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## HOUSE BILL NO. 1384

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 43-1-65, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO CREATE A STATEWIDE QUALITY FRAMEWORK FOR CHILD CARE CENTERS TO IMPROVE THE LEVEL OF QUALITY OF CHILD CARE CENTERS AND ENSURE CONTINUITY OF HIGH QUALITY CARE AS A CHILD TRANSITIONS ACROSS 5 PROGRAMS AND INTO THE SCHOOL SYSTEM; TO PROVIDE THAT UNDER THE 6 STATEWIDE QUALITY FRAMEWORK, CHILD CARE CENTERS WILL BE ABLE TO 7 ACHIEVE A STANDARD OR COMPREHENSIVE DESIGNATION FROM THE 8 DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES; TO SPECIFY THE MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS 9 TO BE DESIGNATED AS A STANDARD OR COMPREHENSIVE CHILD CARE CENTER; 10 AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 11 SECTION 1. Section 43-1-65, Mississippi Code of 1972, is 12 13 amended as follows: 43-1-65. (1) The Department of Human Services shall 14 15 establish the Mississippi Child Care Quality Step System by requiring the Office for Children and Youth of the Department of 16 17 Human Services, the lead agency for the Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF), to develop and implement a pilot voluntary Quality 18 Rating System (QRS). The purpose of the pilot system will be to 19 20 improve the quality of all licensed early care and education and after-school programs. The system is to be phased in over the 21 next five (5) years beginning July 1, 2006, subject to 22

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- 23 appropriation. The QRS criteria will be the basis, at minimum,
- 24 for the QRS, and shall address the following components:
- 25 administrative policy, professional development, learning
- 26 environment, and parental involvement and evaluation.
- 27 In addition, the Office for Children and Youth shall (2)
- 28 develop and administer funds, based on appropriation, to create a
- 29 Child Care Resource and Referral (CCR&R) statewide system in
- 30 collaboration with community and junior colleges, universities,
- 31 Mississippi Public Broadcasting, state agencies and/or nonprofit
- 32 community entities. The CCR&R agencies shall provide training
- 33 specific to the QRS criteria to enable early care and education
- 34 program quality to improve as measured by the QRS system; and
- 35 offer parent education information and training on what a quality
- early care and education program comprises and how to identify 36
- This program shall begin July 1, 2006, subject to 37
- 38 appropriation.
- 39 There is created a Statewide Quality Framework for (3) (a)
- 40 child care centers, the purpose of which is to improve the level
- 41 of quality of child care centers and ensure continuity of high
- 42 quality care as a child transitions across programs and into the
- 43 K-12 school system. The Statewide Quality Framework will allow
- child care centers to achieve a standard or comprehensive 44
- 45 designation from the Department of Human Services as provided in
- 46 this subsection.

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47	(b) Standard child care centers shall be licensed
48	through the State Department of Health and meet minimum federal
49	and state child care center standards. All staff must complete
50	mandatory training as required by the Child Care and Development
51	Block Grant (CCDBG) Act of 2014. In addition, standard child care
52	centers must meet the following requirements:
53	(i) All staff must complete fifteen (15) hours of
54	continuing professional development annually as prescribed by the
55	CCDBG Act. The professional development areas include health and
56	safety; educational standards and best practices; recognizing
57	signs, symptoms or behaviors of child abuse and neglect;
58	professional development that addresses social-emotional and
59	behavioral development, mental health, expulsion, and exclusionary
60	discipline practices in child care settings; and developmental and
61	behavioral screenings.
62	(ii) The curriculum implemented in the child care
63	center must align with the state early learning guidelines for
64	infants and toddlers and the state early learning guidelines for
65	three- and four-year-olds.
66	(iii) The child care center must complete an
67	annual self-assessment process through the Department of Human
68	Services.
69	(c) Comprehensive child care centers shall meet the
70	requirements of a standard child care center and shall engage in
71	additional activities specifically designed to improve the quality

73	Technical assistance to achieve the comprehensive designation will
74	be available through the Mississippi Community College Early Child
75	Academy. To be designated as a comprehensive child care center, a
76	child care center must be certified by the Department of Human
77	Services and meet the following requirements:
78	(i) Child care center staff must complete
79	additional customized professional development annually beyond the
80	standard fifteen (15) hours.
81	(ii) Coaching aimed at closing education and
82	credential gaps that child care center staff might have must be
83	undertaken.
84	(iii) Children enrolled in the center must be
85	assessed a minimum of twice a year.
86	(iv) Centers must work with an external evaluator
87	to examine how programs and activities are implemented in the
88	center.
89	(v) Family engagement activities that will
90	encourage parents to participate in parenting classes and
91	parent-teacher organizations (PTOs) must be undertaken.
92	(vi) The center must engage in technical
93	assistance on an annual basis for the implementation of a
94	continuous quality improvement plan, kindergarten transition plan,
95	business management plan, and, when necessary, corrective action
96	plan.
