## HOUSE BILL NO. 759

AN ACT TO PROVIDE THAT EACH PERSON WHO IS EIGHTEEN YEARS OF AGE OR OLDER HAS THE RIGHT TO DETERMINE, IN THAT PERSON'S SOLE DISCRETION, WHETHER HE OR SHE WILL RECEIVE VACCINATIONS OR IMMUNIZATIONS FOR ANY DISEASE, EXCEPT WHEN THE PERSON IS REQUIRED 5 TO BE VACCINATED TO ATTEND SCHOOL; TO PROHIBIT ANY PERSON OR ENTITY FROM REQUIRING A PERSON TO RECEIVE A VACCINATION OR 7 IMMUNIZATION FOR ANY DISEASE AS A CONDITION OF EMPLOYMENT OR A CONDITION OF RECEIVING A BENEFIT OR SERVICE; TO PROHIBIT A PERSON 8 9 OR ENTITY FROM USING ANY MEANS OF INTIMIDATION OR THREAT OF 10 TERMINATION OF SUCH PERSON'S EMPLOYMENT, OR DENIAL OR REDUCTION OF 11 A BENEFIT OR SERVICE TO SUCH PERSON, OR DISCLOSURE OF SUCH 12 PERSON'S MEDICAL HISTORY OR RECORDS TO OTHERS, IN ORDER TO CAUSE 13 THE PERSON TO RECEIVE A VACCINATION OR IMMUNIZATION FOR ANY DISEASE; TO AMEND SECTION 41-23-43, MISSISSIPPI CODE OF 1972, TO 14 ALLOW FIRST RESPONDERS AN EXEMPTION FROM VACCINATIONS FOR 15 16 PHILOSOPHICAL REASONS; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

- 17 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:
- 18 <u>SECTION 1.</u> (1) This section shall be known and may be cited 19 as the "Mississippi Adult Health and Privacy Act."
- 20 (2) Each person who is eighteen (18) years of age or older
  21 has the right to determine, in the sole discretion of that person,
  22 whether he or she will receive vaccinations or immunizations for
  23 any disease, except when the person is required to be vaccinated
- 24 to attend school under Section 41-23-37.

25 (3) A	person,	organization	or	other	entity,	whether	public,
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- 26 private or governmental, may not:
- 27 (a) Require a person who is eighteen (18) years of age
- 28 or older to receive a vaccination or immunization for any disease
- 29 as a condition of employment or a condition of receiving a benefit
- 30 or service; or
- 31 (b) Use any means of direct or indirect intimidation or
- 32 threat of termination of a person's employment, or denial or
- 33 reduction of a benefit or service to a person, or disclosure of
- 34 the person's medical history or records to others, in order to
- 35 cause the person to receive a vaccination or immunization for any
- 36 disease.
- 37 **SECTION 2.** Section 41-23-43, Mississippi Code of 1972, is
- 38 amended as follows:
- 39 41-23-43. (1) As used in this section:
- 40 (a) "Department" means the Mississippi State Department
- 41 of Health, Bioterrorism Division;
- 42 (b) "Director" means the Executive Director of the
- 43 State Board of Health;
- (c) "Bioterrorism" means the intentional use of any
- 45 microorganism, virus, infectious substance or biological product
- 46 that may be engineered as a result of biotechnology or any
- 47 naturally occurring or bioengineered component of any
- 48 microorganism, virus, infectious substance or biological product,

- 49 to cause or attempt to cause death, disease or other biological
- 50 malfunction in any living organism;
- (d) "Disaster locations" means any geographical
- 52 location where a bioterrorism attack, terrorist attack,
- 53 catastrophic or natural disaster or emergency occurs;
- (e) "First responders" means state and local law
- 55 enforcement personnel, fire department personnel, emergency
- 56 medical personnel, emergency management personnel and public works
- 57 personnel who may be deployed to bioterrorism attacks, terrorist
- 58 attacks, catastrophic or natural disasters and emergencies.
- 59 (2) The department shall offer a vaccination program for
- 60 first responders who may be exposed to infectious diseases when
- 61 deployed to disaster locations. The vaccinations shall include,
- 62 but are not limited to, hepatitis A vaccination, hepatitis B
- 63 vaccination, diphtheria-tetanus vaccination, influenza
- 64 vaccination, pneumococcal vaccination and other vaccinations when
- 65 recommended by the United States Public Health Service and in
- 66 accordance with Federal Emergency Management Directors Policy.
- 67 Immune globulin will be made available when necessary.
- 68 (3) Participation in the vaccination program shall be
- 69 voluntary by the first responders, except for first responders who
- 70 are classified as having "occupational exposure" to blood borne
- 71 pathogens as defined by the Occupational Safety and Health
- 72 Administration Standard contained at 29 CFR 1910.10300 who shall

- 73 be required to take the designated vaccinations or otherwise
- 74 required by law.
- 75 (4) A first responder shall be exempt from vaccinations when
- 76 a written statement from a licensed physician is presented
- 77 indicating that a vaccine is medically contraindicated for that
- 78 person or the first responder signs a written statement that the
- 79 administration of a vaccination conflicts with their religious or
- 80 philosophical tenets.
- 81 (5) If there is a vaccine shortage, the director, in
- 82 consultation with the Governor and the Centers for Disease Control
- 83 and Prevention, shall give priority for vaccination to first
- 84 responders.
- 85 (6) The department shall notify first responders to the
- 86 availability of the vaccination program and shall provide
- 87 educational materials on ways to prevent exposure to infectious
- 88 diseases.
- 89 (7) The department may contract with county and local health
- 90 departments, not-for-profit home health care agencies, hospitals
- 91 and physicians to administer a vaccination program for first
- 92 responders.
- 93 (8) This section shall be effective upon receipt of federal
- 94 funding and/or federal grants for administering a first responders
- 95 vaccination program. Upon receipt of that funding, the department
- 96 shall make available the vaccines to first responders as provided
- 97 in this section.

98 **SECTION 3.** This act shall take effect and be in force from

99 and after its passage.
