5	WHEREAS, in 2018, there were expected to be 164,690 new cases								
6	of prostate cancer and about 29,430 deaths from prostate cancer in								
7	the United States; and								
8	WHEREAS, prostate cancer is a disease that disproportionately								
9	affects men with a family history of this disease (particularly								
10	brother and/or father) and as they advance in age; and								
11	WHEREAS, however, African-American men are at an increased								
12	risk for developing prostate cancer compared to white men and								
13	other men of color. One in six African-American men will develop								
14	prostate cancer in his lifetime; and								
15	WHEREAS, overall, African-American men are 1.7 times more								
16	likely to be diagnosed with, and 2.3 times more likely to die from								
17	prostate cancer than white men. African-American men are also								
18	slightly more likely than white men to be diagnosed with advanced

- 22 WHEREAS, finding prostate cancer when it is still at an early
- 23 stage offers the best hope for effective treatment and potentially
- 24 living cancer free; and
- 25 WHEREAS, if the disease progresses to metastatic, the
- 26 prognosis is poor with median survival of about three years; and
- 27 WHEREAS, improved awareness of prostate cancer, understanding
- 28 of increased risks for developing it, as well as access to recent
