## **REPORT OF CONFERENCE COMMITTEE**

#### MR. SPEAKER AND MR. PRESIDENT:

We, the undersigned conferees, have had under consideration the amendments to the following entitled BILL:

H. B. No. 1387: Appropriation; Education, Department of.

We, therefore, respectfully submit the following report and recommendation:

1. That the Senate recede from its Amendment No. 1.

2. That the House and Senate adopt the following amendment:

425 SECTION 14. Of the funds appropriated in this act, an amount 426 not to exceed One Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars 427 (\$1,500,000.00) shall be used for technological methods for 428 agricultural programs, computer science, engineering or robotic 429 engineering programs and equipment upgrades and Mississippi 430 Elementary (ME) STEM and STEAM programs from the Career and 431 Technical Education Division of the State Department of Education. 432 All programs must meet Mississippi Science Standards and/or 433 College and Career Standards.

Of the funds appropriated in this section, an amount not to 434 435 exceed One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) shall be distributed to 436 the Mississippi State University Center for Cyber Education and 437 used for computer science programs development and teacher 438 training for elementary schools, middle schools, and high schools 439 for the purpose of developing K-12 computer science curricula, 440 including both academic and career and technical education 441 programs, developing and delivering teacher training, and working 442 with the State Board of Education and Institutions of Higher Learning in the state to develop teacher preparation programs for 443 computer science endorsements. Of the funds appropriated in Section 1, the sum of Sixty-two Thousand One Hundred Ninety-one Dollars (\$62,191.00), 448 449 which is the aggregate sum that the school districts in the 450 Chickasaw Cession receive annually from interest payments from the 451 Chickasaw School Fund under Section 212, Mississippi Constitution 452 of 1890, shall be deducted from the allocations to the school 453 districts as provided in Section 29-3-137, Mississippi Code of 454 1972, and shall be distributed among the school districts in the 455 Chickasaw Cession by the State Department of Education in the 456 manner that those interest payments were distributed during Fiscal 457 Year 1985.

468 **SECTION 18.** It is the intention of the Legislature that the 469 State Board of Education shall maintain complete accounting and
