HOUSE BILL NO. 590

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 79-11-501, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO REMOVE CONDUCT OF RELIGIOUS INSTITUTIONS AND GROUPS OR CORPORATIONS WHICH FORM AN INTEGRAL PART OF RELIGIOUS INSTITUTIONS THAT IS PRIMARILY SUPPORTED BY PREVIOUS DONORS FROM WHAT THE TERM 5 "CHARITABLE ORGANIZATION" DOES NOT INCLUDE; TO AMEND SECTION 79-11-511, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO PROVIDE THAT A CHARITABLE ORGANIZATION, PERSON, PROFESSIONAL FUNDRAISER, FUNDRAISING COUNSEL 7 OR PROFESSIONAL SOLICITOR, THAT SOLICITS CONTRIBUTIONS IN THE 8 9 STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, SHALL BE SUBJECT TO NOTICE OR DEMAND AS PROVIDED IN SECTION 79-35-13, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, AND SHALL 10 11 BE SUBJECT TO SERVICE OF PROCESS AS PROVIDED BY THE MISSISSIPPI 12 RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES. 13 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI: 14 SECTION 1. Section 79-11-501, Mississippi Code of 1972, is amended as follows: 15 16 79-11-501. The following words and phrases as used in Sections 79-11-501 through 79-11-529 shall have the meanings as 17 18 defined in this section * * * unless * * * the context clearly indicates otherwise: 19 (a) (i) "Charitable organization" means either of the 20

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following:

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23	Revenue Service to be a tax exempt organization pursuant to
24	Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code; or
25	(B) Any person actually or purporting to be
26	established for any voluntary health and welfare, benevolent,
27	philanthropic, patriotic, educational, humane, scientific, public
28	health, environmental conservation, civic, or other eleemosynary
29	purpose or for the benefit of law enforcement personnel,
30	firefighters, or other public safety organizations, or any person
31	employing in any manner a charitable appeal as the basis of any
32	solicitation or an appeal that suggests that there is a charitable
33	purpose to any solicitation and includes each local, county or
34	area division within this state of such charitable organization,
35	provided such local, county or area division has authority and
36	discretion to disburse funds or property otherwise than by
37	transfer to any parent organization.
38	(ii) "Charitable organization" is not limited to
39	only those organizations to which contributions are tax deductible
40	under Section 170 of the Internal Revenue Code.

(A)

Any person determined by the Internal

- 41 (iii) "Charitable organization" does not include
- 42 any bona fide duly constituted religious institutions and such
- 43 separate groups or corporations which form an integral part of
- 44 religious institutions, provided that:
- 45 (A) Such religious institutions, groups or

46 corporations are tax exempt pursuant to the Internal Revenue Code;

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47	(B)	No	part	of	their	net	income	inures	to	the

- 48 direct benefit of any individual; and
- 49 (C) Their conduct is primarily supported by
- 50 government grants or contracts, funds solicited from their own
- 51 membership, congregations * * * and fees charged for services
- 52 rendered.
- (b) "Charitable purpose" means either of the following:
- (i) Any purpose described in Section 501(c)(3) of
- 55 the Internal Revenue Code; or
- (ii) Any voluntary health and welfare, charitable,
- 57 benevolent, philanthropic, patriotic, educational, humane,
- 58 scientific, public health, environmental conservation, civic, or
- 59 other eleemosynary purpose or for the benefit of law enforcement
- 60 personnel, firefighters, or other public safety organizations;
- "Charitable purpose" is not limited to only those purposes
- 62 for which contributions are tax deductible under Section 170 of
- 63 the Internal Revenue Code.
- 64 (c) "Container" means any box, carton, package,
- 65 receptacle, canister, jar, dispenser, or machine that offers a
- 66 product for sale or distribution which is or purports to be a
- 67 solicitation of contributions for a charitable purpose.
- (d) "Contribution" means the promise or grant of any
- 69 money or property of any kind or value, including the promise to
- 70 pay, except payments by members of an organization for membership
- 71 fees, dues, fines, assessments or for services rendered to

- 72 individual members, if membership in such organization confers a
- 73 bona fide right, privilege, professional standing, honor or other
- 74 direct benefit, other than the right to vote, elect officers or
- 75 hold offices, and except money or property received from any
- 76 governmental authority. Reference to the dollar amount of
- 77 "contributions" in Sections 79-11-501 through 79-11-529 means in
- 78 the case of promises to pay, or payments for merchandise or rights
- 79 of any other description, the value of the total amount promised
- 80 to be paid or paid for such merchandise or rights and not merely
- 81 that portion of the purchase price to be applied to a charitable
- 82 purpose.
- (e) "Fundraising counsel" means a person (i) who for a
- 84 fixed fee or rate under a written agreement plans, manages,
- 85 advises or consults with respect to the solicitation in this state
- 86 of contributions by a charitable organization, (ii) who neither
- 87 solicits contributions nor directly or indirectly employ, procure
- 88 or engage any person compensated to solicit contributions, and
- 89 (iii) who does not at any time, whether directly or indirectly,
- 90 receive or have custody or control of contributions. A bona fide
- 91 nontemporary salaried officer or employee of a charitable
- 92 organization shall not be deemed to be a fundraising counsel. No
- 93 attorney, accountant or banker who renders professional services
- 94 to a charitable organization or advises a person to make a
- 95 charitable contribution during the course of rendering
- 96 professional services to that person shall be deemed, as a result

- 97 of the professional service or advice rendered, to be a 98 fundraising counsel.
- 99 (f) "Person" means any individual, organization, group,
 100 association, partnership, corporation, trust or any combination of
 101 them or any other entity however established within or without
 102 this state.
- 103 "Professional fundraiser" means any person who for (a) 104 compensation or other consideration is retained by a charitable 105 organization to solicit in or from this state contributions for 106 charitable purposes directly or in the form of payment for goods, 107 services or admission to fundraising events, whether such 108 solicitation is performed personally or through his agents, 109 servants or employees or through agents, servants or employees especially employed by or for a charitable organization who are 110 111 engaged in the solicitation of contributions, the sale of goods or 112 services or the production of fundraising events under the 113 direction of such person, or a person who plans, conducts, manages, carries on, advises or consults, whether directly or 114 115 indirectly, in connection with the solicitation of contributions, 116 sale of goods or services or the production of fundraising events 117 for or on behalf of any charitable organization, but does not qualify as a fundraising counsel within the meaning of Sections 118 79-11-501 through 79-11-529, or who engages in the business of or 119 holds himself out as independently engaged in the business of 120 soliciting contributions for such purposes. A bona fide officer 121

122 or employee of a charitable organization shall not be deemed a

123 professional fundraiser unless his salary or other compensation is

124 paid as a commission which is computed on the basis of funds to be

125 raised or actually raised.

126 (h) "Professional solicitor" means any person who is

127 employed or retained for compensation by a professional fundraiser

128 to solicit contributions for charitable purposes from persons in

129 this state.

130 (i) "Public safety organization" means a

131 nongovernmental organization that uses in its name, whether in a

132 publication of the organization, in a solicitation for

133 contributions to the organizations, for membership in the

134 organization, or to purchase advertising in a publication of the

135 organization, or in a solicitation to purchase products or tickets

136 to an event sponsored by or for the benefit of the organization by

137 a solicitor, the term officer, peace officer, police officer,

138 police law enforcement, reserve officer, deputy, deputy sheriff,

139 constable, deputy constable, fireman, firefighter, volunteer

140 fireman, emergency medical service provider, civil employee or any

141 other term in a manner that reasonably implies that the

142 organization or that a contribution, purchase or membership will

143 benefit public safety personnel.

144 (j) "Solicitation" or "solicit" means the request,

145 directly or indirectly, for money, credit, property, financial

146 assistance, or any other thing of value on the plea or

- representation that such money, credit, property, financial
 assistance, or any other thing of value or a portion of it will be
 used for a charitable purpose or will benefit a charitable
 organization. "Solicitation" or "solicit" includes, but is not
 limited to, the following methods of requesting or securing money,
 credit, property, financial assistance or any other thing of
- 154 (i) Any oral or written request.
- 155 (ii) The making of any announcement in the press,
 156 over the radio or television, by telephone, through the mail or
 157 any other media concerning an appeal or campaign by or for any
 158 charitable organization or purpose.
- (iii) The distribution, circulation, posting or
 publishing of any handbill, written advertisement or other
 publication which directly or by implication seeks to obtain a
 contribution.
- 163 The offer of, attempt to sell, or sale of any (iv) 164 advertising space, book, card, tag, coupon, device, magazine, 165 membership, merchandise, subscription, flower, ticket, candy, 166 cookies or other tangible item in connection with which any appeal 167 is made for any charitable organization or purpose, or where the 168 name of any charitable organization is used or referred to in any 169 appeal as an inducement or reason for making any sale, or where any statement is made that the whole or any part of the proceeds 170

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value:

- 171 from the sale will be used for any charitable purpose or will
- 172 benefit any charitable organization.
- 173 (v) The use or employment of container, canisters,
- 174 cards, receptacles or similar devices for the collection of money
- 175 or other thing of value in connection with which any appeal is
- 176 made for any charitable organization or purpose.
- 177 (vi) Any announcement requesting the public to
- 178 attend an appeal, assemblage, athletic or competitive event,
- 179 carnival, circus, concert, contest, dance, entertainment,
- 180 exhibition, exposition, game, lecture, meal, party, show, social
- 181 gathering or other performance or event of any kind.
- 182 A solicitation shall take place whether or not the person
- 183 making the solicitation receives any contribution, except that a
- 184 charitable organization's use of its own name in any communication
- 185 shall not alone be sufficient to constitute a solicitation.
- 186 **SECTION 2.** Section 79-11-511, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 187 amended as follows:
- 79-11-511. * * * A charitable organization, person,
- 189 professional fundraiser, fundraising counsel or professional
- 190 solicitor, that solicits contributions in the State of
- 191 Mississippi, shall be subject to notice or demand as provided in
- 192 Section 79-35-13, and shall be subject to service of process as
- 193 provided by the Mississippi Rules of Civil Procedure.
- 194 **SECTION 3.** This act shall take effect and be in force from
- 195 and after July 1, 2022.
