| 5                | WHEREAS, the Legislature wishes to join the State Board of   |

| 7                | distinguished service by Dr. Mary Currier; and   |
| 8                | WHEREAS, Mary Currier, M.D., M.P.H., State Health Officer for  |
| 9                | the Mississippi State Department of Health, retired on October 31,   |
| 10               | 2018, after more than 34 years of service to public health; and  |
| 11               | WHEREAS, Mary Currier was born in Ann Arbor, Michigan;   |
| 12               | graduated from Rice University with a Bachelor of Arts Degree;   |
| 13               | graduated with a Doctor of Medicine Degree from the University of  |
| 14               | Mississippi School of Medicine in 1983; and graduated with a   |
| 15               | Master of Public Health Degree from Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School   |
| 16               | of Public Health in 1987; and  |
| 17               | WHEREAS, Mary Currier began her public health career as a  |
| 18               | Laboratory Technician in Neurotoxicology Research at the   |

University of Mississippi Medical Center in 1979; and held several

- 22 WHEREAS, Dr. Currier joined the Mississippi State Department
- 23 of Health in July 1984 as Staff Physician for Public Health
- 24 District V; was a Medical Consultant from July 1988 to May 1993;
- 25 served as State Epidemiologist from June 1993 to February 2004 and
- 26 from July 2007 to January 2010; was the Director of the Office of
- 27 Epidemiology from March 2002 to February 2004; was Deputy State
- 28 Health Officer for Medicine and Science from October 2008 to
- 29 December 2009; was Interim State Health Officer from December 2009
- 30 to January 2010; and was named State Health Officer on January 13,
- 31 2010; and
- 32 WHEREAS, Dr. Currier received the "Felix J. Underwood Award"
- 33 from the Mississippi Public Health Association in 2009 for
- 34 protecting the health of Mississippians; the "Nathan Davis Award"
- 35 for Outstanding Government Service from the American Medical
- 36 Association in 2016; the "Arthur T. McCormack Award" for
- 37 demonstrating excellence and for making a significant contribution
- 38 to the knowledge and practice for public health from the
- 39 Association of State and Territorial Health Officials in 2016; and
- 40 the "Distinguished Medical Alumnus Award" from the University of
- 41 Mississippi Medical Center in 2017; the MPHA's "Alfio Rausa
- 42 Medical Care Section Award" demonstrating outstanding dedication
- 43 to public health service in 2018; and a Lifetime Membership in
- 44 MPHA in 2018 (one of only four in MPHA history); and

| 50 | WHEREAS, Dr. Mary Currier led the Mississippi State                |
| 51 | Department of Health to numerous accomplishments such as the       |
| 52 | opening of the state-of-the-art Dr. F.E. "Ed" Thompson State       |
| 53 | Public Health Laboratory; the organizational transition of the     |
| 54 | agency from nine public health districts to three regions and      |
| 55 | achieving accreditation from the Public Health Accreditation       |
| 56 | Board; and the achievement of high childhood immunization rates    |
| 57 | that have been praised nationally; and                             |
| 58 | WHEREAS, Dr. Currier was instrumental in working through the       |
| 59 | challenges that the Mississippi State Department of Health has     |
| 60 | faced such as emerging diseases, including the onset of West Nile  |
| 61 | virus, Ebola and Zika; as well as the anthrax threat after 9/11;   |
| 62 | times of severe funding issues; the rise in syphilis in the 1990s; |
| 63 | and most recently, obtained funding from the Legislature to combat |
| 64 | HIV and tuberculosis; and  |
| 65 | WHEREAS, Mary Currier is a passionate advocate for decreasing      |
| 66 | infant mortality in the state, and recently joined with Jackson    |
| 67 | Mayor Chokwe Antar Lumumba to launch the city's Safe Sleep         |
| 68 | Initiative to prevent Sudden Unexpected Infant Death (SUID) and    |
| 69 | sleep-related deaths; and  |

- 71 Board of Health Chairman Lucius M. Lampton, M.D., and Ed D. "Tad"
- 72 Barham, M.D., to improve the quality of life for all

- 75 professional public health service of a dedicated state official
- 76 whose enormous civic energy has left a legacy of leadership and
- 77 dedication to all citizens in Mississippi:
