SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 52

1 2	A RESOLUTION COMMEMORATING AND RECOGNIZING THE HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE OF JUNE 19, 2020, AS "JUNETEENTH."
3	WHEREAS, June 19th, the oldest known celebration of the
4	ending of slavery, is known in many places as "Juneteenth"; and
5	WHEREAS, from 1619 through 1865, millions of Africans and
6	their descendants were enslaved in the United States, the 13
7	American colonies, and eventually the United States of America;
8	and
9	WHEREAS, on September 22, 1862, President Lincoln issued the
10	celebrated Emancipation Proclamation, warning the rebellious
11	Confederate States that he would declare their slaves "forever
12	free" if those states did not return to the Union by January 1,
13	1863. Enforcement of the Emancipation Proclamation occurred only
14	in Confederate States that were under Union Army control; and
15	WHEREAS, prior to the end of the Civil War, on January 31,
16	1865, Congress passed the Thirteenth Amendment to the United
17	States Constitution, which abolished slavery throughout the United
18	States and its territories. Spontaneous celebrations erupted

- 21 WHEREAS, on June 19, 1865, Texas was the last state to
- 22 recognize that enslaved persons were free, two and one-half years
- 23 after the Emancipation Proclamation was signed by President
- 24 Lincoln. For this reason, it is celebrated as Juneteenth; and
- 25 WHEREAS, many African Americans continue the tradition of
- 26 celebrating Juneteenth as inspiration and encouragement for future
- 27 generations, and for more than 140 years, Juneteenth Day
- 28 celebrations have been held to honor African-American freedom
- 29 while encouraging self development and respect for all cultures:
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF
- 31 MISSISSIPPI, That we do hereby commemorate and recognize the
- 32 historical significance of June 19, 2020, as "Juneteenth."
- 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this resolution be made
- 34 available to the Capitol Press Corps.
