 department, public safety and emergency management agencies. As 37 part of such plans, school boards shall provide for the 38 coordination with local law enforcement agencies. School safety plans shall include, at a minimum, the following strategy areas: 39

40 (a) Training school administrators, teachers and
41 support staff, including, but not limited to, school resource
42 officers, security officers, secretaries, custodians and bus
43 drivers, on school violence prevention, school security, school
44 threat assessment, mental health awareness and school emergency
45 planning best practices;

46 (b) Evaluating and refining school security measures;
47 (c) Updating and exercising school emergency
48 preparedness plans;

49 (d) Strengthening partnerships with public safety50 officials; and

51 (e) Creating enhanced crisis communications plans and 52 social media strategies. School safety plans of private schools

No. 332 **~ OFFICIAL ~** 19/HR12/R884 PAGE 2 (DJ\AM) 53 may be prepared with input from students enrolled in that school, 54 parents or legal guardians of such students, teachers in that 55 school, other school employees, and local law enforcement, fire 56 service, public safety and emergency management agencies. Ιn 57 addition to submission to the State Department of Education, the 58 plans of public schools shall be submitted to the local emergency management agency and the local law enforcement agency for 59 60 approval.

61 The Mississippi Emergency Management and Homeland (2) 62 Security Agency shall provide training and technical assistance to 63 public school districts, and may provide this same training and technical assistance to private school districts and independent 64 65 private schools throughout this state in the area of emergency 66 management and safe school operations. This training and 67 technical assistance shall include, but not be limited to, crisis 68 response team development, site surveys and safety audits, crisis 69 management planning, exercise design, safe school planning, emergency operations planning, search and seizure, bomb threat 70 71 management and model school safety plans.

72 (3) During each academic year, schools must conduct a 73 minimum of one (1) emergency law enforcement drill per semester to 74 address an active shooter incident, forceful intrusion, hostage 75 situation or terroristic threat, including, but not limited to an 76 incident involving an active shooter or terrorist within a school 77 building. The drills must be conducted according to the school

78 district's adopted school safety plan, with the participation of 79 the appropriate law enforcement agency and other emergency responders. The drills must be conducted on days and times when 80 students are present in the school building, and must be conducted 81 at each school in the school district. A school must utilize 82 83 every effort to conduct an emergency law enforcement drill under this subsection no later than thirty (30) days after the first day 84 85 of the school year.

86 SECTION 2. Section 37-3-83, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 87 amended as follows:

88 37-3-83. (1) There is established within the State Department of Education, using only existing staff and resources, 89 a School Safety Grant Program, available to all eligible public 90 school districts, to assist in financing programs to provide 91 92 school safety. However, no monies from the Temporary Assistance 93 for Needy Families grant may be used for the School Safety Grant 94 Program.

The school board of each school district, with the 95 (2)96 assistance of the State Department of Education School Safety 97 Center, shall adopt a comprehensive local school district school 98 safety plan and shall update the plan on an annual basis.

99 Subject to the extent of appropriations available, the (3) 100 School Safety Grant Program shall offer any of the following specific preventive services, and other additional services 101

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102 appropriate to the most current school district school safety
103 plan:

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(a) Metal detectors;

(b) Video surveillance cameras, communications
equipment and monitoring equipment for classrooms, school
buildings, school grounds and school buses;

108 (c) Crisis management/action teams responding to school
109 violence;

(d) Violence prevention training, conflict resolution training, and other appropriate training designated by the State Department of Education for faculty and staff; and

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(e) School safety personnel.

114 (4) Each local school district of this state may annually apply for school safety grant funds subject to appropriations by 115 the Legislature. School safety grants shall include a base grant 116 117 amount plus an additional amount per student in average daily 118 attendance in the school or school district. The base grant amount and amount per student shall be determined by the State 119 120 Board of Education, subject to specific appropriation therefor by 121 the Legislature. In order to be eligible for such program, each 122 local school board desiring to participate shall apply to the 123 State Department of Education by May 31 before the beginning of 124 the applicable fiscal year on forms provided by the department, 125 and shall be required to establish a local School Safety Task 126 Force to involve members of the community in the school safety

127 effort. The State Department of Education shall determine by July 128 1 of each succeeding year which local school districts have 129 submitted approved applications for school safety grants.

130 (5) As part of the School Safety Grant Program, the State 131 Department of Education may conduct a pilot program to research 132 the feasibility of using video camera equipment in the classroom 133 to address the following:

134 (a) Determine if video cameras in the classroom reduce135 student disciplinary problems;

(b) Enable teachers to present clear and convincing
evidence of a student's disruptive behavior to the student, the
principal, the superintendent and the student's parents; and

139 (c) Enable teachers to review teaching performance and140 receive diagnostic feedback for developmental purposes.

(6) Any local school district may use
audio/visual-monitoring equipment in classrooms, hallways,
buildings, grounds and buses for the purpose of monitoring school
disciplinary problems.

(7) As a component of the comprehensive local school district school safety plan required under subsection (2) of this section, the school board of a school district may adopt and implement a policy addressing sexual abuse of children, to be known as "Erin's Law Awareness." Any policy adopted under this subsection may include or address, but need not be limited to, the following:

parental awareness of issues regarding sexual abuse of children,
including knowledge of likely warning signs indicating that a
child may be a victim of sexual abuse;

(b) Educational information for parents or guardians, which may be included in the school handbook, on the warning signs of a child being abused, along with any needed assistance, referral or resource information;

160 (c) Training for school personnel on child sexual 161 abuse;

162 (d) Age-appropriate curriculum for students in163 prekindergarten through fifth grade;

164 (e) Actions that a child who is a victim of sexual165 abuse should take to obtain assistance and intervention;

166 (f) Counseling and resources available for students 167 affected by sexual abuse; and

168 (g) Emotional and educational support for a child who 169 has been abused to enable the child to be successful in school.

170 (8) As a component of the comprehensive local school
171 district school safety plan required under subsection (2) of this
172 section, the school board of a school district shall adopt and

173 implement a policy addressing active shooters, forceful

174 intrusions, hostage situations and terroristic threats, to be

175 known as "Extreme Emergency Evacuation Guidelines." Any policy

Section 37-11-5, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 205 amended as follows: 206 37-11-5. It shall be the duty of the principals and teachers 207 in all public school buildings to instruct the pupils in the methods of fire drills and to practice fire drills until all the 208 209 pupils in the school are familiar with the methods of escape. 210 Such fire drills shall be conducted often enough to keep such 211 pupils well drilled. It shall be the further duty of such 212 principals and teachers to instruct the pupils in all programs of 213 emergency management as may be designated by the State Department 214 of Education, including emergency law enforcement drills to 215 address active shooter incidents, forceful intrusions, hostage 216 situations or terroristic threats on school campuses and within 217 school facilities, as required under Section 1 of this act. 218 SECTION 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from 219 and after July 1, 2019.
