## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 68

1	A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION COMMENDING THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF
2	DISTINGUISHED SERVICE RENDERED TO THIS STATE AND NATION BY VIETNAM
3	WAR VETERAN, DR. EDWIN "ED" J. DEUSCHLE, UPON THE OFFICIAL RECEIPT
4	OF MERITORIOUS SERVICE MEDALS FOR HIS DISPLAY OF HEROISM IN THE
5	FACE OF ADVERSITY IN COMMEMORATION OF THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE
6	VIETNAM BATTLE THAT FOREVER ALTERED HIS LIFE ON MAY 5, 1970.

- WHEREAS, the Cities of Tupelo and Madison, Mississippi, are
- 8 proud to be considered the homes of community friend, historical
- 9 legend, acclaimed minister and Vietnam War veteran, Dr. Edwin "Ed"
- 10 J. Deuschle, and are delighted to join the gesture of the
- 11 Mississippi Legislature in extending congratulations upon the
- 12 official receipt of numerous meritorious service medals for his
- 13 display of heroism in the face of adversity during the Vietnam
- 14 War, after more than 40 years, and in commemoration of the 50th
- 15 anniversary of the Vietnam battle that forever altered his life on
- 16 May 5, 1970; and
- 17 WHEREAS, from his humble beginnings in Lee County,
- 18 Mississippi, Dr. Deuschle, who was raised on the premier tenets of
- 19 faith, education and perseverance, evidenced an allegiance to

20 patriotism and graduated from the University of Mississippi's ROTC

- 21 program as a 2nd Lieutenant, and after completing his officer
- 22 basic course, was assigned to Company D, 1st Battalion, 506
- 23 Infantry, 101st Airborne Division as an infantry platoon leader in
- 24 Vietnam; and
- 25 WHEREAS, on May 5, 1970, while leading his platoon in a
- 26 vicious battle under hostile enemy fire, which prevented the Huey
- 27 helicopter transporting his company from safely landing, a young
- 28 Lieutenant Deuschle and his compadres were forced to jump out of
- 29 the aircraft to engage the enemy in heavy artillery exchange; and
- 30 WHEREAS, despite the Huey carrying him being too high to the
- 31 ground, Lieutenant Deuschle took the chance on making a safe jump,
- 32 and suffered a knee jam that impeded his ability to walk, but he
- 33 persevered through the pain and continued to fight and lead his
- 34 platoon in a valiant display of selflessness, otherwise failing to
- 35 counter the hostile gun fire would have meant certain death for
- 36 his company; and
- 37 WHEREAS, under heavy machine-qun fire from a hilltop, it was
- 38 soon discovered that Lieutenant Deuschle and his platoon was
- 39 accompanied by only one other officer, the company commander, who
- 40 instructed the injured Deuschle to take a few troops and navigate
- 41 the hillside to dispel the enemy attack; and
- 42 WHEREAS, using a soldier's backpack for walking and crawling
- 43 leverage, he and his troops inched their way uphill at a worm's
- 44 crawl, before reaching the summit, where the soldier assisting him

45 suffered a fatal wound, and Deuschle would subsequently toss a 46 hand grenade that dismantled the machine-qun emplacement; and 47 WHEREAS, for two weeks, Lieutenant Deuschle remained in the dense foliage of the Vietnamese jungle battle for his and his 48 49 company members' lives in hopes of going undetected in an 50 unfamiliar environment, known only to his native aggressors, before he was provided a medical evacuation; and 51 52 WHEREAS, the only officer of the Delta Company to survive, 53 Lieutenant Deuschle was initially hospitalized in Japan, then 54 eventually flown back to Fort Sam Houston, Texas, where doctors 55 made every attempt possible to repair his knee, but after proving 56 unsuccessful in their efforts, he was transferred to a holding 57 unit before eventually receiving a medical discharge, which proved a cumbersome impediment to his receipt of deserving recognition 58 59 for heroism on the battlefield; and 60 WHEREAS, with only his discharge orders, his military dog 61 tags and permanently injured leg, Lieutenant Deuschle began a fight anew, but this time it was not under hostile enemy fire, it 62 63 was the bureaucratic red tape of the Department of Defense he was 64 battling, in what would prove to be a nearly five-decade long 65 ordeal for official military acknowledgment; and 66 WHEREAS, after two years of no progress, Deuschle, who had accepted his ministerial calling, surrendered the fight for the 67 68 medals for which he had been recommended, and focused on the

battle of spiritual warfare, to compel as many souls as possible

- 70 to join God's legion of baptized believers of faith, after being
- 71 ordained at Calvary Baptist Church; and
- 72 WHEREAS, fast forward to 2013, the now late Congressman Alan
- 73 Nunnelee, Dr. Deuschle's nephew made inquiry about the medals and
- 74 encouraged the military to open an investigation to ensure the
- 75 conferring of honors, and upon his passing, his successor
- 76 Congressman Trent Kelly continued the fight to see the medals
- 77 properly bestowed upon the deserving recipient, who had evidenced
- 78 the patience of Job in seeing the moment realized; and
- 79 WHEREAS, now a retired Baptist minister, who served
- 80 congregations in Bay St. Louis and Noxapater before relocating to
- 81 Madison upon accepting a post on the Mississippi Baptist
- 82 Convention Board, Dr. Deuschle, dreamt of knowing the emotionally
- 83 charged and humbling experience of wearing and feeling a medal
- 84 became a reality on August 31, 2015, when Congressman Kelly
- 85 completed the works of Congressman Nunnelee, in good faith, during
- 86 an awards ceremony in Tupelo to present Dr. Deuschle with eight
- 87 medals of merit, including the: Silver Star Medal, Air Medal,
- 88 National Defense Medal, Vietnam Service Medal with two Bronze
- 89 Service Stars, Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal with "60"
- 90 Device, Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross Unit Citation with
- 91 Palm Device and Republic of Vietnam Civil Actions Honor Medal Unit
- 92 Citation, First Class; and
- 93 WHEREAS, Dr. Deuschle willingly assumes the patriarchal role
- 94 of his family, seizing the reins as the unifying tie that binds

- 95 his family together, as he seeks to always be their provider, and
- 96 remains instrumental in their support and encouragement, as he
- 97 sprinkles their lives with nuggets of infinite wisdom and a
- 98 fervent agape love; and
- 99 WHEREAS, it is the policy of this Legislature to commend and
- 100 honor United States veterans for their courageous service and
- 101 selfless devotion to the country, state, community and family,
- 102 especially those veterans of Dr. Deuschle's caliber, whose light
- 103 continues to be a beam of inspiration illuminating the path of
- 104 hope for all he encounters along this earthly sojourn:
- 105 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF
- 106 REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, THE SENATE CONCURRING
- 107 THEREIN, That we do hereby commend the life, military service, and
- 108 legacy of community leadership and model citizenship of Dr. Edwin
- 109 "Ed" J. Deuschle and express grateful appreciation for the life of
- 110 service and sacrifice he provided to this nation as a Vietnam War
- 111 veteran upon the official receipt of meritorious service medals
- 112 for his display of heroism in the face of adversity in
- 113 commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the Vietnam battle that
- 114 forever altered his life on May 5, 1970.
