HOUSE BILL NO. 1302 (As Sent to Governor)

1 AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 73-19-1, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO 2 DEFINE THE PRACTICE OF OPTOMETRY; TO PROVIDE FOR THE DISEASES AND CONDITIONS THAT OPTOMETRISTS ARE AUTHORIZED TO EXAMINE, DIAGNOSE 3 AND MANAGE; TO PROVIDE THAT AN OPTOMETRIST MAY UTILIZE LOCAL 4 5 ANESTHESIA IN THE PERFORMANCE OF CERTAIN PROCEDURES; TO PROVIDE 6 THAT NO OPTOMETRIST SHALL PERFORM CATARACT SURGERY NOR ANY OTHER 7 INTRAOCULAR SURGERY NOT SPECIFICALLY ALLOWED IN THIS STATUTE; TO PROVIDE THAT AN OPTOMETRIST MAY PERFORM YAG LASER POSTERIOR 8 9 CAPSULOTOMIES IF HE/SHE HAS BEEN CERTIFIED BY THE BOARD OF OPTOMETRY TO PERFORM OPTOMETRIC YAG LASER POSTERIOR CAPSULOTOMY 10 11 PROCEDURES; TO AMEND SECTION 73-19-27, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, 12 TO DELETE THE PROVISION THAT ALLOWS OPTOMETRISTS TO USE 13 PHARMACEUTICAL AGENTS IN THEIR PRACTICE; TO AMEND SECTION 73-19-157, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO PROVIDE OPTOMETRISTS THE 14 15 AUTHORITY TO USE AND PRESCRIBE CERTAIN PHARMACEUTICAL MEDICATIONS; 16 AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

17 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:

18 SECTION 1. Section 73-19-1, Mississippi Code of 1972, is

19 amended as follows:

20 73-19-1. (1) The practice of optometry is defined to be

21 the application of optical principles, through technical methods

22 and devices in the examination of human eyes for the purpose of

23 ascertaining departures from the normal, measuring their

24 functional powers and adapting or prescribing optical

25 accessories, including spectacles, contact lenses and low-vision

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devices, for the aid thereof, including, but not limited to, the 26 27 use of computerized or automated refracting devices, lenses and prisms, vision therapy and low-vision rehabilitation therapy. 28 29 The practice of optometry shall include the prescribing and use 30 of therapeutic pharmaceutical agents by optometrists certified 31 under Sections 73-19-153 through 73-19-165. The practice of optometry shall * * * include the removal of superficial foreign 32 33 bodies from the eye or other noninvasive procedures. Nothing in 34 this section or any other provision of law shall be construed to prohibit optometrists who have been certified under Sections 35 36 73-19-153 through 73-19-165 from providing postophthalmic 37 surgical or clinical care and management with the advice and 38 consultation of the operating or treating physician. One who is 39 engaged in the practice of optometry as a profession as defined 40 in this subsection and who has sufficient education and 41 professional competence, as defined by the State Board of 42 Optometry, shall be authorized to examine, diagnose, manage and 43 treat conditions and diseases of the eye and eyelid, including 44 the following: 45 (a) The administration and prescribing of 46 pharmaceutical agents rational to the diagnosis and treatment of 47 conditions or diseases of the eye or eyelid; excluding 48 administration that requires intraocular injection or 49 intraocular implantation;

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50	(b) The performance of primary eye care procedures		
51	not otherwise excluded within this statute rational to the		
52	treatment of conditions or diseases of the eye or eyelid;		
53	(c) The performance and ordering of procedures and		
54	laboratory tests rational to the diagnosis of conditions or		
55	diseases of the eye and eyelid; excluding those requiring biopsy		
56	of any part of the globe or intraocular aspiration or		
57	penetration;		
58	(d) The use of a local anesthetic in conjunction with		
59	the primary care treatment of an eyelid lesion; provided,		
60	however, that no optometrist shall use a local anesthetic for		
61	this purpose unless the optometrist has met the certification		
62	requirements set forth by the Board of Optometry for the		
63	administration of pharmaceutical agents in the performance of		
64	primary eye care procedures. Nothing in this subsection shall		
65	be construed as allowing an optometrist to perform any		
66	reconstructive surgical procedure on the eyelid; and		
67	(e) An optometrist may utilize local anesthesia by		
68	injection in performing the following procedures:		
69	(i) Needle drainage of an eyelid abscess,		
70	hematoma, bulla and seroma;		
71	(ii) Excision of a single epidermal lesion		
72	without characteristics of malignancy, no larger than five		
73	(5) millimeters in size and no deeper than the dermal layer

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21/HR12/R1254SG PAGE 3 (RF\AM) 75 (iii) Incision and curettage of a nonrecurrent 76 chalazion; 77 Simple repair of an eyelid laceration no (iv) 78 larger than two and one-half (2-1/2) centimeters and no 79 deeper than the orbicularis muscle and not involving the 80 eyelid margin or lacrimal drainage structures; or 81 (v) Removal of foreign bodies in the eyelid 82 not involving lid margin, lacrimal drainage structures, and 83 extending no deeper than the orbicularis muscle. Nothing in * * * this act, shall be construed or 84 (2) 85 interpreted to allow any optometrist to treat systemic diseases and/or conditions. 86 87 (3) Optometrists practicing in this state shall not perform cataract surgery nor any other intraocular surgical 88 89 procedure not specifically allowed in this statute. 90 (4) Optometrists practicing under the authority of this 91 section shall be held to the same standard of care as that of other physicians providing similar services. No optometrist shall 92 93 practice under this section unless the optometrist has submitted 94 to the Board of Optometry evidence of satisfactory completion of 95 all education requirements and the board has certified the 96 optometrist as educationally qualified. 97 (5) An optometrist may perform the following if he has been certified by the Board of Optometry to perform optometric laser 98 procedure: YAG laser posterior capsulotomy. 99

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SECTION 2. Section 73-19-27, Mississippi Code of 1972, is amended as follows:

102 73-19-27. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed as 103 conferring on the holder of any certificate of licensure issued by 104 said board the title of oculist, ophthalmologist, or any other 105 word or abbreviation indicating that he is engaged in the practice 106 of medicine or surgery. * * *

107 SECTION 3. Section 73-19-157, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
108 amended as follows:

109 73-19-157. Any optometrist certified to prescribe and use 110 therapeutic pharmaceutical agents under Sections 73-19-153 through 111 73-19-165 is authorized to examine, diagnose, manage and treat 112 visual defects, abnormal conditions and diseases of the human eye 113 or eyelids, including:

115 (* * *<u>a</u>) Over-the-counter medications;

(b) <u>Pharmaceutical medications which are rational and</u>
appropriate for the examination, diagnosis, management or
treatment of visual defects, abnormal conditions or diseases of
the eye and/or eyelids as authorized by Section 73-19-1 of this
chapter not including any medication that must be injected or
implanted into the eye or orbit. Dermal fillers and
substances injected for cosmetic purposes are prohibited.

130 (d) In a public health emergency, the State Health
131 Officer may authorize therapeutically licensed optometrists to
132 administer inoculations for systemic health reasons.

133 <u>SECTION 4.</u> An optometrist may be licensed in Mississippi 134 to perform authorized ophthalmic YAG laser posterior 135 capsulotomy procedures if he/she:

(a) Provides proof of holding a Mississippi licenseto practice therapeutic optometry and is in good standing;

Provides proof of satisfactory completion of a 138 (b) 139 course of instruction as approved by the board. Those 140 graduating from an accredited school or college of optometry within five (5) years after the effective date of this act may 141 142 be excluded from course completion requirement, provided that 143 the candidate has successfully passed appropriate coursework 144 to fulfill requirements as determined by the board. The 145 board-approved course of instruction shall be: 146 (i) Provided by an accredited optometry,

147 osteopathy or medical school;

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150 (iii) Sponsored by an organization approved by 151 the board;

152 (c) Satisfactorily completes a written test approved
153 by the board on aspects pertaining to authorized ophthalmic
154 YAG laser posterior capsulotomy procedures;

155 (d) Passes a clinical skills assessment approved by 156 the board;

(e) Participates in eight (8) additional hours of
working under a preceptor who is either an ophthalmologist or
licensed credentialed optometrist. The preceptor must be
licensed to perform the ophthalmic YAG laser posterior
capsulotomy procedures, and the training shall occur within
the state in which the preceptor is licensed to perform such
procedures; and

164 (f) Such other requirements as may be directed by 165 the board.

166 <u>SECTION 5.</u> An optometrist licensed in another state who 167 applies for licensure by endorsement in Mississippi shall be 168 credentialed to perform authorized ophthalmic YAG laser 169 posterior capsulotomy procedures if the applicant provides 170 proof that:

171 (a) The applicant holds an active license in good172 standing by another state; and

(c) The requirements in the state of licensure for performing ophthalmic YAG laser posterior capsulotomy procedures meet or exceed the requirements in Section 1 of this act; or

(d) The applicant has satisfactory outcome data from
prior ophthalmic YAG laser posterior capsulotomy procedures.
<u>SECTION 6.</u> Optometrists shall report to the board the
outcome of every authorized ophthalmic surgery procedure
performed in such form as required or directed by the board.
<u>SECTION 7.</u> This act shall take effect and be in force from
and after July 1, 2021.

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
