HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 70

1 A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION COMMENDING AND CELEBRATING THE 2 OUTSTANDING COLLEGE AND NFL ATHLETIC CAREER OF WALTER PAYTON AND 3 RECOGNIZING HIM AS ONE OF JACKSON STATE UNIVERSITY'S LEGENDARY FOOTBALL PLAYERS WHO HAVE BEEN INDUCTED INTO THE NATIONAL FOOTBALL 5 LEAGUE'S HALL OF FAME.

- 6 WHEREAS, Walter Payton is one of the greatest football
- players to grace the gridiron, who is still remembered by the
- State of Mississippi and the world as an iconic football figure
- with a statistical record that dreams and legends are made of; and
- 10 WHEREAS, born as one of three children to Peter and Alyne
- Payton in Columbia, Mississippi, a young Walter initially declined 11
- 12 playing football at John J. Jefferson High School because of his
- already busy school schedule of extracurricular activities, and, 13
- 14 in part, to avoid competing with his older established football
- 15 playing brother, Eddie; and

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- 16 WHEREAS, once the decision was made to play high school
- 17 varsity football during his junior year, Payton's success was
- instant, even as a small running back who only stood 5-feet 18

- 19 10-inches tall, his speed, strength and agility, made him a
- 20 reckoning force of contention and a formidable, almost unstoppable
- 21 adversary on the field; and
- 22 WHEREAS, despite not receiving any invitations from
- 23 Southeastern Conference Colleges, even after establishing himself
- 24 as one of Mississippi's best running back prospects at the time,
- 25 Payton, after initially committing to Kansas State University,
- 26 opted instead to remain close to home and pursue his collegiate
- 27 career at Jackson State University, joining the Tigers' starting
- 28 lineup during his freshman year in the fall of 1971, followed by a
- 29 breakout performance on October 1, 1972, during his sophomore
- 30 year, when he set a then-best SWAC single-game scoring record by
- 31 rushing for seven touchdowns and two 2-point conversions for 46
- 32 points and a school record of 279 rushing yards in JSU's 72-0
- 33 domineering win over Lane College; and
- 34 WHEREAS, selected for the All-American team and named Black
- 35 College Player of the Year in 1973 and 1974, Payton, in his four
- 36 years at Jackson State University, rushed for more than 3,500
- 37 yards and scored more than 450 points in a pure exhibition of
- 38 demonstrating to fans and opponents alike, the unadulterated
- 39 talent and versatility he possessed as a player; and
- 40 WHEREAS, the first-round choice and the fourth player
- 41 selected in the 1975 National Football League Draft by the Chicago
- 42 Bears, Walter Payton, standing 5'10" and topping the scale at 200
- 43 pounds as a speeding locomotive, developed into a superstar of

- unusual dimensions during his 13-season NFL tenure from 1975 to

 1987 with the Bears, where he dominated the rushing section of the
 league's record books during and long after his career ended; and
- WHEREAS, at the time of his retirement in 1987, Payton's
- 48 statistical record included: 16,726 total yards; 10 seasons with
- 49 1,000 or more rushing yards, including the single game 275 total
- 50 yards against Minnesota in 1977; 77 games with more than 100 yards
- 51 rushing; 110 rushing touchdowns; 4,368 combined net attempts and
- 52 accounted for 21,803 combined net yards; and an impressive 750
- 53 points on 125 touchdowns; and
- 54 WHEREAS, extremely durable, Payton, who missed only one game
- 55 during his rookie campaign, subsequent to that one-game absence,
- 56 returned to play 186 consecutive games, which allowed him to
- 57 showcase his gifts during pre-, regular- and post-season play, and
- 58 enabled him to: win the National Football Conference's (NFC)
- 59 rushing title for five consecutive years from 1976 to 1980; lead
- 60 the NFC with 96 points in 1977; win the NFL kickoff return
- 61 championship his rookie year in 1975; be named All-Pro and All-NFC
- 62 seven times; make nine Pro Bowl Game appearances; be twice-named
- NFL's Most Valuable Player and twice-named Offensive Player of the
- 64 Year in 1977 and 1985; be named NFC Most Valuable Player in 1977;
- 65 and
- WHEREAS, eager to improve his performance from year-to-year,
- 67 Payton's efforts annually propelled the Bears into playoff
- 68 contention, which resulted in his ability to experience the

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- 69 pinnacle apex of his storied career with national championship
- 70 status when the Chicago Bears triumphed over the New England
- 71 Patriots in the Super Bowl XX in January 1986; and
- 72 WHEREAS, subsequent to his retirement in 1987, Walter Payton
- 73 explored various business opportunities in several fields, from
- 74 real estate, to restaurants, to race cars, but most important to
- 75 his heart were his philanthropic and humanitarian endeavors to
- 76 make life better for others, primarily through his efforts with
- 77 the Walter Payton Foundation; and
- 78 WHEREAS, the creator of the signature "shutter-step"
- 79 maneuver, a high-stepping irregularly paced run developed to
- 80 distract his pursuers during long runs, Payton, who adopted the
- 81 motto "Never Die Easy," fit the bill of his life as a versatile
- 82 athlete who earned numerous accolades for his primary running back
- 83 positions, and also for his exploits as a blocker, receiver,
- 84 emergency punter and quarterback, and were easy character traits
- 85 that fervently supported the decision for his enshrinement into
- 86 the 1993 Pro Football Hall of Fame, the 1993 Class of the
- 87 Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame, the 1996 College Football Hall of
- 88 Fame, the Jackson State University Sports Hall of Fame, and the
- 89 Black College Football Hall of Fame in 2010; and
- 90 WHEREAS, it is the policy of this Legislature to recognize
- 91 and pay homage to the stellar athletic feats of sports' legends of
- 92 Walter Payton's caliber, who are few and far between, and whose
- 93 natural disposition was that of a gentle giant, executing

- 95 gentle humility and generous heart of benevolence:
- 96 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF
- 97 REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, THE SENATE CONCURRING
- 98 THEREIN, That we do hereby commend and celebrate the outstanding
- 99 college and NFL athletic career of Walter Payton and recognizing
- 100 him as one of Jackson State University's Legendary football
- 101 players who have been inducted into the National Football League's
- 102 Hall of Fame.
