HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 7

1 A RESOLUTION URGING PRESIDENT JOSEPH R. BIDEN, JR., TO END 2 THE TARIFF WAR THAT IS HARMING THE LIVELIHOODS OF MISSISSIPPI 3 FARMERS. 4 WHEREAS, according to the Mississippi State University Division of Agriculture, Forestry and Veterinary Medicine, there 5 are approximately 36,200 farms in Mississippi, comprising 10.7 6 7 million acres, and 16,355 of those farms represent the sole occupation of the families who live and work there, and there are 8 9 another 19.7 million acres of timberlands in production in the state, impacting approximately 125,000 Mississippi landowners; and 10 11 WHEREAS, the farm gate value of Mississippi agriculture production is about \$7.56 billion annually, and agriculture and 12 13 forestry production add a combined \$16.41 billion to Mississippi's 14 economy; and 15 WHEREAS, ranking as one of the top 10 states for the amount 16 of crops produced nationwide, Mississippi primarily produces, in order of market segment, poultry and eggs, timber, soybeans, 17 18 cotton and corn, and it is the nation's top catfish producing

22 WHEREAS, in 2018, former President Trump announced \$50 23 billion in tariffs against China, and the Chinese quickly 24 responded with similar tariffs, mostly against agriculture 25 products in the United States, with one of the primary products 26 impacted being soybeans, which is Mississippi's top exported 27 product; and

28 WHEREAS, because trade rifts with China brought a twenty-five 29 percent tariff on soybeans, and with total national soybean 30 exports to China topping more than \$12 billion annually, talk of 31 trade wars and tariffs are worrisome to Mississippi farmers 32 because Mississippi's portion of those exports to China were \$109.7 million in 2017, and because of China's retaliatory tariffs 33 34 against our nation, there has been a significant economic impact 35 on Mississippi farmers whose livelihoods depend on these exported 36 products; and

WHEREAS, for Mississippians, the impact of the current and proposed tariffs could be tremendous because soybeans are a \$1.1 billion industry in the state and the third highest agricultural crop behind poultry and forestry, according to the Mississippi Department of Agriculture and Commerce, with more than 110 million bushels being harvested in 2017 on almost 2.2 million acres from 3,274 farms in the state; and

expected to impact other products, such as cotton and corn,
American beef, whisky, passenger vehicles, industrial chemicals,
wheat, sorghum and tobacco; and

WHEREAS, because China has imposed retaliation tariffs against the United States, the livelihoods of Mississippi farmers have been drastically impacted, and for our state to see an end to these issues, current trading relationships must be preserved and new opportunities for agricultural trade must be secured for the growth and renewed prosperity of agriculture in Mississippi:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, That we do hereby urge President Joseph R. Biden, Jr., to end the tariff war, which is harming the livelihoods of Mississippi farmers.
