- WHEREAS, Human Papillomavirus (HPV) infections are so common
- 5 that nearly all men and women will get HPV at some point in their
- 6 lives. Nearly 80 million Americans are currently infected with
- 7 HPV, and about 14 million Americans, including teens, become
- 8 infected each year; and
- 9 WHEREAS, HPV is a recognized cause of cancer. Although most
- 10 HPV infections are asymptomatic and clear spontaneously,
- 11 persistent infections can progress to precancer or cancer. While
- 12 HPV can cause six types of cancer, only cervical cancer can be
- 13 detected early. The other five cancers may not be detected until
- 14 they cause health problems; and
- 15 WHEREAS, about 45,300 new cases of HPV-associated cancers
- 16 occur in the United States each year, including about 25,400 among
- 17 women, and about 19,900 among men. Cervical cancer is the most
- 18 common HPV-associated cancer among women, and oropharyngeal

- 19 cancers (cancers of the back of the throat, including the base of
- 20 the tongue and tonsils) are the most common among men; and
- 21 WHEREAS, in Mississippi, it is estimated that 350 cancers per
- 22 year are attributable to HPV types targeted by the HPV vaccine;
- 23 and preventing cancer is better than treating it; and
- 24 WHEREAS, most HPV-related cancers can be prevented by timely
- 25 HPV vaccination according to CDC guidelines, and most recent data
- 26 from 2019 shows Mississippi is at the bottom of all states for HPV
- 27 vaccination among adolescents; and
- 28 WHEREAS, HPV vaccination is cancer prevention. Increasing
- 29 awareness among patients, parents and educating health care
- 30 providers regarding the best use of the preventative tools is a
- 31 key component in safeguarding health:
- 32 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF
- 33 MISSISSIPPI, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, That
- 34 we do hereby recognize March 4, 2021, as "HPV Cancer Awareness
- 35 Day" in Mississippi; urge all Mississippi citizens to take
- 36 advantage of the tests, screenings and vaccines that have proven
- 37 effective in preventing most HPV-related cancers; and encourage
- 38 all parents to consider vaccinating their children to help protect
- 39 future generations from HPV-related cancers.
- 40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this resolution be forwarded to
- 41 the State Board of Health for proper distribution to the public
- 42 and made available to the Capitol Press Corps.
