## HOUSE BILL NO. 792

- AN ACT TO ESTABLISH THE "HEALTHY FOODS ACCESS PROGRAM ACT"; TO DEFINE TERMINOLOGY USED IN THE ACT; TO REQUIRE THE MISSISSIPPI DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND COMMERCE TO ESTABLISH A PROGRAM TO PROVIDE RESIDENTS OF FOOD DESERT COMMUNITIES WITH ACCESS TO FRESH 5 AND AFFORDABLE PRODUCE; TO REQUIRE THE DEPARTMENT TO SELECT PARTNERING PROVIDERS TO ESTABLISH WEEKLY MARKETS IN THREE FOOD 7 DESERT COMMUNITIES; TO PRESCRIBE THE DUTIES OF THE DEPARTMENT AND PARTNERING PROVIDERS; TO ESTABLISH THE MISSISSIPPI FOOD SYSTEMS 8 9 ADVISORY COUNCIL TO PROVIDE RECOMMENDATIONS REGARDING INCREASING 10 HEALTHY FOOD ACCESS FOR ALL MISSISSIPPI RESIDENTS, CREATING 11 ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES FOR MISSISSIPPI AGRICULTURAL PRODUCERS AND 12 FOOD-RELATED BUSINESSES; TO PROVIDE FOR THE COMPOSITION OF THE 13 COUNCIL AND PRESCRIBE ITS DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES; TO AUTHORIZE THE COUNCIL TO SEEK AND ACCEPT GIFTS, GRANTS OR 14 DONATIONS, INCLUDING IN-KIND DONATIONS, FROM PRIVATE OR PUBLIC 15 16 SOURCES FOR THE PURPOSE OF CARRYING OUT ITS DUTIES; TO REQUIRE THE 17 COUNCIL TO SUBMIT AN ANNUAL REPORT, BEGINNING ON DECEMBER 31, 18 2022, TO THE CHAIRMEN OF THE HOUSE AND SENATE AGRICULTURE COMMITTEES; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 19
- 20 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- 21 SECTION 1. This act shall be known, and may be cited as, the
- 22 "Healthy Foods Access Program Act."
- SECTION 2. As used in this act, the following terms shall 23
- 24 have the meaning ascribed in the section, unless context clearly
- 25 requires otherwise:

26	(a)	"Council"	means	the	Mississippi	Food	Systems
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- 27 Advisory Council.
- 28 (b) "Department" means the Mississippi Department of
- 29 Agriculture and Commerce.
- 30 (c) "Federal WIC program" means the Special
- 31 Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children,
- 32 established pursuant to the federal "Child Nutrition Act of 1966"
- 33 (42 USCS Section 1771, et seq.).
- 34 (d) "Food desert community" means a municipality, or
- 35 physically contiguous area in the state, in which residents have
- 36 limited access to nutritious foods, such as fresh fruits and
- 37 vegetables, through supermarkets, grocery stores and farmers
- 38 markets.
- (e) "Food voucher" means any type of food voucher,
- 40 coupon, stamp, certificate, written authorization, or benefits
- 41 card, which has been issued to a person by a government entity in
- 42 accordance with the provisions of the Supplemental Nutrition
- 43 Assistance Program, the federal WIC program or any other federal
- 44 or state level nutrition or income assistance program.
- 45 (f) "Partnering provider" means an entity that
- 46 qualifies for allowable federal or state reimbursements for food
- 47 vouchers, and is selected by the Department of Agriculture to
- 48 participate in the program.

- 52 (h) "Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program" or
- "SNAP" means the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program,
- 54 established pursuant to the federal "Food and Nutrition Act of
- 55 2008" (7 USCS Section 2011, et seq.).
- 56 **SECTION 3.** (1) The Mississippi Department of Agriculture
- 57 and Commerce shall establish a program to provide residents of
- 58 food desert communities with access to fresh and affordable
- 59 produce. In establishing the program, the department shall select
- one or more partnering providers to establish weekly markets in
- 61 three (3) food desert communities, one (1) of which shall be
- 62 located in a rural area, in order to make fruits and vegetables
- 63 more affordable to families and individuals with limited access to
- 64 fresh food.
- 65 (2) The department shall:
- 66 (a) Solicit and select a partnering provider that
- 67 demonstrates the ability to reliably provide a consistent,
- 68 year-round supply of reasonably priced fresh fruits and vegetables
- 69 to serve food desert communities;
- 70 (b) Work with food desert communities to identify and
- 71 recruit a partnering provider to establish weekly markets, which
- 72 may be operated in partnership with local public schools,
- 73 community organizations or nonprofit organizations; and

74 (	C)	Engage	in	appropriate	outreach	efforts	with	food

- 75 desert communities, the agricultural industry and the public
- 76 concerning the availability of the program.
- 77 (3) A partnering provider that operates a market shall, at a
- 78 minimum:
- 79 (a) Demonstrate to the department the ability to
- 80 reliably provide a consistent, year-round supply of reasonably
- 81 priced fresh fruits and vegetables;
- 82 (b) Accept cash, credit, debit and food vouchers for
- 83 produce at any market operating under the program;
- 84 (c) Offer reduced price produce packages;
- 85 (d) Include storage guides containing information on
- 86 how to keep the produce fresh and recipes for use of the produce;
- 87 and
- 88 (e) Donate any surplus produce at the end of each
- 89 market to food banks, food pantries, soup kitchens and other
- 90 nonprofit organizations that distribute food to individuals in
- 91 need located in the state.
- 92 (4) Within two (2) years after the date of enactment of this
- 93 act, the department shall submit a written report to the
- 94 Legislature:
- 95 (a) Summarizing the program established under this
- 96 section;
- 97 (b) Identifying the partnering providers and food
- 98 desert communities participating in the program, as well as the

99	number	of	families	and	individuals	served	by	the	markets,	and	the

- 100 amount of food vouchers redeemed at the markets; and
- 101 (c) Providing recommendations for legislative actions
- 102 to expand access to, and the affordability of, fruits and
- 103 vegetables to residents in food desert communities throughout the
- 104 state.
- SECTION 4. (1) There is hereby established the Mississippi
- 106 Food Systems Advisory Council, which is created as an advisory
- 107 committee to provide recommendations regarding increasing healthy
- 108 food access for all Mississippi residents, creating economic
- 109 opportunities for Mississippi agricultural producers and
- 110 food-related businesses and strengthening local and regional food
- 111 systems.
- 112 (2) The council shall consist of the following members:
- 113 (a) One (1) representative of the State Department of
- 114 Education, appointed by the State Superintendent of Public
- 115 Education;
- 116 (b) One (1) representative of the State Department of
- 117 Health, appointed by the State Health Officer;
- 118 (c) One (1) representative of the Mississippi
- 119 Department of Agriculture and Commerce, appointed by the
- 120 Commissioner of Agriculture and Commerce;
- (d) One (1) representative of the Mississippi
- 122 Department of Human Services, appointed by the Executive Director
- 123 of the Department of Human Services;

124	(e)	One	(1)	representative	of	the	Mississippi	State
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- 125 University Extension Service, appointed by the Director of the
- 126 Extension Service;
- (f) One (1) representative of the Mississippi
- 128 Development Authority, appointed by the Executive Director of the
- 129 Mississippi Development Authority;
- 130 (g) Sixteen (16) members appointed by the Governor, as
- 131 follows:
- 132 (i) Two (2) members who are recipients of a
- 133 federal food assistance program, at least one (1) of whom is a
- 134 recipient of SNAP;
- 135 (ii) Two (2) members who represent different
- 136 sectors of agricultural production, one (1) of whom is a specialty
- 137 crop producer, and at least one (1) of whom sells agricultural
- 138 products to a public school or school district;
- 139 (iii) Two (2) members who represent food
- 140 wholesalers or food retailers, one (1) of whom must be a direct
- 141 market retailer;
- 142 (iv) One (1) member who represents a statewide
- 143 anti-hunger organization;
- 144 (v) Two (2) members who are knowledgeable about
- 145 federal agencies, one (1) of whom has expertise in federal food
- 146 and nutrition services programs, and one (1) of whom has expertise
- 147 in rural community and regional development programs or community
- 148 and economic development programs;

149	(vi) One (1) member from an academic institution
150	who specializes in economic systems, agriculture or health care;
151	(vii) Two (2) members who represent institutional
152	procurement, one (1) of whom is from an educational setting, and
153	one (1) of whom is from a health care setting;
154	(viii) One (1) member who represents a local,
155	nonprofit, community organization engaged in a farm-to-school
156	program or local food systems:

- 157 (ix) One (1) member who represents a food distributor or food hub; 158
- 159 (x)One (1) member who is knowledgeable about 160 nutrition, preferably, a physician licensed in this state or a 161 registered dietician; and
- 162 (xi) One (1) member who is a representative of a 163 statewide healthy food systems organization.
- 164 In making appointments to the council, the appointing 165 authority shall ensure, to the extent possible, that the 166 membership of the council includes geographic and social 167 diversity, as well as a balance of expertise, both governmental 168 and nongovernmental, in issues relating to Mississippi's food 169 systems.
- 170 Each member of the council shall serve at the pleasure (4)of the appointing authority who appointed said member. Each member 171 172 of the council shall serve a three-year term, except that the 173 Governor shall appoint six (6) members to serve a two-year term

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- 174 and four (4) members to serve four-year terms. An appointing
- 175 authority may reappoint the member for one (1) additional
- 176 three-year term.
- 177 (5) The appointing authorities shall make their initial
- 178 appointments to the council as specified in subsection (2) of this
- 179 section no later than August 15, 2021.
- 180 (6) Any vacancy on the council shall be filled in the same
- 181 manner in which the original appointment was made, and the term
- 182 shall be for the balance of the unexpired term of the member whose
- 183 position on the council is vacant.
- 184 (7) A majority of the members of the council shall elect a
- 185 chair and a vice-chair, who shall serve for two-year terms. A
- 186 member of the council who is an executive director or commissioner
- 187 of a state department or agency may be elected to be a chair or a
- 188 vice-chair of the council, but both positions shall not be held at
- 189 the same time by members who are executive directors or
- 190 commissioners of state departments or agencies.
- 191 (8) Each member of the council shall serve without
- 192 compensation, but shall be entitled to reimbursement for all
- 193 actual and necessary expenses incurred in the discharge of his or
- 194 her duties as a member of the council, including mileage as
- 195 authorized by law.
- 196 (9) The chair shall hold meetings as often as the chair
- 197 deems necessary but not less than four (4) times each calendar
- 198 year. The council shall adopt policies and procedures necessary

199	to carry out	t its du	uties. If	needed,	and if	funding	is	available,
200	Mississippi	State T	University	may staf	f the c	council.		

**SECTION 5.** (1) The purpose of the council includes:

- (a) Growing local, regional and statewide food economies within which producers have access to new markets and low-income populations have access to fresh, affordable, and healthy foods. The council will collaborate and coordinate with agricultural producers, relevant state and federal educational institutions, nongovernmental organizations, and consumers to connect state and federal agencies and to provide Mississippi agricultural producers, including fruit and vegetable producers, with viable market opportunities. Areas of focus include:
- 211 (i) Connecting Mississippi agricultural producers 212 to federal food assistance programs by functioning as an 213 interagency liaison between relevant state and federal agencies; 214 and
- 215 (ii) Leveraging the purchasing power of the 216 state's institutions to create new and reliable markets for 217 Mississippi agricultural products and support the growth of robust 218 and resilient food systems while providing fresh, affordable and 219 healthy foods to vulnerable populations;
- 220 (b) Conducting research regarding national best
  221 practices regarding food and nutrition assistance, direct and
  222 intermediated market development, institutional procurement and

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223	farm-to-school	programs,	as	well	as	other	priorities	determined	bу
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- 224 the council;
- (c) Collaborating with, serving as a resource to, and
- 226 receiving input from local and regional food policy councils in
- 227 the state; and
- 228 (d) Exploring methods of collecting and assessing
- 229 statewide data relating to council activities and reporting the
- 230 relevant information and data regarding council activities.
- 231 (2) The Mississippi Department of Agriculture and Commerce,
- 232 State Department of Education, Department of Human Services and
- 233 State Department of Health shall cooperate with the council with
- 234 respect to the council's duties specified in subsection (1) of
- 235 this section.
- 236 (3) (a) The council may create subcommittees, as the
- 237 council deems necessary, to carry out the work of the council.
- 238 (b) If created, the subcommittees must include
- 239 representatives of the council and may include persons, appointed
- 240 by the chair and the vice-chair, who are not members of the
- 241 council.
- 242 (4) The council may engage in any other activity the council
- 243 determines is necessary to accomplish the purposes outlined in
- 244 this act.
- 245 **SECTION 6.** (1) For the purposes of carrying out the duties
- 246 of the council, the council is authorized to seek and accept
- 247 gifts, grants or donations, including in-kind donations, from

248	private or public sources for the purposes of this act. However,
249	the council may not accept a gift, grant or donation that is
250	subject to conditions that are inconsistent with this act or any
251	other law of the state. The council may accept in-kind donations
252	of staff services from the private sector to staff the
253	council. The council is also authorized to accept and expend
254	federal funds available for its activities. All private and
255	public monies received through gifts, grants or donations shall be
256	transmitted to the State Treasurer, who shall credit the same to
257	the "Food Systems Advisory Council Fund," which fund is hereby
258	created in the State Treasury and referred to in this section as
259	the "fund." The money in the fund must be appropriated by the
260	Legislature to Mississippi State University for allocation to the
261	council for the direct and indirect costs associated with
262	implementing this act. Any monies in the fund not expended for
263	the purpose of this act by the end of each fiscal year shall not
264	lapse into the General Fund, but may be invested by the State
265	Treasurer as provided by law. The State Treasurer shall credit
266	all interest and income derived from the investment and deposit of
267	monies in the fund to the fund.

- (2) Money in the fund may be used for the following 268 269 purposes:
- 270 The actual and necessary expenses incurred by members of the council for serving on the council; 271

272	(b) The costs of staffing the council, if the council
273	is staffed by the Mississippi State University;
274	(c) The costs of funding programs initiated by the
275	council or council staff.
276	<b>SECTION 7.</b> No later than December 31, 2022, and every year
277	thereafter, the council shall report the information specified in
278	Section 5 of this act to the Chairmen of the House and Senate
279	Agriculture Committees.
280	SECTION 8. This act shall take effect and be in force from

281 and after July 1, 2021.
