HOUSE BILL NO. 654

1 AN ACT TO AMEND SECTIONS 37-5-9 AND 37-7-711, MISSISSIPPI 2 CODE OF 1972, TO PROVIDE THAT IN A CONTEST FOR OFFICE OF BOARD OF 3 EDUCATION TRUSTEES, THE PERSON IN EACH RESPECTIVE SUPERVISORS 4 DISTRICT WHO RECEIVES THE MAJORITY OF VOTES CAST FOR THE POSITION 5 SOUGHT SHALL BE DECLARED THE WINNER; TO PROVIDE FOR A RUNOFF 6 BETWEEN THE TWO CANDIDATES RECEIVING THE HIGHEST NUMBER OF VOTES 7 IN INSTANCES WHERE NEITHER CANDIDATE RECEIVES THE MAJORITY OF 8 VOTES CAST IN THE ELECTION; TO PROVIDE THAT THE RUNOFF ELECTION 9 SHALL OCCUR THREE WEEKS AFTER THE FIRST ELECTION; AND FOR RELATED 10 PURPOSES.

11 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:

12 SECTION 1. Section 37-5-9, Mississippi Code of 1972, is

13 amended as follows:

37-5-9. The name of any qualified elector who is a candidate 14 15 for the county board of education shall be placed on the ballot used in the general elections by the county election 16 17 commissioners, provided that the candidate files with the county election commissioners, not more than ninety (90) days and not 18 less than sixty (60) days prior to the date of such general 19 20 election, a petition of nomination signed by not less than fifty (50) qualified electors of the county residing within each 21 22 supervisors district. 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23 qualified electors in said supervisors district, it shall only be 24 required that said petition of nomination be signed by at least 25 twenty percent (20%) of the qualified electors of such supervisors district. The candidate in each supervisors district who receives 26 27 the * * * majority of votes cast in the district shall be declared 28 elected. If no candidate receives a majority of the votes cast at 29 the election, a runoff shall be held between the two (2) 30 candidates receiving the highest number of votes in the first 31 election. The runoff election, in the event that such is 32 necessary, shall be held three (3) weeks after the first election. 33 When any member of the county board of education is to be elected from the county at large under the provisions of this 34 35 chapter, then the petition required by the preceding paragraph 36 hereof shall be signed by the required number of qualified electors residing in any part of the county outside of the 37 38 territory embraced within a municipal separate school district or 39 special municipal separate school district. The candidate who receives the * * * majority of votes cast in the election shall be 40 41 declared elected. If no candidate receives a majority of the 42 votes cast at the election, a runoff shall be held between the two 43 (2) candidates receiving the highest number of votes in the first election. The runoff election, in the event that such is 44 necessary, shall be held three (3) weeks after the first election. 45 46 In no case shall any qualified elector residing within a municipal separate school district or special municipal separate 47

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48 school district be eligible to sign a petition of nomination for 49 any candidate for the county board of education under any of the 50 provisions of this section.

51 SECTION 2. Section 37-7-711, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 52 amended as follows:

53 37-7-711. In all such special municipal separate school districts which may be so organized, reorganized or reconstituted 54 55 to embrace the entire county in which the majority of the 56 inhabitants of the county reside outside the corporate limits of 57 the municipality, the name of any qualified elector who is a 58 candidate for the board of trustees of such special municipal 59 separate school district, whether such person be a candidate for 60 an unexpired term or for a full term, shall be placed on the ballot used in the elections, provided that the candidate files 61 with the county election commissioners, not more than ninety (90) 62 63 days and not less than sixty (60) days prior to the date of such 64 general election, a petition of nomination signed by not less than fifty (50) qualified electors of the county. Where there are less 65 66 than one hundred (100) qualified electors in said area represented 67 by the trustee, it shall only be required that said petition of 68 nomination be signed by at least twenty percent (20%) of the 69 qualified electors in said area. * * * However, * * * in any such 70 special municipal separate school district which embraces the 71 entire county and which borders the Mississippi River and in which 72 Interstate Highway 20 and United States Highway 61 intersect and

No. 654 **~ OFFICIAL ~** 19/HR43/R71 PAGE 3 (DJ\EW) having a population in excess of forty-seven thousand (47,000) according to the 1990 federal decennial census, the candidate shall be required to file a petition of nomination with the county election commissioners not less than sixty (60) days prior to the date of such general election, in addition to the other requirements prescribed herein.

79 The candidate in each election who receives the * * * 80 majority of votes cast in the election shall be declared to have 81 been elected. If no candidate receives a majority of the votes 82 cast at the election, a runoff shall be held between the two (2) candidates receiving the highest number of votes in the first 83 election. The runoff election, in the event that such is 84 85 necessary, shall be held three (3) weeks after the first election. 86 SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from 87 and after July 1, 2019.
