HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 37

- A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION COMMENDING AND CONGRATULATING THE DILIGENCE OF THE FACULTY, STAFF AND STUDENTS OF FRANKLIN ACADEMY ON THE OCCASION OF THE SCHOOL'S HISTORIC 200TH YEAR ANNIVERSARY.
- 4 WHEREAS, Franklin Academy, a historic public school
- 5 institution established in Columbus, Mississippi, is the oldest
- 6 public school in Mississippi and will celebrate the splendid
- 7 occasion of its 200th anniversary; and
- 8 WHEREAS, 200 years ago, on February 10, 1821, Franklin
- 9 Academy was chartered by the Mississippi Legislature, and on
- 10 December 1, 1821, the first structure to house Franklin Academy, a
- 11 20 foot by 30 foot frame structure, was completed, unplastered and
- 12 unceiled, with glass windows in the front of the building and long
- 13 shuttered windows in the rear; and
- 14 WHEREAS, 14 years later and 30 years before the Civil War
- 15 would end, two brick buildings were erected at Franklin Academy,
- 16 one for the boys and one for the girls, and a large wall was built
- 17 between the playgrounds and buildings to ensure that the two
- 18 genders remained separate; and

- 19 WHEREAS, after the Freedmen's School in Columbus burned down
- 20 in 1867, a new school for African-American children was built in
- 21 1869, which was run by both the United States Freedmen's Bureau
- 22 and the American Missionary Association, and became known as Union
- 23 Academy in 1874, and in 1877, Union Academy became a branch of
- 24 Franklin Academy and William Isaac Mitchell served as its first
- 25 principal; and
- 26 WHEREAS, Franklin Academy completed a three-story brick
- 27 structure in 1886, that contained 14 rooms along with a chapel,
- 28 and on March 25, 1903, a new Union Academy building opened that
- 29 contained an additional 12 rooms; and
- 30 WHEREAS, on November 2, 1909, the President of the United
- 31 States of America, President William Howard Taft, visited Franklin
- 32 Academy and toured the entire City of Columbus as part of a
- 33 national tour; and
- 34 WHEREAS, when Stephen D. Lee High School was opened in 1918,
- 35 Franklin Academy became an elementary school, and in 1939, the
- 36 current two-story brick school building with its columned entrance
- 37 was built under the Public Works Administration; and
- 38 WHEREAS, in September 1965, 11 years after the United States
- 39 Supreme Court had ruled that racial segregation was
- 40 unconstitutional in Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka, Kansas,
- 41 Franklin Academy was integrated, and the first African-American
- 42 students were Calvin Doughty, Dwight Doughty, Perry Jamison,
- 43 Curtis Jamison, Larry Jamison and Tommy Jamison, Jr.; and

- WHEREAS, Franklin Academy, a truly historic institution in
 Mississippi, was placed on the National Register of Historic
 Places in 1980, and on November 14, 1990, Franklin Academy was
- 47 designated a Mississippi Landmark; and
- WHEREAS, while Union Academy officially closed in 2008, its
- 49 doors were blown open again on February 23, 2019, when a tornado
- 50 hit Columbus and damaged Success Academy, forcing those students
- 51 to use the Union Academy building until repairs could be
- 52 completed; and
- WHEREAS, throughout the school's history, the students have
- 54 been under the tutelage of some of the best instructors to ever
- 55 teach in the State of Mississippi, and while the community, the
- 16 leadership and even the landscape have transformed in the past 200
- 57 years, Franklin Academy's devotion to help each child reach his or
- 58 her fullest potential and achieve greatness has remained
- 59 steadfast; and
- 60 WHEREAS, after 200 years of dedication to the students of
- 61 Columbus, Mississippi, Franklin Academy continues to grow and
- 62 remains an educational stronghold and a source of intellectual
- 63 empowerment for its members, the citizens of Columbus,
- 64 Mississippi, and the surrounding communities; and
- 65 WHEREAS, it is the policy of this Legislature to recognize
- 66 and commend outstanding and contributory educational institutions
- 67 such as Franklin Academy, which continues to be a cornerstone of
- 68 Lowndes County and the Columbus community as it strives

- 69 continuously to mold the minds of the younger generation in a
- 70 positive and contributory manner:
- 71 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF
- 72 REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, THE SENATE CONCURRING
- 73 THEREIN, That we do hereby commend and congratulate the diligence
- 74 of the faculty, staff and students of Franklin Academy on the
- 75 occasion of the school's historic 200th year anniversary and
- 76 extend warmest wishes for continued prosperity, growth and
- 77 success.
- 78 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be
- 79 furnished to the Superintendent of the Columbus Municipal School
- 80 District, the Principal of Franklin Academy and to the members of
- 81 the Capitol Press Corps.
