HOUSE BILL NO. 1189

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 23-15-11, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972,

TO PROVIDE THAT A PERSON WHO IS OTHERWISE A QUALIFIED ELECTOR AND HAS BEEN CONVICTED OF BRIBERY, THEFT, ARSON, OBTAINING MONEY OR GOODS UNDER FALSE PRETENSE, PERJURY, FORGERY, EMBEZZLEMENT OR 5 BIGAMY SHALL HAVE HIS OR HER RIGHT TO VOTE SUSPENDED UPON CONVICTION AND SHALL NOT HAVE HIS OR HER RIGHT TO VOTE RESTORED 7 UNTIL HE OR SHE HAS SATISFIED ALL OF THE SENTENCING REQUIREMENTS OF THE CONVICTION INCLUDING PAROLE BUT NOT PROBATION; TO AMEND 8 SECTIONS 23-15-19, 23-15-125, 23-15-151, 23-15-153 AND 23-15-165, 9 MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO CONFORM TO THE PRECEDING SECTION; TO 10 BRING FORWARD SECTIONS 97-39-3 AND 99-19-37, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 11 12 1972, FOR THE PURPOSE OF POSSIBLE AMENDMENT; AND FOR RELATED 13 PURPOSES. 14 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: SECTION 1. Section 23-15-11, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 15 16 amended as follows: 23-15-11. (1) Every inhabitant of this state, except 17 18 persons adjudicated to be non compos mentis, shall be a qualified 19 elector in and for the county, municipality and voting precinct of 20 his or her residence and shall be entitled to vote at any election 21 upon compliance with Section 23-15-563, if he or she is: 22 (a) * * * A citizen of the United States of

America * * *;

- 24 (b) Eighteen (18) years old and upwards * * *;
- 25 (c) * * * A resident in this state for thirty (30) days
- 26 and for thirty (30) days in the county in which he or she seeks to
- 27 vote, and for thirty (30) days in the incorporated municipality in
- 28 which he or she seeks to vote * * *; and
- 29 (d) * * * Duly registered as an elector under Section
- 30 23-15-33 * * *.
- 31 (2) A person who is otherwise a qualified elector under the
- 32 provisions of subsection (1) and has been convicted of bribery,
- 33 theft, arson, obtaining money or goods under false pretense,
- 34 perjury, forgery, embezzlement or bigamy shall have his or her
- 35 right to vote suspended upon conviction and shall have his or her
- 36 right to vote restored once he or she has satisfied all of the
- 37 sentencing requirements of the conviction including parole but not
- 38 probation.
- 39 (3) Any person who will be eighteen (18) years of age or
- 40 older on or before the date of the general election and who is
- 41 duly registered to vote not less than thirty (30) days before the
- 42 primary election associated with the general election, may vote in
- 43 the primary election even though the person has not reached his or
- 44 her eighteenth birthday at the time that the person seeks to vote
- 45 at the primary election.
- 46 (4) No others than those specified in this section shall be
- 47 entitled, or shall be allowed, to vote at any election.

- 48 **SECTION 2.** Section 23-15-19, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 49 amended as follows:
- 50 23-15-19. Any person who has been convicted of vote fraud or
- 51 any crime listed in Section 241, Mississippi Constitution of 1890,
- 52 such crimes defined as "disenfranchising," shall * * * have his or
- 53 her right to vote suspended upon conviction and shall have his or
- 54 her right to vote restored once he or she has satisfied all of the
- 55 sentencing requirements of the conviction including parole but not
- 56 probation. Whenever any person shall be convicted in the circuit
- 57 court of his or her county of a disenfranchising crime, the county
- 58 registrar shall * * * remove his or her name from the Statewide
- 59 Elections Management System until he or she has satisfied all of
- 60 the sentencing requirements of the conviction including parole but
- 61 not probation; and whenever any person shall be convicted of a
- 62 disenfranchising crime in any other court of any county, the
- 63 presiding judge of the court shall, on demand, certify the fact in
- 64 writing to the registrar of the county in which the voter resides,
- 65 who shall * * * remove the name of the person from the Statewide
- 66 Elections Management System until he or she has satisfied all of
- 67 the sentencing requirements of the conviction including parole but
- 68 not probation and retain the certificate as a record of his or her
- 69 office.
- SECTION 3. Section 23-15-125, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 71 amended as follows:

72	23-15-125. The pollbook of each voting precinct shall
73	designate the voting precinct for which it is to be used, and
74	shall be ruled in appropriate columns, with printed or written
75	headings, as follows: date of registration; voter registration
76	number; name of electors; date of birth; and a number of blank
77	columns for the dates of elections. All qualified applicants who
78	register with the registrar shall be entered in the Statewide
79	Elections Management System. Only the names of those qualified
80	applicants who register within thirty (30) days before an election
81	shall appear on the pollbooks of the election; however, if the
82	thirtieth day to register before an election falls on a Sunday or
83	legal holiday, the registration applications submitted on the
84	business day immediately following the legal holiday shall be
85	accepted and entered in the Statewide Elections Management System
86	for the purpose of enabling voters to vote in the next election.
87	When county election commissioners determine that any elector is
88	disqualified from voting, by reason of death, conviction of a
89	disenfranchising crime, removal from the jurisdiction, or other
90	legal cause, that fact shall be noted in the Statewide Elections
91	Management System and the voter's name shall be removed from the
92	Statewide Elections Management System, the state's voter roll and
93	the county's pollbooks. Nothing in this section shall preclude
94	the use of electronic pollbooks. A person who is otherwise a
95	qualified elector under the provisions of Section 23-15-11 and has
96	been convicted of bribery, theft, arson, obtaining money or goods

- 97 under false pretense, perjury, forgery, embezzlement or bigamy
- 98 shall have his or her right to vote suspended upon conviction and
- 99 shall have his or her right to vote restored once he or she has
- 100 satisfied all of the sentencing requirements of the conviction
- 101 including parole but not probation. Once the person has satisfied
- 102 all of the sentencing requirements of the conviction, the voter's
- 103 name shall be restored into the Statewide Elections Management
- 104 System, the state's voter roll and the county's pollbooks.
- 105 **SECTION 4.** Section 23-15-151, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 106 amended as follows:
- 107 23-15-151. The circuit clerk of each county is authorized
- 108 and directed to prepare and keep in his or her office a full and
- 109 complete list, in alphabetical order, of persons convicted of
- 110 voter fraud or of any crime listed in Section 241, Mississippi
- 111 Constitution of 1890 whose right to vote has been suspended upon
- 112 conviction. A certified copy of any enrollment by one clerk to
- 113 another will be sufficient authority for the enrollment of the
- 114 name, or names, in another county. * * *
- 115 **SECTION 5.** Section 23-15-153, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 116 amended as follows:
- 117 23-15-153. (1) At least during the following times, the
- 118 election commissioners shall meet at the office of the registrar
- 119 or the office of the election commissioners to carefully revise
- 120 the county voter roll as electronically maintained by the
- 121 Statewide Elections Management System and remove from the roll the

122	names	of	all	voters	who	have	requested	to	be	purged	from	the	voter

- 123 roll, died, received an adjudication of non compos mentis, been
- 124 convicted of a disenfranchising crime and had his or her right to
- 125 vote suspended, or otherwise become disqualified as electors for
- 126 any cause, and shall register the names of all persons who have
- 127 duly applied to be registered but have been illegally denied
- 128 registration:
- 129 (a) On the Tuesday after the second Monday in January
- 130 1987 and every following year;
- 131 (b) On the first Tuesday in the month immediately
- 132 preceding the first primary election for members of Congress in
- 133 the years when members of Congress are elected;
- 134 (c) On the first Monday in the month immediately
- 135 preceding the first primary election for state, state district
- 136 legislative, county and county district offices in the years in
- 137 which those offices are elected; and
- 138 (d) On the second Monday of September preceding the
- 139 general election or regular special election day in years in which
- 140 a general election is not conducted.
- 141 Except for the names of those voters who are duly qualified
- 142 to vote in the election, no name shall be permitted to remain in
- 143 the Statewide Elections Management System; however, no name shall
- 144 be purged from the Statewide Elections Management System based on
- 145 a change in the residence of an elector except in accordance with
- 146 procedures provided for by the National Voter Registration Act of

147 1993. Except as otherwise provided by Section 23-15-573, no

148 person shall vote at any election whose name is not in the county

149 voter roll electronically maintained by the Statewide Elections

150 Management System.

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151 (2) Except as provided in this section, and subject to the

152 following annual limitations, the election commissioners shall be

153 entitled to receive a per diem in the amount of One Hundred

154 Dollars (\$100.00), to be paid from the county general fund, for

155 every day or period of no less than five (5) hours accumulated

156 over two (2) or more days actually employed in the performance of

157 their duties in the conduct of an election or actually employed in

158 the performance of their duties for the necessary time spent in

159 the revision of the county voter roll as electronically maintained

by the Statewide Elections Management System as required in

161 subsection (1) of this section:

162 (a) In counties having less than fifteen thousand

(15,000) residents according to the latest federal decennial

164 census, not more than fifty (50) days per year, with no more than

165 fifteen (15) additional days allowed for the conduct of each

166 election in excess of one (1) occurring in any calendar year;

167 (b) In counties having fifteen thousand (15,000)

168 residents according to the latest federal decennial census but

less than thirty thousand (30,000) residents according to the

170 latest federal decennial census, not more than seventy-five (75)

171 days per year, with no more than twenty-five (25) additional days

172	allowed	for	the	conduct	of	each	election	in	excess	of	one	(1)

- 173 occurring in any calendar year;
- 174 (c) In counties having thirty thousand (30,000)
- 175 residents according to the latest federal decennial census but
- 176 less than seventy thousand (70,000) residents according to the
- 177 latest federal decennial census, not more than one hundred (100)
- 178 days per year, with no more than thirty-five (35) additional days
- 179 allowed for the conduct of each election in excess of one (1)
- 180 occurring in any calendar year;
- 181 (d) In counties having seventy thousand (70,000)
- 182 residents according to the latest federal decennial census but
- less than ninety thousand (90,000) residents according to the
- 184 latest federal decennial census, not more than one hundred
- 185 twenty-five (125) days per year, with no more than forty-five (45)
- 186 additional days allowed for the conduct of each election in excess
- 187 of one (1) occurring in any calendar year;
- 188 (e) In counties having ninety thousand (90,000)
- 189 residents according to the latest federal decennial census but
- 190 less than one hundred seventy thousand (170,000) residents
- 191 according to the latest federal decennial census, not more than
- 192 one hundred fifty (150) days per year, with no more than
- 193 fifty-five (55) additional days allowed for the conduct of each
- 194 election in excess of one (1) occurring in any calendar year;
- 195 (f) In counties having one hundred seventy thousand
- 196 (170,000) residents according to the latest federal decennial

197	census but less than two hundred thousand (200,000) residents
198	according to the latest federal decennial census, not more than
199	one hundred seventy-five (175) days per year, with no more than
200	sixty-five (65) additional days allowed for the conduct of each
201	election in excess of one (1) occurring in any calendar year;
202	(g) In counties having two hundred thousand (200,000)
203	residents according to the latest federal decennial census but

- residents according to the latest federal decennial census but less than two hundred twenty-five thousand (225,000) residents according to the latest federal decennial census, not more than one hundred ninety (190) days per year, with no more than seventy-five (75) additional days allowed for the conduct of each election in excess of one (1) occurring in any calendar year;
- (h) In counties having two hundred twenty-five thousand (225,000) residents according to the latest federal decennial census but less than two hundred fifty thousand (250,000) residents according to the latest federal decennial census, not more than two hundred fifteen (215) days per year, with no more than eighty-five (85) additional days allowed for the conduct of each election in excess of one (1) occurring in any calendar year;
- (i) In counties having two hundred fifty thousand (250,000) residents according to the latest federal decennial census but less than two hundred seventy-five thousand (275,000) residents according to the latest federal decennial census, not more than two hundred thirty (230) days per year, with no more

than ninety-five (95) additional days allowed for the conduct of each election in excess of one (1) occurring in any calendar year;

(j) In counties having two hundred seventy-five
thousand (275,000) residents according to the latest federal
decennial census or more, not more than two hundred forty (240)
days per year, with no more than one hundred five (105) additional
days allowed for the conduct of each election in excess of one (1)
occurring in any calendar year.

(3) In addition to the number of days authorized in subsection (2) of this section, the board of supervisors of a county may authorize, in its discretion, the election commissioners to receive a per diem in the amount provided for in subsection (2) of this section, to be paid from the county general fund, for every day or period of no less than five (5) hours accumulated over two (2) or more days actually employed in the performance of their duties in the conduct of an election or actually employed in the performance of their duties for the necessary time spent in the revision of the county voter roll as electronically maintained by the Statewide Elections Management System as required in subsection (1) of this section, * * * not to exceed five (5) days.

242 (4) (a) The election commissioners shall be entitled to
243 receive a per diem in the amount of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00),
244 to be paid from the county general fund, not to exceed ten (10)
245 days for every day or period of no less than five (5) hours

accumulated over two (2) or more days actually employed in the performance of their duties for the necessary time spent in the revision of the county voter roll as electronically maintained by the Statewide Elections Management System before any special election. For purposes of this paragraph, the regular special election day shall not be considered a special election. annual limitations set forth in subsection (2) of this section shall not apply to this paragraph.

- (b) The election commissioners shall be entitled to receive a per diem in the amount of One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150.00), to be paid from the county general fund, for the performance of their duties on the day of any general or special election. The annual limitations set forth in subsection (2) of this section shall apply to this paragraph.
- (5) The election commissioners shall be entitled to receive a per diem in the amount of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), to be paid from the county general fund, not to exceed fourteen (14) days for every day or period of no less than five (5) hours accumulated over two (2) or more days actually employed in the performance of their duties for the necessary time spent in the revision of the county voter roll as electronically maintained by the Statewide Elections Management System and in the conduct of a runoff election following either a general or special election.
- (6) The election commissioners shall be entitled to receive only one (1) per diem payment for those days when the election

- commissioners discharge more than one (1) duty or responsibility on the same day.
- 273 In preparation for a municipal primary, runoff, general 274 or special election, the county registrar shall generate and 275 distribute the master voter roll and pollbooks from the Statewide 276 Elections Management System for the municipality located within 277 the county. The municipality shall pay the county registrar for the actual cost of preparing and printing the municipal master 278 279 voter roll pollbooks. A municipality may secure "read only" 280 access to the Statewide Elections Management System and print its

own pollbooks using this information.

- 282 County election commissioners who perform the duties of (8) 283 an executive committee with regard to the conduct of a primary 284 election under a written agreement authorized by law to be entered 285 into with an executive committee shall receive per diem as 286 provided for in subsection (2) of this section. The days that 287 county election commissioners are employed in the conduct of a 288 primary election shall be treated the same as days county election 289 commissioners are employed in the conduct of other elections.
 - (9) In addition to any per diem authorized by this section, any election commissioner shall be entitled to the mileage reimbursement rate allowable to federal employees for the use of a privately owned vehicle while on official travel on election day.
- 294 (10) Every election commissioner shall sign personally a 295 certification setting forth the number of hours actually worked in

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296	the performance of the commissioner's official duties and for
297	which the commissioner seeks compensation. The certification must
298	be on a form as prescribed in this subsection. The commissioner's
299	signature is, as a matter of law, made under the commissioner's
300	oath of office and under penalties of perjury.

328	When properly completed and signed, the certification must be
329	filed with the clerk of the county board of supervisors before any
330	payment may be made. The certification will be a public record
331	available for inspection and reproduction immediately upon the
332	oral or written request of any person.
333	Any person may contest the accuracy of the certification in
334	any respect by notifying the chair of the commission, any member
335	of the board of supervisors or the clerk of the board of
336	supervisors of the contest at any time before or after payment is
337	made. If the contest is made before payment is made, no payment
338	shall be made as to the contested certificate until the contest is
339	finally disposed of. The person filing the contest shall be
340	entitled to a full hearing, and the clerk of the board of
341	supervisors shall issue subpoenas upon request of the contestor
342	compelling the attendance of witnesses and production of documents
343	and things. The contestor shall have the right to appeal de novo

to the circuit court of the involved county, which appeal must be

perfected within thirty (30) days from a final decision of the commission, the clerk of the board of supervisors or the board of supervisors, as the case may be.

348 Any contestor who successfully contests any certification 349 will be awarded all expenses incident to his or her contest, 350 together with reasonable attorney's fees, which will be awarded 351 upon petition to the chancery court of the involved county upon 352 final disposition of the contest before the election commission, 353 board of supervisors, clerk of the board of supervisors, or, in 354 case of an appeal, final disposition by the court. 355 commissioner against whom the contest is decided shall be liable 356 for the payment of the expenses and attorney's fees, and the 357 county shall be jointly and severally liable for same.

- (11) Any election commissioner who has not received a certificate issued by the Secretary of State pursuant to Section 23-15-211 indicating that the election commissioner has received the required elections seminar instruction and that the election commissioner is fully qualified to conduct an election, shall not receive any compensation authorized by this section or Section 23-15-239.
- 365 **SECTION 6.** Section 23-15-165, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 366 amended as follows:
- 23-15-165. (1) The Office of the Secretary of State, in 368 cooperation with the county registrars and election commissioners, 369 shall procure, implement and maintain an electronic information

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370	processing system and programs capable of maintaining a
371	centralized database of all registered voters in the state. The
372	system shall encompass software and hardware, at both the state
373	and county level, software development training, conversion and
374	support and maintenance for the system. This system shall be
375	known as the "Statewide Elections Management System" and shall
376	constitute the official record of registered voters in every
377	county of the state.

- 378 (2) The Office of the Secretary of State shall develop and 379 implement the Statewide Elections Management System so that the 380 registrar and election commissioners of each county shall:
- 381 (a) Verify that an applicant that is registering to 382 vote in that county is not registered to vote in another county;
- 383 (b) Be notified automatically that a registered voter 384 in its county has registered to vote in another county;
- 385 (c) Receive regular reports of death, changes of
 386 address and convictions for disenfranchising crimes which cause a
 387 voter to have his or her right to vote suspended that apply to
 388 voters registered in the county; * * *
- 389 (d) Receive regular reports of voters who have

 390 satisfied all of the sentencing requirements including parole but

 391 not probation of his or her conviction and automatically restore

 392 the voter's name into the Statewide Elections Management System,

 393 the state's voter roll and the county's pollbooks; and

- (* * * e) Retain all present functionality related to,
 but not limited to, the use of voter roll data and to implement
 such other functionality as the law requires to enhance the
 maintenance of accurate county voter records and related jury
 selection and redistricting programs.
- 399 As a part of the procurement and implementation of the 400 system, the Office of the Secretary of State shall, with the assistance of the advisory committee, procure services necessary 401 402 to convert current voter registration records in the counties into a standard, industry accepted file format that can be used on the 403 404 Statewide Elections Management System. Thereafter, all official 405 voter information shall be maintained on the Statewide Elections 406 Management System. The standard industry accepted format of data 407 was reviewed and approved by a majority of the advisory committee 408 created in subsection (5) of this section after consultation with 409 the Circuit Clerks Association and the format may not be changed 410 without consulting the Circuit Clerks Association.
 - (4) The Secretary of State may, with the assistance of the advisory committee, adopt rules and regulations necessary to administer the Statewide Elections Management System. The rules and regulations shall at least:
- 415 (a) Provide for the establishment and maintenance of a 416 centralized database for all voter registration information in the 417 state;

- 420 (c) Provide security to ensure that only the registrar,
 421 or his or her designee or other appropriate official, as the law
 422 may require, can add information to, delete information from and
 423 modify information in the system;
- (d) Provide the registrar or his or her designee or

 other appropriate official, as the law may require, access to the

 system at all times, including the ability to download copies of

 the industry standard file, for all purposes related to their

 official duties, including, but not limited to, exclusive access

 for the purpose of printing all local pollbooks;
- 430 (e) Provide security and protection of all information 431 in the system and monitor the system to ensure that unauthorized 432 access is not allowed;
- (f) Provide a procedure that will allow the registrar,

 434 or his or her designee or other appropriate official, as the law

 435 may require, to identify the precinct to which a voter should be

 436 assigned; and
- 437 (g) Provide a procedure for phasing in or converting
 438 existing manual and computerized voter registration systems in
 439 counties to the Statewide Elections Management System.
- 440 (5) The Secretary of State established an advisory committee 441 to assist in developing system specifications, procurement, 442 implementation and maintenance of the Statewide Elections

- 443 Management System. The committee included two (2) representatives
- 444 from the Circuit Clerks Association, appointed by the association;
- 445 two (2) representatives from the Election Commissioners
- 446 Association of Mississippi, appointed by the association; one (1)
- 447 member of the Mississippi Association of Supervisors, or its
- 448 staff, appointed by the association; the Director of the Stennis
- 449 Institute of Government at Mississippi State University, or his or
- 450 her designee; the Executive Director of the Department of
- 451 Information Technology Services, or his or her designee; two (2)
- 452 persons knowledgeable about elections and information technology
- 453 appointed by the Secretary of State; and the Secretary of State,
- 454 who shall serve as the chair of the advisory committee.
- 455 (6) (a) Social security numbers, telephone numbers and date
- 456 of birth and age information in statewide, district, county and
- 457 municipal voter registration files shall be exempt from and shall
- 458 not be subject to inspection, examination, copying or reproduction
- 459 under the Mississippi Public Records Act of 1983.
- 460 (b) Copies of statewide, district, county or municipal
- 461 voter registration files, excluding social security numbers,
- 462 telephone numbers and date of birth and age information, shall be
- 463 provided to any person in accordance with the Mississippi Public
- 464 Records Act of 1983 at a cost not to exceed the actual cost of
- 465 production.
- SECTION 7. Section 97-39-3, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 467 brought forward as follows:

468 If any person shall fight a duel, or give or accept 469 a challenge to fight a duel, or knowingly carry or deliver such 470 challenge or the acceptance thereof, or be second to either party to any duel, whether such act be done in the state or out of it, 471 472 or who shall go out of the state to fight a duel, or to assist in 473 the same as second, or to send, accept, or carry a challenge, 474 shall be disqualified from holding any office, be disenfranchised, 475 and incapable of holding or being elected to any post of honor, 476 profit or emolument, civil or military, under the constitution and 477 laws of this state; and the appointment of any such person to 478 office, as also all votes given to any such person, are illegal, 479 and none of the votes given to such person for any office shall be 480 taken or counted.

481 SECTION 8. Section 99-19-37, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 482 brought forward as follows:

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99-19-37. (1) Any person who has lost the right of suffrage by reason of conviction of crime and has not been pardoned therefrom, who thereafter served honorably in any branch of the armed forces of the United States during the periods of World War I or World War II as hereinafter defined and shall have received an honorable discharge, or release therefrom, shall by reason of such honorable service, have the full right of suffrage restored, provided, however, this does not apply to any one having an unfinished or suspended sentence.

- 492 (2) For the purposes of this section the period of World War 493 I shall be from April 6, 1917 to December 1, 1918, and the period 494 of World War II shall be from December 7, 1941 to December 31, 495 1946.
- 496 In order to have restored, and to exercise, the right of 497 franchise under the provisions of this section a person affected 498 hereby shall have his discharge, or release, from the armed forces 499 of the United States recorded in the office of the chancery clerk 500 of the county in which such person desires to exercise the right 501 of franchise and if such discharge, or release, appears to be an 502 honorable discharge, or release, and shows such person to have 503 served honorably during either of the periods stated in subsection 504 (2) of this section such person shall have the full right of 505 suffrage restored as though an act had been passed by the 506 Legislature in accordance with Section 253 of the Constitution of 507 the State of Mississippi restoring the right of suffrage to such 508 person.
- SECTION 9. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after July 1 in the year following the year in which the Secretary of State certifies the passage of the constitutional amendment proposed in House Concurrent Resolution 44, 2019 Regular Session.
