HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 15

1 2 3 4 5 6	A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION ACKNOWLEDGING THE IMPORTANCE OF CREATING THE "MISSISSIPPI INITIATIVE ON HISTORICALLY BLACK COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES (HBCUS)" AS A MEANS TO INCREASE OPPORTUNITIES FOR HBCUS TO PARTICIPATE IN AND BENEFIT FROM STATE PROGRAMS THAT SERVE TO ENSURE THAT THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI HAS THE HIGHEST POSSIBLE PROPORTION OF COLLEGE STUDENTS GRADUATE FROM
7 8	HBCUS IN THE COUNTRY AND ENCOURAGE LEGISLATIVE SUPPORT OF SUCH INITIATIVE THROUGH APPROPRIATE LEGISLATIVE ACTION AND FUNDING.
9	WHEREAS, historically Black colleges and universities (HBCUs)
10	have made historic and ongoing contributions to the general
11	welfare and prosperity of our country; and
12	WHEREAS, America's HBCUs, for over 150 years, have produced
13	leaders in business, government, academia and the military, and
14	have provided generations of men and women with hope and
15	educational opportunity; and
16	WHEREAS, 105 HBCUs are located in twenty states, the District
17	of Columbia and the U.S. Virgin Islands, and serve more than
18	300,000 undergraduate and graduate students; and
19	WHEREAS, these institutions continue to be important engines
20	of economic growth and community service, and they are proven
21	ladders of intergenerational advancement for men and women of all

- 22 ethnic, racial and economic backgrounds, especially African
- 23 Americans; and
- 24 WHEREAS, these institutions also produce a high number of
- 25 baccalaureate recipients who go on to assume leadership and
- 26 service roles in their communities and who successfully complete
- 27 graduate and professional degree programs; and
- 28 WHEREAS, in February 2010, President Obama signed Executive
- 29 Order 13532 to highlight excellence, innovation and sustainability
- 30 of HBCUs, using partnerships with federal agencies and departments
- 31 and the private sector to sustain the important work of HBCUs; and
- 32 WHEREAS, it should be the intent of the Mississippi
- 33 Legislature to promote and enhance the role of historically Black
- 34 colleges and universities located in Mississippi as prime
- 35 contributors to the economic growth of the state by encouraging
- 36 such institutions to continue their efforts to organize a
- 37 consortium for the purpose of strategically partnering with the
- 38 state and private industry to effectively achieve superior
- 39 economic development in Mississippi; and

- 40 WHEREAS, in addition to the educational programs already
- 41 provided for and funded by the state, financial support may also
- 42 be provided for the organization, operation and continuation of a
- 43 "Mississippi Initiative on Historically Black Colleges and
- 44 Universities (HBCUs)" through additional funds to be appropriated
- 45 by the Legislature, which such funds shall be expended for the
- 46 equitable benefit of the HBCU institutions participating in the

- 48 objectives; and
- 49 WHEREAS, the initiative end goal is purposed to establish and
- 50 administer methods to strengthen the capacity of historically
- 51 Black colleges and universities to provide the highest quality
- 52 education, increase opportunities for these institutions to
- 53 participate in and benefit from state programs, and ensure that
- 54 the State of Mississippi has the highest proportion of college
- 55 graduates from HBCUs in the country; and
- 56 WHEREAS, the initiative working with state departments,
- 57 agencies, offices, the private sector, educational associations,
- 58 philanthropic organizations and other partners is responsible for
- 59 the performance of five core tasks:
- 60 (a) Strengthening the capacity of HBCUs to participate
- 61 in state programs;
- 62 (b) Fostering enduring private-sector initiatives and
- 63 public-private partnerships while promoting specific areas and
- 64 centers of academic research and programmatic excellence
- 65 throughout all HBCUs;
- 66 (c) Improving the availability, dissemination, and
- 67 quality of information concerning HBCUs to inform public policy
- 68 and practice;
- 69 (d) Sharing administrative and programmatic practices
- 70 within the consortium for the benefit of all; and

/1	(e) Exploring new ways of improving the relationship
72	between the state and HBCUs; and
73	WHEREAS, it is the policy of this Legislature to shed light
7 4	on the critical need of a diversified educational and workforce
75	environment, which can only be through equitable distribution of
76	assistance and access to a quality postsecondary educational
77	experience and the benefits offered through a system of collegiate
78	partners working in tandem to accomplish the common goal of
79	promoting educational and economic opportunities in the State of

31	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF
32	REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, THE SENATE CONCURRING
3	THEREIN, That we do hereby acknowledge the importance of creating
34	the "Mississippi Initiative on Historically Black Colleges and
35	Universities (HBCUs)" as a means to increase opportunities for
36	HBCUs to participate in and benefit from state programs that serve
37	to ensure that the State of Mississippi has the highest possible
8 8	proportion of college students graduate from HBCUs in the country
39	and encourage legislative support of such initiatives through
90	appropriate legislative action and funding.
91	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be
92	furnished to the Board of Trustees of State Institutions of Higher
93	Learning, each of the state's historically Black colleges and
94	universities and to the members of the Capitol Press Corps.
