## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 659

1 A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION TO COMMEND LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR TATE 2 REEVES FOR HIS DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AS PRESIDENT OF THE 3 MISSISSIPPI SENATE. 4 WHEREAS, known for strong integrity, Tate Reeves was elected Mississippi's 38th Lieutenant Governor in 2011; and 5 WHEREAS, reelected in 2015 as Mississippi's Lieutenant 6 7 Governor, Tate Reeves has led the 52-member Senate with a focus on keeping government spending under control, reforming education and 8 9 making Mississippi a better place to raise a family. Under his leadership, Mississippi has a balanced budget that spends more on 10 11 education and adequately funds other priorities while reducing taxpayers' overall debt burden; and 12 13 WHEREAS, Lieutenant Governor Tate Reeves will complete his 14 second term as President of the Mississippi Senate; and 15 WHEREAS, previously Lieutenant Governor Tate Reeves was 16 elected as Mississippi's 53rd Treasurer in 2003 and reelected to a second term four years later with 61% of the vote, the highest 17 18 percentage of any candidate running for statewide office. WHEREAS, under Lieutenant Governor Reeves' leadership, the 21 22 Legislature approved several measures to make Mississippi an even 23 better place to do business. Reeves believes government should 24 create an environment to encourage the private sector to create more jobs. In an effort to make the state's tax policy flatter 25 26 and fairer, he proposed the largest tax cut in state history 27 through the Taxpayer Pay Raise Act, which lowers the personal 28 income tax; allows for self-employed Mississippians to increase 29 deductions; and eliminates the corporate franchise tax. Under the 30 plan adopted by the Legislature, every taxpayer saw a tax cut. He 31 supported helping job creators increase investment in their 32 businesses by reducing the unemployment tax rate and boosting 33 investment in workforce training at community and junior colleges. 34 Under his leadership, the Legislature also made the state more 35 competitive in a global marketplace by allowing businesses to claim a tax credit on inventory held in the state, which will 36 37 encourage companies to invest more capital in creating jobs. 38 Legislators also reformed the state's Workers' Compensation Law to 39 ensure a fairer and impartial relationship between the worker and 40 employer with provisions to better define the employee's choice of 41 physician, implement stronger measures against workplace drug and 42 alcohol use and increase certain benefits. These changes boosted Mississippi's reputation as a place to do business; and 43

The first steps toward choice 46 were taken with the creation of public charter schools and 47 48 scholarships for students with special needs. Reeves fought to 49 boost the state's literacy rate with legislation to end social promotion of students who cannot read at grade level. After 50 51 decades of legislators talking about school district 52 consolidation, Reeves took action by pushing for administrative 53 consolidation, significantly reducing the number of districts in 54 Mississippi. The Education Commission of the States awarded 55 Mississippi the 2016 Frank Newman Award for State Innovation for 56 these transformational reforms to improve student learning. 57 Mississippi has made record investments in education spending and 58 enacted reforms to save money, strengthen achievement, and clearly 59 communicate school performance; and

60 WHEREAS, Tate Reeves fought for transparency on how agencies spend taxpayers' dollars. Agencies are now required to post 61 62 budget requests on the legislative budget website and disclose 63 each source of revenue. Stronger reporting requirements were 64 placed on taxpayer-funded incentive programs. Reeves secured a 65 commitment from the Department of Finance and Administration and the State Personnel Board to develop statewide contracts for 66 67 services, not just commodities, which will help state agencies 68 take advantage of bulk purchasing power and reduce costs. He

69 pushed passage of the Attorney General's "Sunshine Act," which 70 requires an open and transparent process for awarding legal 71 contracts. Reeves pushed several measures to strengthen public 72 safety and make Mississippi a safe place to raise a family. The 73 Legislature has passed laws to allow for the prosecution of 74 attempted murder and to closely monitor sex offenders using CPS 75 devices. He is committed to protecting Mississippians' Second 76 Amendment Rights by supporting laws to reduce the cost of 77 concealed carry permits and clarify the limits on the ability of 78 cities and counties to restrict the carrying of firearms. Reeves' 79 initiative to help school districts hire law enforcement for 80 campus protection will place more officers in schools; and

81 WHEREAS, Lieutenant Governor Reeves is past Chairman of the 82 Republican Lieutenant Governors Association. He was named one of 83 the Top 40 Politicians Under 40 by The Washington Post. He is a 84 member of the Inaugural Hunt-Kean Leadership Fellows Program 85 focused on education issues. Reeves was named a 2013 Charter Champion by the National Alliance for Public Charter Schools. 86 87 Reeves received the 2012 State Legislative Achievement Award from 88 the U.S. Chamber Institute for Legal Reform for passage of the 89 Attorney General's "Sunshine Act." He was named Legislator of the 90 Year by the Mississippi Municipal League in 2012. Reeves has been named a "Rising Star(s) in the Republican Party" by Rising Tide 91 92 magazine - the publication of the Republican National Committee. He also was selected by the Aspen Institute's Rodel Fellowships in 93

Reeves was recognized by 96 his National Association of State Treasurers' (NAST) peers as the 97 recipient of the Jesse M. Unruh Award which recognized his 98 outstanding service to the association, the profession and to his 99 state; and

100 WHEREAS, Reeves is a Rankin County native and a graduate of 101 Florence High School. He is an Honors Graduate of Millsaps 102 College and holds a Bachelor's Degree in Economics. Reeves holds 103 the Chartered Financial Analyst designation (CFA) and is a member 104 of the CFA Society of Mississippi and the CFA Institute, an 105 organization that leads the investment industry by setting the 106 highest standards of ethics and professional excellence. In 1996, 107 he was the recipient of the Mississippi Society of Financial Analysts Award. Reeves and his wife, Elee Williams Reeves, a 108 109 Tylertown native, are the proud parents of three daughters, Sarah 110 Tyler, Elizabeth Magee and Madeline Tate. The Reeves' family attends Galloway Memorial United Methodist Church; and 111
