SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 54

1 A RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE 40-YEAR CAREER OF *THE CLARION* 2 *LEDGER* CAPITOL CORRESPONDENT JIMMIE GATES.

3 WHEREAS, Jimmie Gates of Jackson, Mississippi, retired as a 4 Journalist with *The Clarion Ledger* after 40 years on December 1, 5 2020. He was a well-known and respected Capitol Correspondent and 6 served as a bridge between the Legislature, the newspaper and the 7 community; and

8 WHEREAS, Jimmie Gates worked nearly every beat at The Clarion Ledger and its former sister paper, the Jackson Daily News, since 9 10 his byline first appeared four decades ago. He began writing 11 community features, then took on minority affairs as one of only a 12 handful of African-American Journalists at the paper in the 1980s. 13 He covered county and city governments, crisscrossed the halls of the Mississippi State Capitol and settled into a role focused on 14 courts and criminal justices; and 15

16 WHEREAS, through it all, he honed a reputation for fairness, 17 for hard work and a gentle interviewing style, for colorful

18 legislative and courtroom tales and a deep pool of sources that he
19 was happy to share with younger colleagues; and

20 WHEREAS, Gates (65) dreamed of becoming a journalist growing 21 up in Jackson during the Civil Rights Movement. The Jackson State 22 University graduate landed a staff job at the *Jackson Daily News*, 23 the afternoon paper, in 1981 following an internship. He admits 24 to being slightly star-struck joining the journalists he grew up 25 reading, back when he would pore through the paper after his 26 grandfather was finished with it; and

27 WHEREAS, more than a year later came another formative moment 28 for a young Gates: The Clarion Ledger won its only Pulitzer Prize 29 for a series of stories that led to education reform. Gates was "just a green rookie" then, but it was nevertheless "great to be 30 part of that atmosphere for a young reporter," he said. 31 That 32 series led to the passage of the landmark "Education Reform Act of 33 1982." As a minority affairs reporter, Gates played a key role in 34 trying to show "that we did care about the African American 35 community; and

36 WHEREAS, after stints in a number of other beats over the 37 years, Gates said he eventually found court reporting as his 38 calling. He loved covering the high-profile trials, he said, 39 trying to place his readers inside the tense and emotion-filled 40 courtrooms, always striving to "walk that tightrope" of showing 41 fairness to both sides; and

No. 54 21/SS08/R1259 PAGE 2 (rdd\tb) WHEREAS, when he was not in a courtroom, Gates could often be found working the halls of the Capitol, a place where seemingly everyone knew his name and wanted to say hello. In 2021, he covered two major policy changes he said he was surprised to see finally happen in Mississippi: a new state flag and voters' approval of medical marijuana; and

WHEREAS, Representative Alyce Clarke has served since 1985 48 49 and got to know Gates well over the years. Gates was a reporter 50 "who was willing to tell it like it is," she said, even if the truth was uncomfortable. But she said he was also willing to tell 51 52 positive news stories about lawmakers and the policies they "He was somebody really easy to talk to, someone nice to 53 passed. 54 talk to, and someone interested in the good things that were going 55 on," Clarke said; and

56 WHEREAS, Jimmie Gates was a masterful interviewer, former 57 colleagues said, eliciting revelatory information from reluctant 58 sources, thanks to his gentle and kind approach. He never raised 59 his voice with a source - a rarity in any high-stress newsroom 60 environment; and

61 WHEREAS, Gates said in retirement he plans to do some 62 freelancing and work on a book. Jimmie is married to wife Pattie 63 Gates and has a daughter, April.

64 WHEREAS, it is with great pride that we pay tribute to a 65 Mississippi Journalist known for fairness and hard work whose 66 positive reporting contributed to his community and to the State 67 of Mississippi:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, That we do hereby recognize the 40-year career of *The Clarion Ledger* Capitol Correspondent, Jimmie Gates, commend his fair and balanced reporting style and extend our best wishes to Jimmie and his family for future successes.
