1 2 3 4 5 6	A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION COMMENDING THE SERVICE AND CAREER OF MAJOR CAPTAIN BRADY TONTH, JR., IN ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF BECOMING THE FIRST AFRICAN-AMERICAN MISSISSIPPIAN TO COMPLETE THE UNITED STATES AIR FORCE PILOT TRAINING SCHOOL, AND RECOGNIZING HIM AS A MISSISSIPPI LIVING LEGEND IN OBSERVATION OF AFRICAN-AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH.
7	WHEREAS, the State of Mississippi is replete with a rich and
8	storied history of greatness and the successes of firsts, as is
9	evidenced by the life, service and career of Vicksburg resident,
10	Major Captain Brady Tonth, Jr., an individual of high esteem and
11	caliber; and
12	WHEREAS, the eldest of four children born in Mound Bayou,
13	Mississippi, and raised by his grandfather and great-grandmother
14	in Belzoni on meager household earnings of less than \$150.00 per
15	month, Major Tonth's humble beginning in the impoverished
16	Mississippi Delta serves as the perfect juxtaposed backdrop for
17	the narrative of his life of success that has continued to be a
18	source of inspiration for all who hear it; and
19	WHEREAS, a 1969 graduate of McNair High School after

completing his formal education at McNair Elementary, Major Tonth,

- 21 who possessed an insatiable appetite for learning, attended
- 22 Mississippi Valley State University on a band scholarship, where
- 23 he played drums and graduated in the top five percent of the Class
- 24 of 1973 with a degree in political science and as a member of the
- 25 prestigious Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity; and
- 26 WHEREAS, poised for greatness and destined to make his mark
- 27 in the world and secure his rightful place in the annals of
- 28 African-American history, Major Tonth's assent to notable
- 29 recognition commenced in 1973 when he became the first ROTC pilot
- 30 to be commissioned as an officer to graduate from his collegiate
- 31 alma mater and, shortly thereafter, became the first
- 32 African-American trainee from the State of Mississippi to complete
- 33 Air Force Pilot Training School at Columbus Air Force Base in
- 34 Columbus, Ohio, which afforded him his second commission as a
- 35 licensed certified pilot; and
- 36 WHEREAS, in 1979, Major Tonth joined the Mississippi Air
- 37 National Guard, becoming the first African-American pilot to fly
- 38 for the guard, serving meritoriously until he was called back to
- 39 active duty in 1981 and devoting more than 20 years of service to
- 40 the United States Armed Forces, serving in both foreign conflicts
- 41 of Desert Storm and Desert Shield, a time at which he earned the
- 42 distinction of being the first African-American pilot to transport
- 43 survival goods to a major war during Operation Desert Storm, which
- 44 eventually enabled him to attain the rank of major; and

- WHEREAS, after his seventh year with the United States Air
- 46 Force, Major Tonth became a commercial pilot with American
- 47 Airlines, after having moved up from ticket agent, flight
- 48 engineer, co-pilot and finally captain in 1986, the same year he
- 49 would serve as captain of the first all African-American flight
- 50 crew in the company's history; and
- 51 WHEREAS, the modest possessor of a myriad of historical
- 52 firsts, others significant to Major Captain Tonth's credit,
- 53 include being the: first African-American pilot to fly a
- 54 passenger jet from the Jackson-Evers International Airport; first
- 55 African-American pilot to fly a private jet for actor, Morgan
- 56 Freeman; first and only African-American pilot from Mississippi
- 57 certified to fly 26 aircrafts, both private and commercial; first
- 58 African-American pilot to achieve the highest rating any pilot can
- 59 receive in the State of Mississippi; and first president of the
- 60 Vicksburg-Warren County Alumni Association for Mississippi Valley
- 61 State University; and
- 62 WHEREAS, now in the joys of retirement, surrendering his
- 63 wings almost 18 years ago shortly after the 9/11 events with more
- 64 than 30 years of flight service to his credit, and after having
- 65 flown aircrafts like the T-37, T-38, KC-135, C-123, C-130, C-141,
- 66 Boeing 727, Super 80, Boeing 757 and Boeing 767, Major Captain
- 67 Tonth is the first and only African-American certified,
- 68 commercial, passenger coach driver for Tougaloo College and

- 69 Alcorn, Jackson State and Mississippi Valley State Universities;
- 70 and
- 71 WHEREAS, Major Captain Tonth's many accomplishments are
- 72 documented proof that one's environment does not dictate the level
- 73 of success one can attain in life when grounded in faith and
- 74 "belief in God, effort and determination," and continue to be a
- 75 driving force for his active civic and religious affiliations with
- 76 such organizations as: Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity; NAACP; Blacks
- 77 in Government; A Hundred Black Men for Progress in Warren County;
- 78 and Greater Grove Street Baptist Church, where he serves on the
- 79 Deacon Board, Executive Committee and as chairman of the Black
- 80 History Committee; and
- 81 WHEREAS, throughout every major move in his life and career,
- 82 Major Captain Tonth has enjoyed the love, support and inspiration
- 83 of his wife and college sweetheart, the former Fannie Woodson,
- 84 whom he made his wife during their senior year at Valley, as well
- 85 as their two children, Brady III and Tonya Tonth Naylor, and three
- 86 grandchildren, Jazza, Randy III and Trenton; and
- 87 WHEREAS, it is the policy of this Legislature to pay tribute
- 88 to living legends of our community like Major Captain Tonth, who
- 89 are the trailblazers that continue to inspire the birth of
- 90 newfound success in the lives of the generations that follow:
- 91 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF
- 92 REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, THE SENATE CONCURRING
- 93 THEREIN, That we do hereby commend the service and career of Major

- 94 Captain Brady Tonth, Jr., in acknowledgment of becoming the first
- 95 African-American Mississippian to complete the United States Air
- 96 Force Pilot Training School, and recognizing him as a Mississippi
- 97 living legend in observation of African-American History Month,
- 98 and extend best wishes for continued health and prosperity in all
- 99 the days to come.
- 100 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be
- 101 furnished to Major Captain Brady Tonth, Jr., and to the members of
- 102 the Capitol Press Corps.
